"Diversification of products—that is the only method for Wheeler county farmers to succeed-and those farmers must be urged to try the plan of diversification," said J. L. Tarter, county agent, Tuesday, speaking at the Lions club bi-weekly

### EDITORIAL

# Grasshoppers Must Go!

For the first time in some years the possibility of fair crops is seen. At the same time the greatest grasshopper infestation in history threatens the potential agriculture production.

Extensive campaigns and complete co-operation, in which the poisoning of grasshoppers may be accomplished, are the only methods of solving the real menace. This is not true only of Wheeler county. The same thing applies to other threatened sections.

Real work must be done, and the willingness to cooperate has been indicated. Now the problem is that of getting sufficient materials to make an appreciable amount of headway. The federal government is attempting to aid in combatting the infestation, but it cannot do the whole job.

The only direction to be offered then is that individuals take the lead and do as much as they can with the material they can get.

There are many individuals who are willing to cooperate in the work, but the task of getting enough poison with which to do the work will be difficult.

Because the occasion does require co-operation and because the campaign MUST go over, something MUST

One suggestion is that the commissioners appropriate money from the county general fund. Since no individual nor any small group can do enough to cover the field in these plans, the only solution of this-Wheeler county's greatest probem-that has been offered is the plan of aid given by the county.

Certainly the cause is worth the procedure, even if the purse strings of the county fund are worn. The hoppers will soon eat all growing crops if they are not exterminated, and purse strings might as well be worn as devoured by the jumping pests.

Now that co-operation among the farmers themselves has been displayed, the same attitude upon the part of Wheeler county merchants and other citizens must be shown.

Grasshoppers or people will lose this conflict. The hoppers will fight their own battle methodically and effectively. Unless human beings fight back just as methodically, but more effectively, there is no question about which will win.

Among his prized personal belongings are several hundred framed prints of great rarity, showing scenes along the Hudson River and other sections of New York State, as well as of ships of many sizes and types. They are hung all over the walls of his study, the library, and the halls, the choicest being in the executive offices in the west wing. In addition there are ship models of various sizes, representing craft of different periods. One of these which the President holds very dear is a model of an ancient galleon of solid silver.

are not dependable. Use seeds of known hardiness."

Texas farmers will do well to buy, whenever possible, seeds bearing the familiar state certified or state registered tag. The tag means that state representatives have visited the seed producer's plant, that they certify to the purity of the variety. The producer must fulfill strict requirements to insure the purity of the strain

Texas now certifies several different varieties of cotton, corn, grain sorghums, wheat, oats, and Irish potatoes. The plan used by many farmers is to buy enough certified seed to plant their entire acreage with the increase. When reasonable precautions are observed to prevent cross pollination and mixing, such a plan is usually worth while, and the only expense is the annual purchase of a small amount of seed.

The state certified tag means that the seed is true to variety and free costs showed that in some instances not be accepted as a recommendation more is spent for hosiery than for of the variety represented. 



# State Doctor Gives Suntan Tip

AUSTIN.—"One of the striking examples of overworking a good thing is the enthusiasm displayed by thousands of persons in trying to se-cure a sun tan too quickly. Under a misguided conception of the sun's health giving power, such persons either deliberately or thoughtlessly submit their unprotected faces, backs and legs to overexposure and suffer painfully, sometimes seriously, as a consequence," comments Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

"The discomfort and annoyance of even mild sunburn should deter people from repeating this folly from year to year. However, especially where younger persons are con-cerned, the enthusiasm for fun and the desire to become speedily tanned are likely to exact the inevitable price with painful regularity.

"It is one thing to apply the principles of the princ

ciiples of sun treatment scientifically and quite another to place the tender skin unrestrainedly under the direct rays of the run. It should be understood that when the sun is employed as treatment patients are exposed for but a few minutes at a time, the perioids being gradually extended as the tanning develops."
