# Official Dry Vote to Smaller Margin

Reduction to Majority of 58 Yet Spells Decisive Doom for Sale of Beer

Official canvass of votes cast in Wheeler county on the question of continued sale of beer within its borders was made by the commissioner's court here Monday. According to this check-up, it was found the majority favoring discontinuance of the sale of beer in Wheeler county was 58, or 14 counters less than the previous unofficial figure of 72.

Discrepancies were found in only two boxes. These were No. 21, one of Shamrock's polling places, with 10 difference, and Box No. 9, Heald, a difference of 4.

Even after this slight reduction is allowed, and about which there is no argument on their part, friends of prohibition feel that results of the election are sufficiently decisive to squelch further controversy on the subject.

Rather definite rumors persist, however, that champions of beer sales plan a contest of the election in hopes of setting it aside or compelling another round at the ballot box. Such action would be in sharp contrast to behavior of the drys nearly four years ago when returns Pampa Attorney to favored sale of beer by a majority only slightly larger than that which rejected it on the second day of this month.

Yet the opponents of beer are not standing idly by. It is known on good authority that should the brew advocates elect to try their strength and schemes through contest channels they will be met with stiff op-

# District Court Has Slow Non-jury Week





The rearmament program of the six most powerful nations of the world, including the United States, does not give us that feeling of security and happiness which accompany peace.

On the contrary, as we view the situation of the world, we find lacking "Sweet peace, the gift of God's love."
