

Architect recommends off-site nursing facility

Healthcare specialists recommended Thursday that the Muleshoe Area Hospital District build its proposed new nursing home on a separate site.

Architect Larry Wayne Douglas of Arlington told the hospital district board that an off-site facility would be most cost effective.

Douglas said it would be less expensive to build a proposed 80-90 bed nursing home at a

separate site from the hospital. He also said it would allow the hospital district to run a more cost-efficient operation.

The City of Muleshoe has offered to donate land in the new city park to the hospital to build a new facility.

The hospital board began discussions last fall about building a new nursing home to replace the aging Muleshoe Area Healthcare Center. The

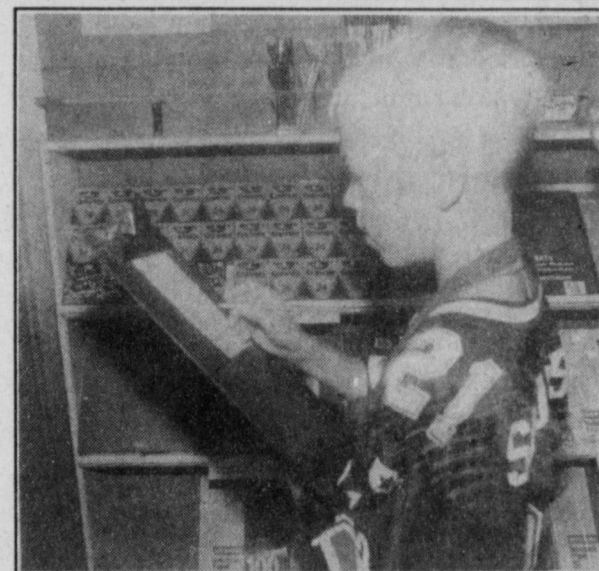
proposal also includes room for a 20-bed Alzheimer's unit. Also being considered is building an on-site facility.

"What the board continues to do is explore its options of building a replacement facility for the nursing home that would meet the needs of the residents, be efficient to operate, and be an asset to the community," Muleshoe hospital district administrator Jim Bone said.

He said his gut feeling is that the five-member hospital board would decide in the next month or two whether the district would go ahead with the project.

Douglas and Larry McDonnell, owner of McDonnell Construction, Inc. of Fort Worth, said the cost of removing current buildings and

Corn cobs and cop cars

PITTSBURGH (Reuters) — Police in western Pennsylvania have established an undercover buggy patrol to help Amish residents cope with a series of attacks from outsiders, officials said Wednesday.

There have been four recent incidents in or near Indiana County, an area that is home to about 450 Amish people, said Franklin Duddy, a detective for the Indiana County district attorney's office.

The Amish are an insulated religious sect that does not use electricity, cars or other modern conveniences, living instead in an 18th century-style life. They generally travel in horse-drawn buggies.

About three weeks ago, a buggy was slashed with a knife while it was parked in the owner's yard. Last month, two buggies were set on fire and on the same night as one of the fires, a motorist threw a corn cob and struck an Amish man who was driving a buggy.

Duddy said no one was seriously hurt in any of the incidents.

He said police drove buggies once before, in 1997 after an Amish man was blinded in one eye when a corn cob was thrown at him.

"I talked to the Amish people and they said after we began the buggy patrol, the incidents stopped," he said.

Duddy said police will drive the buggies and also will ride in the back seats with Amish drivers and when an incident occurs, radio ahead to patrol cars hidden in nearby fields and woods.

GOP readies \$4 billion in drought aid

WASHINGTON — U.S. House Agriculture Committee vice chairman Larry Combest (R-Texas) said almost \$4 billion in crop loss and market loss assistance will be delivered through advancing an additional 29 percent of their 1998 transition payments and disaster funds in a package that House and Senate will complete perhaps as early as next Friday.

"As soon as next week, Congress could pass the disaster aid, and the more quickly the president signs the package, the more quickly USDA will deliver this critical aid to farmers. Producers are hurting in a double squeeze of failed crops and low prices that is rarely seen in the same year," Combest said.

