

Home-Making Hints

By MISS VERA MARTIN Home Supervisor, F. S. A.

System in the Kitchen "One of the goals of kitchen planning is to reduce the number of steps necessary in performing routine tasks," according to the Bureau of Home Economics of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. "To accomplish this, modern kitchens are divided into 'work centers.' That is, all the supplies and all the equipment for one kind of kitchen work are grouped together."

In general, there are four work centers in the kitchen-one for food preparation, one for serving, one for cooking and one for dishwashing. Storage spaces should be arranged with reference to the work done at each center.

In a very compact kitchen all of these work centers-except the one for cooking-may be located near the sink. Such an arrangement is illustrated in "Closets and Storage Spaces," Government Bulletin 1865. It consists of a sink, flanked by drainboards that are really smoothsurface work tops. 
