County Goes Dry in Saturday's Election

Unofficial Returns Oust Beer by Majority of 72 Votes-Contest Threatens

In a somewhat uneventful election held Saturday on referendum instituted by dry forces to discontinue the legal sale of beer in Wheeler county an unofficial majority of 72 ousting the beverage resulted. This is according to unofficial tabulation of returns as made by F. B. Craig, county clerk, at his offices here in the court house.

Total vote reported for the county is 2,102. Of this number, 1,087 were opposed to the sale of beer and the remaining 1,015 want the county to remain in the wet column.

Official canvass of the vote by the commissioners court is not expected until tomorrow, Friday. The statutes provide that the canvass be made within five days after the election, or as soon thereafter as possible. Because of the contemplated absence of the county judge and some of the commissioners, who had planned to attend an important highway meeting in Oklahoma today, the check-up was postponed a day. It is not believed, however, that results of the canvass will show any material

Nicholson Given Big **Vote in Re-Election**

Wheeler School Board Head Leads Ticket, 111 Out of 119-Howe, Pendleton Win

Almost unanimous endorsement of the administration of Dr. H. E. Nicholson as member and president of the Wheeler Independent School District board is evidenced by returns from Saturday's school election, as reported by H. J. Garrison, member of the body.

Out of a total of 119 votes cast, 111 were for Nicholson who had consented to stand for re-election only after considerable persuasion by some friends and interested supporters of the local school who were thoroughly familiar with his achievements as head of the group for the past two terms.

Melvin Howe and W. O. Pendleton are the other two trustees named of the three to be elected.

The official ballots contained the names of H. E. Nicholson, Melvin and W. F. Wright. In addition to these, returns show three names written in, giving the following re-

Nicholson, 111; Howe, 78; Pendleon, 63; Lamb, 60; Wright, 11; and written in were J. E. Willard, 24, Lee Guthrie, 1, and R. G. Russ, 1.

D. H. Sherwood is the retiring member of the board. Howe and Pendleton replace him and fill a vacancy that had existed for some time. Holdover members are H. J. Garrison, Emmet Herd, Jim Risner and J. W. Barr.

Explaining the meaning of a standardized school, Rucker declares: "A tandardized school means as much to the grade pupils as an accredited school means to the high school

County trustees and teachers organizations have been quite active in the betterment of rural schools and in assisting with programs designed for that purpose.

"Indications now are very favorable," commented Rucker, "that every school in the county will complete its normal term this year. For this much credit is due the splendid co-operation of officials and patrons," he concluded.