The package includes \$2.25 billion in for crop disaster losses:

- \$1.5 billion to assist producers who have been hit by crop losses in 1998.
- An additional \$675 million to provide assistance to producers who have suffered multiple-year crop losses.
- \$75 million to implement a livestock feed

MISD receives actual figures of TIF funding

The Five Area Communities Telecommunications (FACT) Consortium learned it will receive a \$1 million grant from a Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board Discovery Grant to install an interactive television network in the member districts.

The FACT Consortium districts, which are all served by the Five Area/West Plains Telephone Company, are Lazbuddie, Muleshoe, Olton, Springlake-Earth, Sudan, and Three-Way. South Plains College in Levelland is also a member of FACT, but already has in place an interactive television classroom.

Muleshoe superintendent Bill Moore, who serves as the fiscal agent for the Consortium, said, "This grant will allow us to complete a network that will be of tremendous benefit to the students, staff and citizens of all of the member communities. The fact that they asked us to reduce the amount some is not going to impact the 'meat' of the project at all."

Once operational, each school district will have installed a fully interactive television classroom which means that people in all districts will be able to see and hear each other simultaneously. High schools will be able to offer classes that currently cannot be offered because of limited enrollments.

For example, none of the member schools currently offer French, but if there are enough students combined in all six districts to fill a class, French can be taught over the network. Students will also have access to college

Muleshoe wins sixth-straight in 51-0 blowout

■ McClanahan runs, passes for 6 TDs

BROWNFIELD — The Brownfield Cubs stacked eight men within three yards of the line of scrimmage and dared someone besides Gilbert Vela to beat them.

Muleshoe senior quarterback Matt McClanahan obliged.

McClanahan tortured the Cubs for 294 yards of total offense and accounted for six touchdowns as Muleshoe won its sixth-straight game Friday by hammering the toothless Cubs 51-0.

Muleshoe (3-0) also extended its shutout string to three games by limiting winless Brownfield (0-3) to 60 yards and forcing three turnovers.

In the process, Vela had his

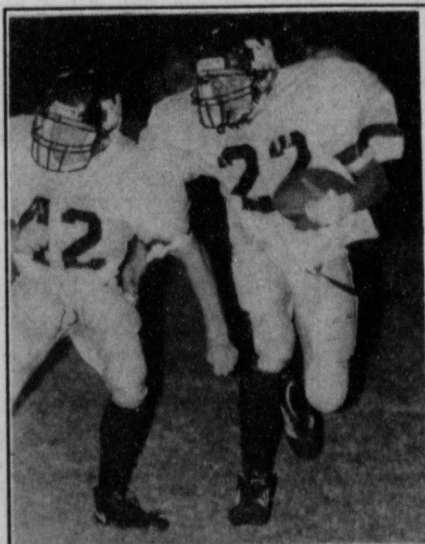
string of seven-straight 100-yard games halted. The spunky senior running back finished with 63 hard-earned yards on 13 carries.

"This team is unselfish and that's what the game is all about," Muleshoe head coach David Wood said. "They came out determined to take away Gilbert and we knew that would open up something else."

That something else resulted in a career night for McClanahan.

McClanahan rushed for 156 yards and three touchdowns on nine carries and completed 5 of 9 passes for 138 yards and three more scores. He led Muleshoe to a season-high 473 yards of offense.

"Matt stepped it up big time,"

Wood said. "I told him earlier in the week that he might be due for a game like this and he handled it

well. He didn't get nervous and just played his game."

Led by linebackers Greg Pena and Mitch Mason, the Mules' defense handcuffed Brownfield. The Cubs finished with just 16 yards and one first down in the second half — on their final drive of the game.

Pena had two sacks and led a pass rush that had Brownfield quarterback Chris Gonzales on the run — and often on his back — most of the night. Gonzales completed his first pass of the game, a 31-yarder. He didn't complete another pass the rest of the game and finished just 1 of 8.

coursework, and upon completion will receive both high school and college credit.

