Mustangs & Bremond In State Finals

"Wheeler, town of friendship and pride."

The long road to the state championship in Class A football ends in Shotwell Stadium in Abilene Saturday night and two teams have survived a grueling 15 weeks to reach this milestone.

At 7:30, the Wheeler Mustangs and the Bremond Tigers will face each other and the coveted state crown will belong to one of them about two hours later. Both teams want it but only one will experience the joy of receiving it.

The Mustangs, now 12-2, knocked off the state's number one team, Munday, last week in one semifinal game and the Tigers whipped Teneha, 45-43 in the other semifinal clash. Bremond will bring a 14-1 record to the championship game.

Bremond and Wheeler both are used to playoff action so neither can have the advantage from that side of the picture but one cannot help but think back to Coach Smith's comments about and maybe, just maybe, the Mustangs claim some advantage.

"We saw Bremond play Teneha Saturday night and they are good," Smith said. Where the Mustangs really only had to stop one running back against Munday, they will be faced with two equally good running backs this week in the persons of Bobby Scott and Charles Bailey.

"Both of these kids can run and are tough to bring down and they have a big quarterback that runs some and can wing that football," Smith went on to say.

Toughness has been a Mustang trait all year and this could certainly work in the Mustangs favor and you can bet that the Tigers toughness will be checked early in the game.

Weather has certainly hampered the Mustangs preparations for this big game with all of their practices to date having been indoors following the snowstorm of last weekend. Cold temperature at game time could be another factor in the Mustangs favor.

It has been eight long years since the Mustangs have reached this pinnacle in football after playing in this contest in '77, '78 and '79. State championships were won in '77 and '79 with Preston Smith coaching the '77 club.

A big concern of the coaching staff this week is that the Mustangs don't lose any of that "being up" for this game after playing in a very emotional game against Munday. "We've whipped Munday, let's forget them and think nothing but Bremond and winning the state championship," Smith said.

Fifteen weeks ago, not many people tuned to Panhandle football thought that the Mustangs would even win their district, much less play for all

Mustangs Kayo "#1" Team In State

The Munday monkey is no longer on the Wheeler Mustangs back and oh boy, those Mustangs did it convincingly last Friday night in Vernon! Before an announced crowd of 5,500, the Mustangs laid to rest the Mogul hex to the tune of 18-0. The win propelled the Mustangs into the state finals this week against the Bremond Tigers.

After two heart breaking losses to

the Moguls in '84 and '85, one had to wonder if the Mustangs could handle the number one team in Class A but after just five plays into the game, you had the good feeling that this was the year.

The "over achievers", as Coach Preston Smith fondly calls this year's Mustangs just proceeded to whip the Moguls from the opening kickoff to the final gun and the Mustangs no

doubt played their most complete game of the year in doing so.

Headly play calling helped the Mustangs score the game's opening TD as Wheeler took the opening kickoff and five plays and 71 yards the Mustangs threw the first shovel on the Moguls grave. Munday held Grayson Benson to 3 yards on the game's first play from scrimmage but then the Mustangs got yardage in big chunks.

Certainly not looking for the pass, Munday got hit with a pass completion from Shawn Bradstreet to Kyle Sword for 29 yards on second down and then tailback Bubba Smith rambled for 15 and another first down on the Munday 24. Smith got 4 to the 20 and here comes Shane Guest on a wingback reverse around his left end to go into the end zone standing up after a clearing block by Chad Bentley and Mustang fans erupted.

Coach Smith said before the game that defense wins most games at this point in the year and he was proved to be a good sage as the Mustangs knew that they had to stop Anthony Stinnett to win and they did. Stinnett was a threat every time he touched the ball but the Mustangs had his mail read and held the explosive back to just 82 yards in 32 carries.

The Mustangs never lost their momentum offensively or defensively and really put the pressure to Munday in the second quarter when they put another 12 points on the scoreboard to lead 18-0 at halftime and if Don Meredith had been at the game, he probably would have starting singing, "Turn out the lights, the party is over".

Following a short 19 yard punt by Stinnett to the Wheeler 44 with 9:45 to

play in the half, Wheeler headed goalward for their second trip into the Moguls end zone.

On second down, Bradstreet threw a perfect toss to Justin Hughes, who made a great catch and was downed on the Munday 19. The pass play covered 36 big yards and three plays later the Mustangs scored. Smith got 16 in two carries down to the Mogul 3 and from there, Benson fought the final three yards into the end zone off his left guard.

Munday drove with the ensuing kickoff to the Wheeler 38 where they lost the pigskin on downs with just 3:42 to play. The Mustangs pulled the covers off their passing game again on the drive. Facing second and two from the Munday 39, a screen pass to Smith from Bradstreet netted 14 and another first down was chalked up on a couple of running plays that put the ball on the 11 with only 51 ticks remaining on the clock.

Starting out on what appeared to be a sweep, Smith slowed up and tossed the halfback pass to David Jones and the senior tight end snagged the ball for what was to be the game's final TD.

Munday never gave up but the hill

Sheriff Investigates Murder

A 33-year-old drifter is being held in the Elk City, Okla., jail. Richard Lee Woodard is charged in the death of his brother-in-law. The murder is believed to have taken place in a trailer home eight miles east of Wheeler on Highway 152.

