Downs, and children. tribution dollar for dollar, but under the proposed Connally bill the federal government would contribute a little more than two dollars for every dollar contributed by the Texas legislature. In other words, a \$45 Texas pension payment would be possible by the state contributing about \$15 and the federal govern-

ment contributing the remainder. Heretofore the combined contributions of the federal and Texas governments have totaled a little less than \$14, but with the same state contribution the total would be \$22.50 under the Connally bill. Under recent enactments of the Texas legislature, if funds are available, the monthly payments from federal and state funds would amount to \$18.50, but under the Connally bill, with the same state contribution, the monthly payments would amount to \$27.75.

Senator Connally's bill was approved in a recent senate hearing by Dr. A. J. Altmeyer, the chairman of the Social Security board. The present bill has been worked out by the joint efforts of Senator Connally and the legal staff of the Social Security board.

Senator Connally's bill has been referred to the finance committee, of which Connally himself is a high ranking member.

NEW VERSION PUTS FIRST FROST AT LATER DATE

During a visit at this office Saturday, Arnold Sonntag, shrewd and observant young farmer of the Briscoe community, imparted some information new to The Times regarding the "first norther and first frost" legend of this region. Sonntag explained his understanding of the "sign" was as follows: 90 days after the first norther in August or 60 days after the first one in September fixed the date when frost might be expected. He said that last year (which doesn't often happen) the first norther came on the same date in each month and frost fol-

lowed on schedule, Nov. 9. This season, Sonntag said, the first one in August was on the 7th and the first in September on the 11th, and he's a little curious to see which date will prevail. He has concluded, however, that the first killing frost may be expected between Nov. 7 and 11.

Here's hoping this genial citizen is correct and that cotton and other as yet immature crops may have the 30-day respite beyond Oct. 11, the date recently mentioned by The Times as a first frost possibility.

A brief message received this week from Bill Owen, former Wheeler citizen who recently moved to California and obtained a mechanical position in the Lockheed-Vega aircraft plant at Burbank, says: "I have finally found a place to call home; it sure is a problem here. We sure miss our many fine friends we left behind. The people here as a whole are so different from the average Texas people: too many 'foreigners,' as we would call them.

"I am sending you two articles of news that may be worth passing on. You are all right if you happen to be one of the 40 per cent mentioned.

One of the clippings reads as fol-

"They call it 'Boom Town' in the East and toward it races every unemployed hopeful, young and old, to share in the vast wealth that awaits. But the tale's a sad one, and a very grave one, too, that presents a serauthorities.

"The root of the trouble lies in the fact that a good 50 per cent of the newcomers fail to find the 'El Dorado' they so innocently expected in spite of the constant demand for skilled mechanics.