"This translates into tuition money saved by the parents" Moore said as he recently addressed the TIF Board as it met in Muleshoe last Friday. By removing the barriers of time and distance, we can offer to our students the same opportunities that students in urban and

suburban districts already have," he continued.

The network will also be available for school staffs to do staff development activities or to take additional college coursework. This may lead to advanced college degrees or additional certification for teachers or teachers aides. Community groups or individuals will also benefit from the same availability of college

courses or training opportunities.

Work on the installation will take place during the spring and summer of 1999. It is hoped that the network will be operational by the start of school next fall.

"This project is going to require our districts and communities to work together more closely than ever before," Moore said. "We will need for

the school calendars in each district and the high school class schedules to be as similar as possible. There is a lot of work yet to be done, but the benefits to our communities will be tremendous."

Created in 1995 by the Texas Legislature, the TIF Board is charged with distributing \$1.5 billion in grants and loans to assist in developing telecommunications capabilities in public schools, not-for-profit healthcare providers, higher education institutions, and public libraries. Prior to receiving this Discovery Grant, some individual districts and area libraries have benefited from receiving other TIF grants. They are: Three Way ISD, Lazbuddie ISD, Springlake-Earth ISD, Olton ISD, Olton Branch Library, and Muleshoe Area Public Library.

The FACT Consortium had applied for funds totaling \$1.9 million, but in a meeting with the TIF staff Monday learned that the Discovery Grants would be capped at \$1 million.

