As then stated, only three counties of Texas, embraced by Region 12 of the Farm Security administration, were designated as trial grounds for the program, and Wheeler is one of them.

Largely of an experimental nature, it is believed that with reasonably favorable prospects of eventual success that further expansion will follow. And because it is experimental, only a limited number of loans are provided for at this time. However, if results approach expectations, additional funds will become available the first of next July, beginning of the new fiscal year.