Dale Duessler, 37, was shot on Monday, December 7, and driven to Lake Skipout near Reydon, Okla. The body was found in a burned 1974 Chevrolet Tuesday morning.

According to Sheriff Miller, the body was burned beyond recognition and was taken to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation laboratory for examination. Duessler was determined to have died of gunshot wounds to the stomach.

Woodard was to have been extradited to Wheeler County Monday for grand jury, but the jury was cancelled because of the weather. Woodard is being held in Beckham County on a forgery charge; he was arrested on Thursday, December 10, and being held on a \$100,000 bond on the forgery charge.

Woodard confessed to the Wheeler County shooting during the interrogation by Elk City police on the forgery charge.

Woodard's wife and Duessler's girlfriend related the shooting to Elk City police. Both are being held in Wheeler County Jail as material witnesses.

An investigation of the shooting scene resulted in the recovery of a double-barreled shotgun, which is believed to be the murder weapon. Woodard and Duessler moved in the trailer house on December 5, two days before the shooting.

Grand jury was rescheduled for Wednesday, December 16.

SNOW STORM HITS WHEELER

Winter came to Wheeler and the area Saturday and continued through Monday. The storm resulted in 12-14 inches of snow in the Wheeler area and the closing of schools across the

panhandle. Wheeler county schools were closed Monday and Tuesday. Wheeler students returned to class Wednesday, but buses did not make their routes.

Temperatures reached near the 0 mark in the early morning Tuesday. The sky cleared and the temperature dropped. The temperature showed to be 7 degrees at 8 a.m. Warmer temperatures Tuesdays allowed the highways in the area to be cleared of the ice and snow.

Drifting was heavy. The fine snow first started falling and quite a bit of melting was taking place Sunday, but the melting stopped and the winds caused heavy drifting. Drifting continued Monday.

Traveling was dangerous, as the blowing snow produced areas of zero visibility. Numerous vehicles were abandoned along the roadways after the drivers lost control and went into drifts or the 'bar ditch'.

Traffic Accidents

Two separate accidents resulted in the transporting of two county residents to Amarillo in 4-wheel drive vehicles for treatment of facial injuries. Leonard "Skeeter" Powledge, Jr. and Mike Goad, both of Briscoe, were injured in a head-on accident Monday near Allison. Both pickups were traveling at a slow rate of speed. It took 30 minutes before help could reach the victims. They were loaded into another pickup and taken to Briscoe with the Highway maintenance trucks and other heavy equipment clearing the road ahead. The Wheeler Ambulance was escorted by a wrecker to Briscoe to bring the injured to Parkview Hospital, where both were admitted. The injured men were in the

same pickup; the driver of the other pickup escaped injury.

Powledge was taken by private vehicle to Amarillo Tuesday afternoon. His injuries involved the nose and area of the left eye.

Kim Hathaway was injured in a car

truck accident in the 200 block of West Oklahoma, Highway 152, Tuesday evening. Hathaway was traveling west on 152 and 'spun' on a slick spot on the highway. The car struck a tank truck traveling east on the highway. Hathaway was taken by ambulance to Parkview, where she was treated and transferred to Amarillo by private 4-wheel drive vehicle to Amarillo. She was wearing a seatbelt, but the nose struck the steering wheel. The driver of the truck was uninjured.

Shamrock reported 9" of snow. Highways 83 and Interstate 40 were

reported to have 1/2" of ice covering melted Tuesday, but slick spots the lanes of traffic. Most of this remained.

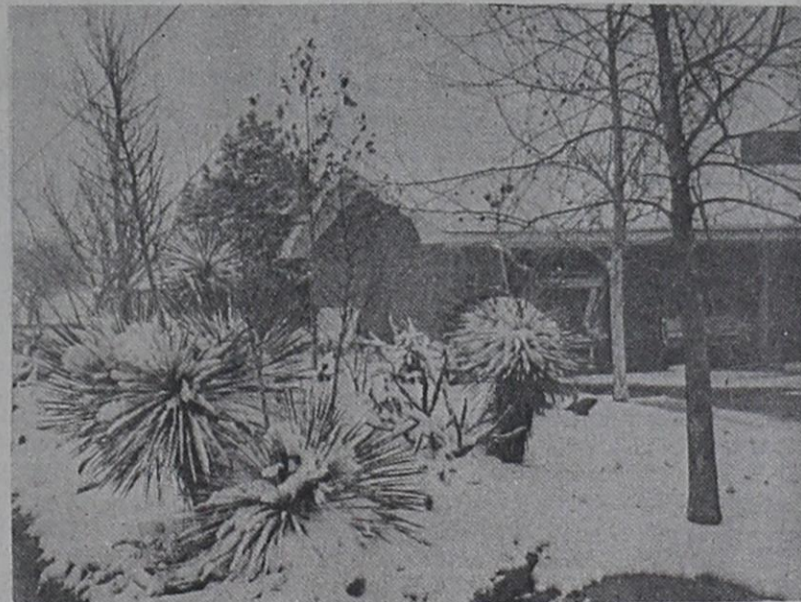