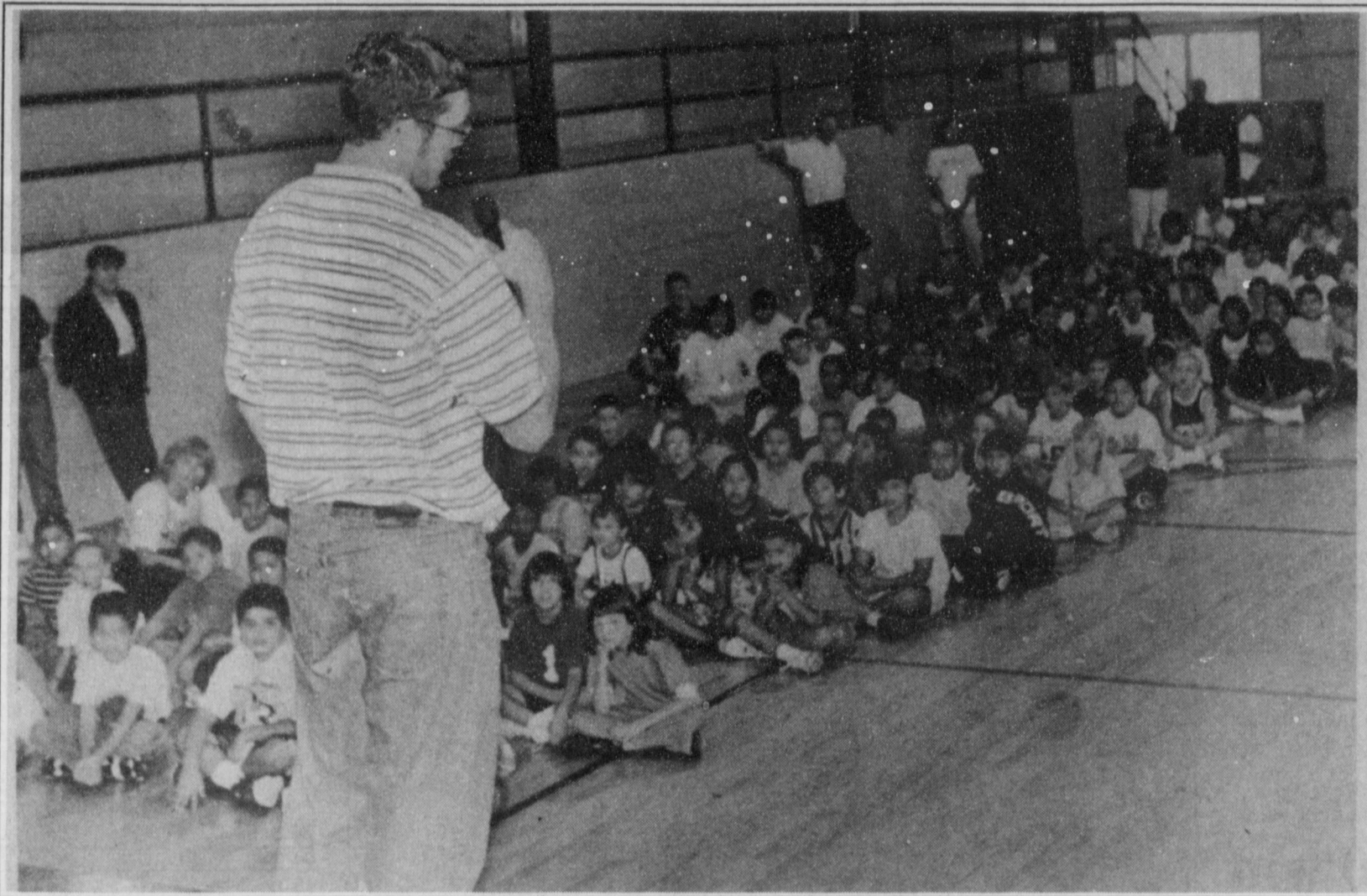

For seven days they sit viewing the not-yet-dead body of their friend, and then they undertake a premature *post mortem* of his trouble.

They speak. They shouldn't have. These "miserable comforters" begin to debate the man they'd come to console. The questions is, "Why do the righteous suffer?" Their quick

Maybe Job's original friends had some excuse for their folly, but their modern counterparts who can read the New Testament should know better. They should hear Paul telling persecuted believers, "We did not want any of you to lose heart at the troubles you were going through, but to realize that we Christians must expect such things." Or they should simply look at the cross and see what the world did to the best man who ever lived.

A time of trouble is a good time to pray for stronger faith. And any time is a good time for humble self-examination. But when trouble comes, don't pay too much attention to Job's friends.

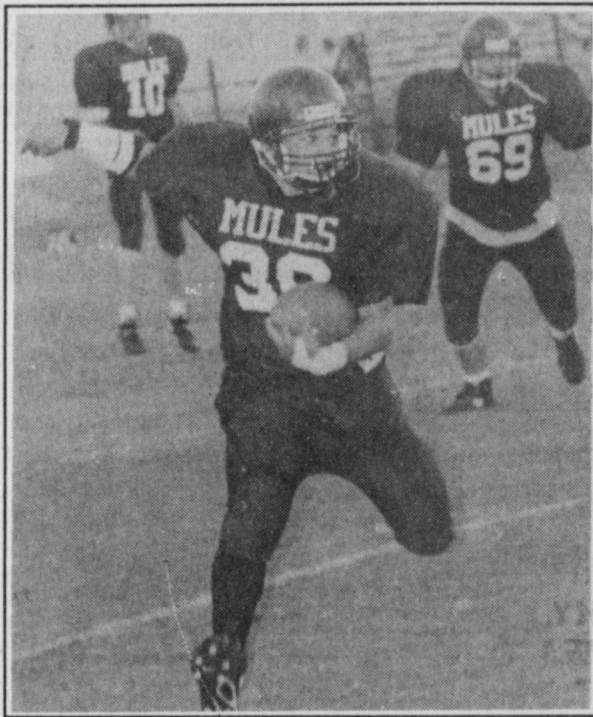
Lewis completed the scoring with a two-yard dive in a time-shortened second half.

ended Brownfield's threat late in the first half at the Muleshoe 25. One play earlier, Stephen Walker intercepted McClanahan interception and his 35-yard return set up the Cubs at the Muleshoe 37 with 25 seconds left in the second quarter.

Now in his third-year as a starter, McClanahan paced a second-quarter assault that produced three touchdowns in a span of six minutes.

