Alleged Hi-jackers Make Wheeler Call

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Pair Arrested Sunday Night at Shamrock Charged with Oklahoma Crime

Apprehension of two men late Sunday night in and near Shamrock recalled to local parties a brief stay in Wheeler earlier that night by the suspects and a woman companion. Around 11 o'clock Sunday night, the Crump-Mundy Service station was called for tire service by occupants of a car some five miles west of town.

Percy Farmer, station attendant, responded and sold the parties a tire, which they paid for on the spot. Coming on into town, they stopped at the station and purchased gas and oil. Farmer was suspicious of their actions and watched them rather closely.

Hearing their discussion of stoping here for the night, he observed Mrs. Magruder Passes their actions as their circled the square and drove back to the White hotel near the station. Later he saw them going to a nearby cafe.

After registering at the hotel and spending probably an hour puttering around, the men approached Bill White, proprietor, and asked a refund of payment for lodgings, saying they had been hurriedly called to o'clock.

Recent Assurance News of prime importance to people of Wheeler and those living adjacent to the road was released here today by Jim Trout, who reported

assurance was given Monday at a session of the State Highway department in Austin that the present road known as the Oilfield highway or No. 152 will soon be designated as a state highway. The new designation will apply locally to that link of the highway between Wheeler and the Texas-Oklahoma line, east of here.

Some portions of this road have been so listed for quite awhile, including a strip extending westward from the county seat. It is not known at this time if the entire distance will come under the new rule, but such is believed to be the case. Neither has it been revealed just what name or number will be chosen, but it is assumed that No. 152 will be retained.
