Forty thousand pounds of bran is on the track at Mobeetie, but the and all other points where they are available, since all hulls in this section of the country have been used. In Wheeler county 128,888 pounds of hulls have been used, while 120,000 pounds of bran have been consumed in the poison mixture.

Distribution of the mixture will begin at Mobeetie, Shamrock and Wheeler Saturday, and will continue until the supply is exhausted.

After a three days' survey of sentiment as to the effect of the hopper poison, Jake Tarter, county agent, shows that farmers believe the hoppers are being killed. Seventy-four percent of the farmers who come in for the mixture call for a certain amount, Tarter said, and with that amount they expect to keep their hoppers under control. Only 26 percent ask for all the mixture they can get, and say the pests will damage their crops badly. Unless they take drastic measures, Tarter stated, about 10 percent of that 24 percent will lose all their crops to grass-

Over the whole county, however, according to Tarter, there will be not over a 5 to 10 percent general damage to crops, if the fight can be continued as it has been carried on.

Wheeler county has done exceptional work in grasshopper extermination, according to R. R. Reppert, state entomologist who was respon-Reppert praised Jake Tarter county farmers for the way in which shouldering their own problem.

Representative Marvin Jones of Texas and Senator William T. Bankhead, Alabama, were instrumental in getting the \$1,000,000 appropriation for the grasshopper poisoning campaign. Bran and other materials used in the fight have come from government storage. The material that has been and will be used will be about 60 percent of what is actually needed to combat the grasshopper plague, Tarter stated.

There is a choice to be made between healing this condition or allowing it to develop to be passed on to future generations as a more acute problem over a larger area." The problem will not be temporary however, the program must be carried on indefinitely in order to make this territory come back and stay back. As it has been pointed out, the plan of letting the land in the dust bowl decline to a desert state would not only endanger the remainder of the country, but would be throwing away immense wealth to be had, and which has been had, through haphazard farming. GENERAL TRAFFIC RULES

The state railroad commission an- notified to be present. nounced last week that safer driving rules must be adhered to by bus drivers, and drivers of certain kinds of trucks. Thirty-seven rules have been laid down, which include inspection 7th day of July, 1937. of the vehicles, qualification of drivers, and manner of driving.

There is no doubt that these rules will do some good, and if they are well-enforced they will be invaluable. But why not make the rules general? Even though drivers of public conveyances have great responsibility, so have private vehicle operators. The percentage of accidents involving private cars is greater than

the percentage of bus and truck acci-

If there are protests that the rules are too strict, it is necessary only to point out the increasing traffic toll in deaths. Rigid inspection of vehicles, and standards of driving safety must be set and enforced if highway tragedies are to decrease. Development of the automobile to the present power and speed, and increasing use of highways make it absolutely essential that something

drastic be done. Until there is nationwide recognition of the need for safety on death lanes of the country, deaths will continue to mount in number. Why not make Texas one of the first states to become known as an unwise place to practice reckless or careless driving? It might be hard on the chamber of commerce, but it certainly would save lives.