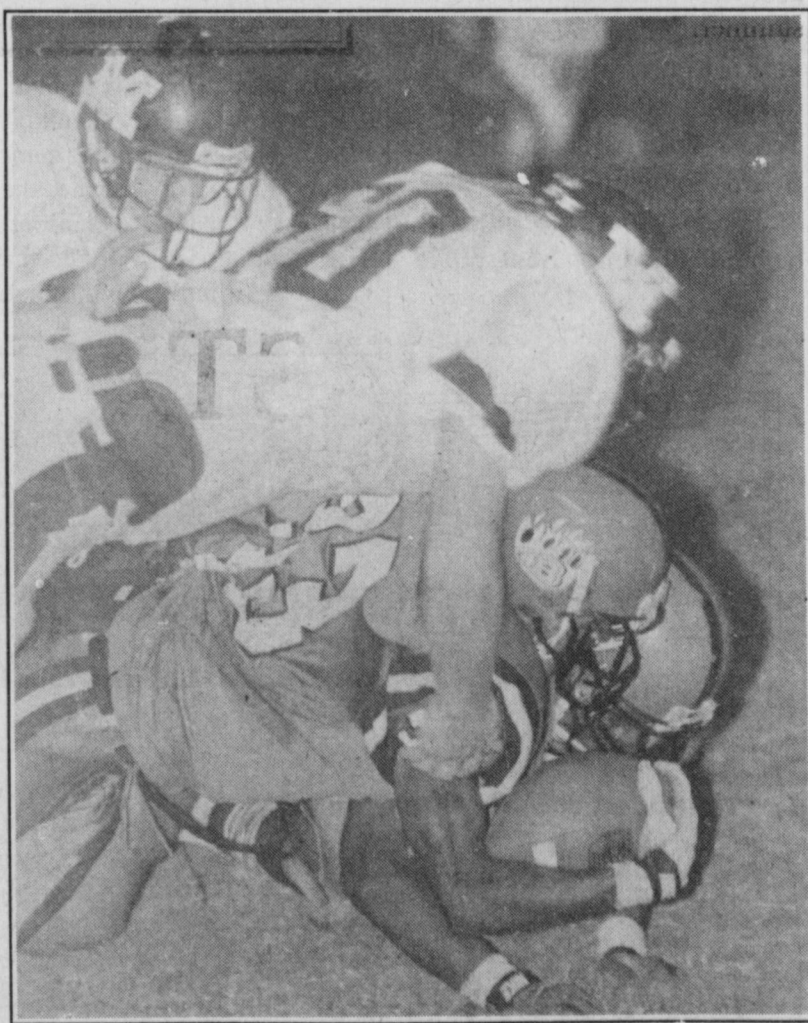
McClanahan lofted a 43-yard scoring strike to Vela to complete a one-play drive and three minutes later zipped 66 yards through the heart of the Brownfield defense to give Muleshoe a 25-0 lead with five minutes left in the first half.

