New Manager Takes Charge Royal Drug

Messrs. Howe and Britt Dispose of **Business**—Ansel McDowell in Charge

Sale of the Royal Drug store, Wheeler, was made known early this week when Melvin Howe and Buck Britt, partner ownership since late in March of 1934, announced disposal of the property.

In the transaction Ansel McDowell of Shamrock becomes the new manager of the Royal, which will be continued along the lines heretofore prevailing. McDowell, whose former home was at Wellington, has been connected with the drug business in Shamrock during the past two years. He was first associated with the Corner drug there and more recently the Tindall Drug Co.

Altogether he has had some 16 years experience in that vocation and is a registered pharmacist.

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McDowell is a married man, the family consisting of himself, his wife and a 7-year-old son. The young man is in school at Shamrock. They expect to move to Wheeler in the near future or as soon as suitable living accommodations can be found.

With a pleasing personality and happy faculty of meeting the public, the new manager is agreeable to meet and should easily attract a following pointing to success in his venture here.

Glen Render, capable assistant at the drug store for an extended period, will continue in his present capacity.

SNOWSTORM KILLS FISH -ASSERTS LOCAL MAN

Vagaries of a spring snowstorm are too well-known and numerous to permit listing here. But this writer heard a new one yesterday attributed to the whing-dinger of two weeks ago. W. O. Miller, farmer living northeast of town, declared in all apparent seriousness that the blizzard killed fish in his pond. At least, he says, a few days afterward he found a number of dead carp and a few perch washed up on the pond margin and about the spillway. The only solution he offers is that the fish were smothered. During the storm huge quantities of snow swirled into the waters, forming a dense icy mush that is presumed to have depleted the supply of air to such an extent that the finny tribe actually could not breathe. Highway East Now District Candidate Part State System

Statement by Harry Hines Gives Confirmation-Official **Order Expected**

Elation was registered yesterday by Wheeler citizens and others concerned in the development of the highway east from this place to the state line and on which much effort has been centered to secure its designation as a portion of the state highway system, when practical confirmation of that fact was received here.

That this goal has been achieved is confirmed in a letter received by County Judge W. O. Puett from Harry Hines, member of the State Highway commission. Written from Dallas under date of April 20, the letter reads:

Judge W. O. Puett Wheeler, Texas

'Dear Judge Puett:

"Reference our correspondence in the past on the highway from Wheeler east to the Oklahoma state line, it gives me great pleasure to advise that the commission on yesterday passed an order adding this highway to the state system.

"I know this will be gratifying to you and I will appreciate it if you will so advise those interested parties.

"Assuring you it was a pleasure to have had the opportunity to be of service to you and your good people, and with kind regards, I remain "Sincerely

"HARRY HINES."

In view of the foregoing statement by a member of the highway commission, there is now no further doubt as to the status of the strip of road from this town east to the state line. While information to that effect has not as yet been received, there is every reason to assume that it will be known henceforth as Highway No. 152.

Mobeetie Finally Receives Award of Hard-Surfaced Feeder Highway

Information of a highly welcome nature was received early this week when it became known that the contract had been let for improvement of the feeder road between New Mobeetie and Highway 152.

Under the list of highway improvements by counties as announced from considerable discouragement. Austin, specifications on this project are as follows:

1.4 miles of grading, drainage structures, flexible base and double asphalt surface treatment on feeder highway from New Mobeetie to Highway 152. Sam Leal, jr., Fort Worth, contractor; cost of improvement, \$16,267.


