## **Red Cross Program** to Assist Defense

Large Enrollment Needed to Make Practical Work with Armed Forces Possible

Reports from adult Red Cross roll call workers are too incomplete at this time to warrant other than a general statement, C. J. Meek, chapter roll call chairman, announced today, adding that no figures are available as yet. Prospects are very encouraging as to success of the drive, he continued.

Pointing out that only slightly more than a week's time remains of the roll call period, Meek urges all workers to devote their utmost efforts toward its successful conclusion at the earliest possible moment. His earnest desire is a thorough canvass of the area, giving Popular Pastor Assigned to Fourth everyone an opportunity to assist with this highly important program.

Junior Roll Call Report According to Mrs. R. Wm. Brown, junior roll call chairman for Wheeler chapter, excellent progress is being made with the young folks. This is the first year for adult and junior registration to be handled simultaneously, and success of the undertaking is highly gratifying.



#### POLITICS VS. GOVERNMENT

The fact that government nondefense spending is holding to depression levels at a time when employment and national income are approaching record highs, is a biting reflection on congress.

It will be remembered that Secretary Morgenthau said some months ago that the normal cost of government could be cut by a billion dollars a year. Other authorities have estimated that reductions of two billions or more are possible and practical.

The difference between government non-defense economy and continued prodigality, may prove to be the difference between a solvent and a bankrupt government in the future. Is congress so preoccupied with "good politics" that it has totally forgotten the meaning and the obligations of "good government?"





# Newspaper Advertising Leads the Field

Despite the appearance of other advertising media, the newspaper remains the most productive channel whereby industry can reach the buying public-and industry is fully aware of that fact.

A recent survey well illustrates the sustained popularity of newspapers among advertisers. The survey was made by four national associations serving chain stores and covered 138 representative systems operating more than 33,000 stores, coast-to-coast, and having annual sales well in excess of \$3,000,000,000.

During the typical year covered by the survey, these companies spent more than \$55,000,000 for advertising, an average of \$1,754 per store. Almost 58% of the money was spent with newspapers. A little less than 10% was spent on handbills and similar printed matter, much of which was produced in local newspaper plants. Only 4.30% was spent for radio,

with the balance made up of expenditures on miscellaneous media.

Breaking the figures down, it was found that drug chains spent 82.24% of their advertising dollar with newspapers, grocery chains spent 56.53% and general merchandise and variety stores spent 51.35%.