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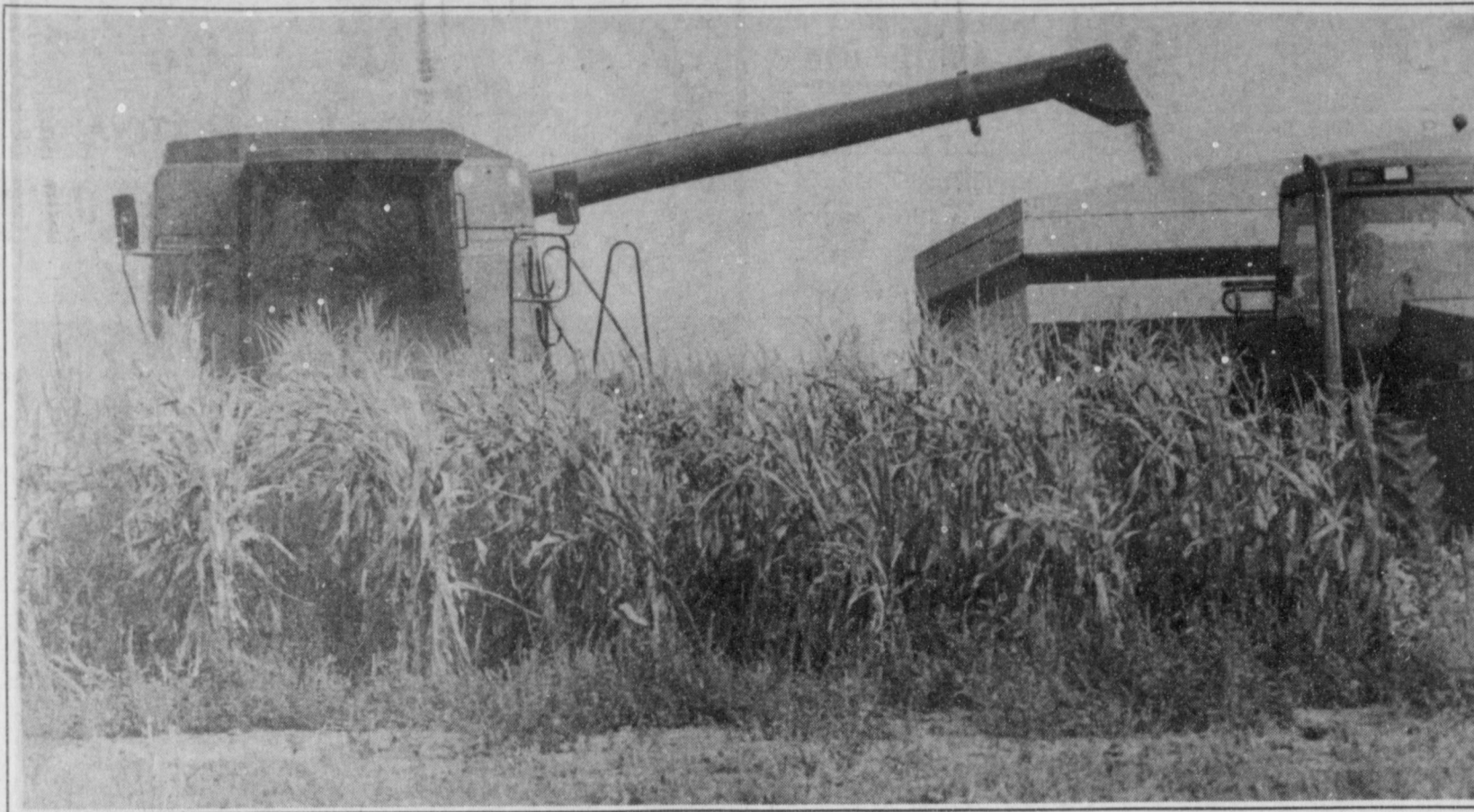

Recent rains lift prospects for fall hunting

AUSTIN — While recent rainfall cannot undo the damage done by drought to this year's wildlife production, Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPW) biologists are reporting conditions and prospects across much of the state are looking better for the upcoming hunting seasons.

"We're seeing some encouraging signs," said Dr. Gary Graham, TPW Wildlife Division director. "Areas with rain have produced a 'flush of green' not normal for this time of year, particularly in South Texas, where it looks like spring."

Based on recent field census, TPW biologists are suggesting the following general outlook for the upcoming 1998-99 hunting seasons in Texas.

WHITE-TAILED DEER

Statewide: No die-offs reported anywhere in Texas at this time. Fawn production is at or slightly below normal statewide, but survival expectation into the fall is optimistic, particularly in the southern Edwards Plateau region where rains have sparked food supplies. Acorns are developing well through out their range, which may also help fall survival.

Hunting may be tough early in the season due to fresh green-up.

Success should be slightly below normal for the state and antler prospects are normal.

Exceptions: Body condition of adult deer is improving in certain parts of the Trans Pecos and the Panhandle regions. Good antler quality in the eastern portion of the Edwards Plateau, the Rolling Plains and Cross Timbers regions. Acorns are poor in many parts of the Pineywoods and antler development is below normal, except in the southern part of the region.

