

Thomas M. Potts, who lives 21/2 miles west of Twitty and a resident of Wheeler county for the past 10 years, has authorized announcement of his candidacy for the office of Wheeler county tax assessor and collector, subject to the will of the voters in the Democratic primaries.

Never before having been a candidate for public office, Potts asserts he decided to enter the assessor-collector's race only after talking with a large number of friends over the county. He wishes to make it plain that he is basing his expectations of election solely on his qualifications. Potts has been engaged in the wholesale and retail gasoline and oil business during practically all his residence in the county and his acquaintance is county-wide. His reputation as a citizen and ability as a business man are well known to most of the residents of the county, as his business connections have not been confined wholly to Shamrock, where he maintains commercial headquarters

If elected to the office of tax assessor-collector, Potts promises a business-like administration. He feels that his many years experience in various lines of business qualify him for the place and he promises to perform honestly and efficiently the duties entrusted to his care.

"I do not have a long list of promises of what I will do if elected," said Potts. "I have resided in Wheeler county long enough that most of the voters should know what kind of man I am. I do want to say that if I am honored by election to the office that I will conscientiously strive to serve the public efficiently and honestly. I am going to try and see all the voters personally and ask their support. In the meantime I will appreciate their earnest consideration of my qualifications for the office.'
