District Court Will End Term Saturday

Grand Jury Discharged Yesterday After Submitting Report-Whole Week Short

Following discharge of the grand jury yesterday afternoon after submitting its report, Judge W. R. Ewing, presiding in the November term of district court here, announced the term will end Saturday, one whole week short of the customary seven-weeks term. The petit jury was discharged Tuesday for the remainder of the week.

The trial of John Emler, charged with theft of certain welding equipment, occupied most of the time Monday and Tuesday. After due deliberation, the jury returned a verdict of guilty, fixing punishment at two years in the penitentiary. Defense counsel has declared intention of asking a new trial, and failing in that, expects to appeal the case.

WE MUST WIN THIS WAR!

The United States is squarely faced with the worst peril in its history.

More is at stake than victory in a war. This is one war the United States cannot lose and still survive. The fate of this nation is hinged upon the outcome. More than that, upon victory very likely will depend the fate of the white race. It cannot be supposed for an instant that a victorious Japan would permit the white race any position in world affairs except one of degradation.

The feeling that unquestionably prevails in the United States at the outset is one of utmost confidence. Perhaps there is too much confidence. The typical American mind will not conceive the possibility of defeat. This feeling is, of course, to be desired. But it is one which should cause our entire nation to reflect that the Japs also must be confident. Nations don't start wars they don't expect to win.

What the future may hold in store in the struggle is something wholly beyond reliable prediction. could prove to be a short war. More likely it will be prolonged. That, at least, must be the assumption of this nation. It must be prepared for a long and bitter struggle which eventually may resolve itself into a seige of the Japanese islands. From that sort of a defensive position the struggle almost indefinitely. Doubtless they have the supplies to eke out for a long time even if a complete tablished.

This is almost sure to be a war in which far greater sacrifices will be on to make. Undoubtedly they will tain our independence. would impair the defense effort in any other manner, they must be

Here are three favorite recipes recommended by Miss Chance. Famous Old Fruit Cake

1 lb. grapefruit peel or citron, 1 lb. pecans or black walnuts, 1 lb. candied pineapple, 1 lb. candied red watermelon rind or cherries, 3 lbs. doing his duty. seeded raisins, 11/2 lbs. figs or currants, ½ lb. butter, ½ lb. brown trying to save. sugar, 1/2 cup fruit juice or sweet pickle syrup, 6 eggs, 1 lb. flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. cloves, 1 tbsp. nutmeg, ¼ tsp. allspice, ½ tsp. salt.



Fire Defense Network to Cover Whole State

Fire Insurance Commissioner Plans Huge Defense Program with Citizen Volunteers

This fire defense organization will be based upon official agencies. Specific plans will be made for the and also observe that not a boy or enrollment of citizens as volunteers in this service. Enlistment will be definite, and all those taken in this defense service will be assigned specific tasks.

Coordinator Hall announces that under the state fire defense mobilization plan, 26 districts are being created, each supervised by a district coordinator. All the district coordinators now have been designated, the state official announced, and are functioning.

Fitting into the entire state civilian protection defense program, definite responsibility is placed upon Lee Hardware, Crump-Mundy Service the fire department officials of cities County judges are county coordinators for the entire program, outside city limits, and mayors are coordinators of all phases of the activity within the cities. Fire chiefs will serve as city, and in most cases, county fire defense coordinators.

For the fire defense program, Hall announced local volunteer offices will be organized; and the local and county coordinators will call for the enrollment of all citizens, who will be assigned their various tasks. From this source will come the men Meadows. Angels—Delores Ledbetfor fire defense work under the supervision of the local fire chiefs, as fire defense coordinators

When separate fire defense activities are set up outside city limits, in some cases the city fire chiefs will be given responsibility for county-wide fire defense coordination. In some cases, specific appointment will be made of separate county fire defense coordinators.

A separate service, the air raid warden service, is under supervision of the police officers. It will work in cooperation with the fire defense service. The fire defense officials, at the request of the police coordinator. will carry out certain instructional work in fire-defense and first aid, but otherwise the air raid warden