DESERT MULE DEER

Statewide: Antler development should parallel last year and fawn production should be about the same. The long-term drought in Trans-Pecos (6th year) has already impacted these populations so little change was experienced in this year's drought. Few antlerless permits will be issued. However, there should be no appreciable change in hunter success from last year.

Exceptions: Antler development and body weights were expected to be below normal in Panhandle, although range con-

ditions in the northern counties continue to improve. Terrell and Pecos counties have received a majority of the rain in the Trans Pecos and deer body conditions are expected to improve.

QUAIL

Statewide: Reproduction should be spotty at best (i.e., mostly in deeper/finer textured soils or where there was rainfall this past spring).

Exceptions: Good over-winter survival 1997-98 in the Cross Timbers where numbers look good, Panhandle and Trans-Pecos will provide fair hunting early in the season. Success should be slightly below normal for these areas. Line surveys in the Rolling Plains report the highest numbers of scaled quail in this region since 1993. Quail production is exceptionally poor in the Pineywoods. Quail broods are small though generally distributed in South Texas. The Coastal Sand Plains and along the Coastal Plains are producing good numbers where properties are being managed for quail.

TURKEY

Statewide: Reproduction should be spotty at best (i.e.,

mostly in deeper/finer textured soils or where there was rainfall this past spring). Hens are reported to already be flocking for fall. However, there should be abundant adult birds because of the good hatch last year. Hunter success should be normal/slightly below normal in fall, maybe average to above average in spring.

Exceptions: Reproduction is poorest in Trans-Pecos, Rolling Plains and Cross Timbers for Rio Grande turkeys. Reproduction is best in the Pineywoods for Eastern Wild Turkey (primarily because of the drought fewer nests than normal were flooded).

PHEASANTS

Statewide: Call counts are expected to be good in the Northern Panhandle and along the Coastal Prairie. Hunter suc-

cess is expected to be normal to slightly above normal.

Exceptions: Central and Southern Panhandle has had poor reproduction and poor adult survival. Hunter prospects will be below normal in this region.

Javelina

Statewide: Populations are stable. No expected change in hunter success over last year.

Panhandle: Probably poorest in areas west of Lubbock because of extreme drought. Northeastern counties should be same as last year because of periodic showers throughout summer.

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Hunter Education course offered

LEVELLAND — A three-day Texas Hunter Education course is scheduled Sept. 21, 22 and 24 at South Plains College.

Classes will meet 6-10 p.m. nightly in the SPC Science-Agriculture Building, room 153. Cost is \$10 a person. A minimum of 10 persons is required for enrollment.

The course will be team-taught by certified volunteer instructors Joel McKinney, SPC associate professor of biology, and Rick Monger from Sundown.

Topics will include hunting rules and regulations, ethics and responsibilities, wildlife conservation, modern and primitive sporting arms and ammunition, safe firearms handling and storage, outdoor survival and first aid.

Persons age 17 and older who wish to hunt in the state of Texas must successfully complete a hunter education course, McKinney noted. Persons 12-16 must successfully complete the course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Persons under 12 must be accompanied by a licensed hunter age 17 or older.

An additional class is scheduled Nov. 2, 3, and 5. For more information, contact McKinney at SPC, 806-894-9611, ext. 2308.

New technology assists in solving old murder case

The testing which led to a break in the 1984 homicide of Lauren McCarty was done by the Department of Public Safety Crime Lab, utilizing a new technique called Short Tandem Repeat (STR).

This new technique, which the DPS just began using only two weeks ago, allows DNA analysts to profile samples that are minute and degraded. In the

past, older biological samples were not sufficient to yield DNA profiles.

The DPS Headquarters in Austin has three of the machines, with the others located in DPS field laboratories in Garland, Lubbock, Houston, Waco, El Paso, McAllen and Corpus Christi.

"This is the first laboratory report in a homicide case lead-

ing to an arrest since we implemented this new STR technology," said Pat Johnson, DPS Field Crime Lab Manager said Tuesday. "We'd like to encourage any other Texas law enforcement agencies with unsolved cases where there is older biological evidence to revisit their cases for submission or resubmission to the DPS."
