The Wheeler Mustangs dashed what hopes the Happy Cowboys had with two quick touchdowns last Friday night and went on to beat the Cowboys in zone competition, 40-8.

Happy was able to stay with the Mustangs on the stats chart but the scoreboard was another story as the Mustangs took the opening kickoff and drove 62 yards for a touchdown and then for all intent and purpose, put the Cowboys to rest when they recovered a fumble on the kickoff after the TD and scored on a short 32 yard drive.

Bubba Smith was the workhorse on the Mustangs opening drive as he lugged the ball eight times and got the touchdown on a 16 yard run. Shane Guest rambled for 18 yards on one carry in the drive.

With still 6:10 to play in the first quarter, Wheeler led 14-0 after Smith got his second six pointer on a one yard run and Lee McCasland booted good on both extra point efforts.

Holding the two touchdown margin, Wheeler hit the Cowboys with another quick, two touchdown barrage in the second stanza to go to the dressing room at halftime with a comfortable 26-0 lead.

After a Scott Sims kick of only 26 yards to the Wheeler 45, the Mustangs struck. Bubba Smith picked up 10 yards and a first down on the Cowboy 45. Two five yard fines against Wheeler moved the ball back to the Wheeler 45 and the Mustangs faced first and 20. Quarterback Shawn Bradstreet passed to Smith and the Mustangs junior tailback was long gone to complete a 55 yard scoring play. McCasland missed the extra point to leave the Wheeler margin at 20-0 with still 8:54 to play in the half.

Happy ran two plays after the ensuing kickoff and went to the airways and that was a mistake. Shane Guest stepped in front of a Marty Middleton pass and streaked 55 yards to paydirt. A run for the two points failed and the Mustangs were in the driver's seat.

Following their scoring pattern of the first half, the Mustangs hit the Cowboys with another two touchdown barrage within 3 minutes in the third quarter.

Happy took the second half kickoff and drove to the Wheeler 48 where

they were forced to kick and Sims booted the ball to the Mustangs 16. Penalized 10 yards on the return, the Mustangs had a first down on their 6.

Happy was penalized 15 to the 21 and then Bubba Smith broke for a 40 yard gainer to the Cowboy 39. Grayson Benson went up the pipe for 16 more and Wheeler had a first down at the Happy 23. Benson ripped 5 more before Bradstreet was dumped for a 4 yard loss. Benson then got it all from the 22 for his only TD of the game and McCasland kicked the Mustangs into a 33-0 lead.

Going for a first down near midfield, the Cowboys failed at the Wheeler 45 and wham, the Mustangs struck again. A 55 yard scoring pass on first down from Bradstreet to David Jones ate up the yardage for the Mustangs final TD of the rout.

Happy was able to get on the scoreboard with just 31 seconds remaining when Guy Coile ran five yards.

The Mustangs were content to turn the game over to a lot of backups in the final quarter and Happy got a lot of their yardage running between the 20's.

Bubba Smith was the Mustangs leading ball carrier in the zone game with 159 yards on 28 carries and Grayson Benson picked up 77 yards on 13 tries.

Both Wheeler and Bovina depend on the ground game but both have been effective with the passing attack. "Bovina likes to spread you out on defense and run those good backs at you and then pop you with a pass when you least expect it," Smith noted. Both Venable and Ware have rushed right at the 1000 yard mark for the season.

The Wheeler Mustangs came out of the Happy win without injury and this second playoff game should find the Mustangs in good physical condition and raring to go.

The winner of Friday nights game will play the winner of the Plains—Grandfalls Royalty game. If Plains wins, the game will probably be at Hereford if Wheeler wins but the site of a Wheeler—Grandfalls Royalty matchup has not been determined but the game will be played on the Friday after Thanksgiving.

It isn't that far to Amarillo and Mustangs fans are urged to get to River Road and support the Black Machine.

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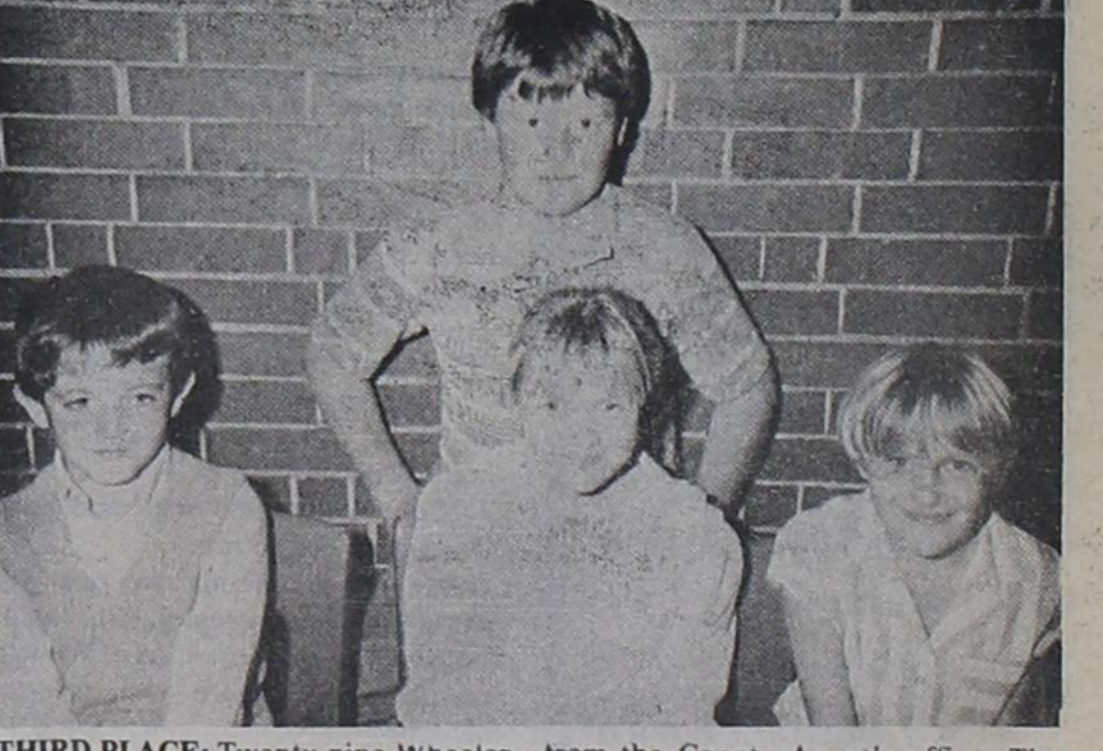

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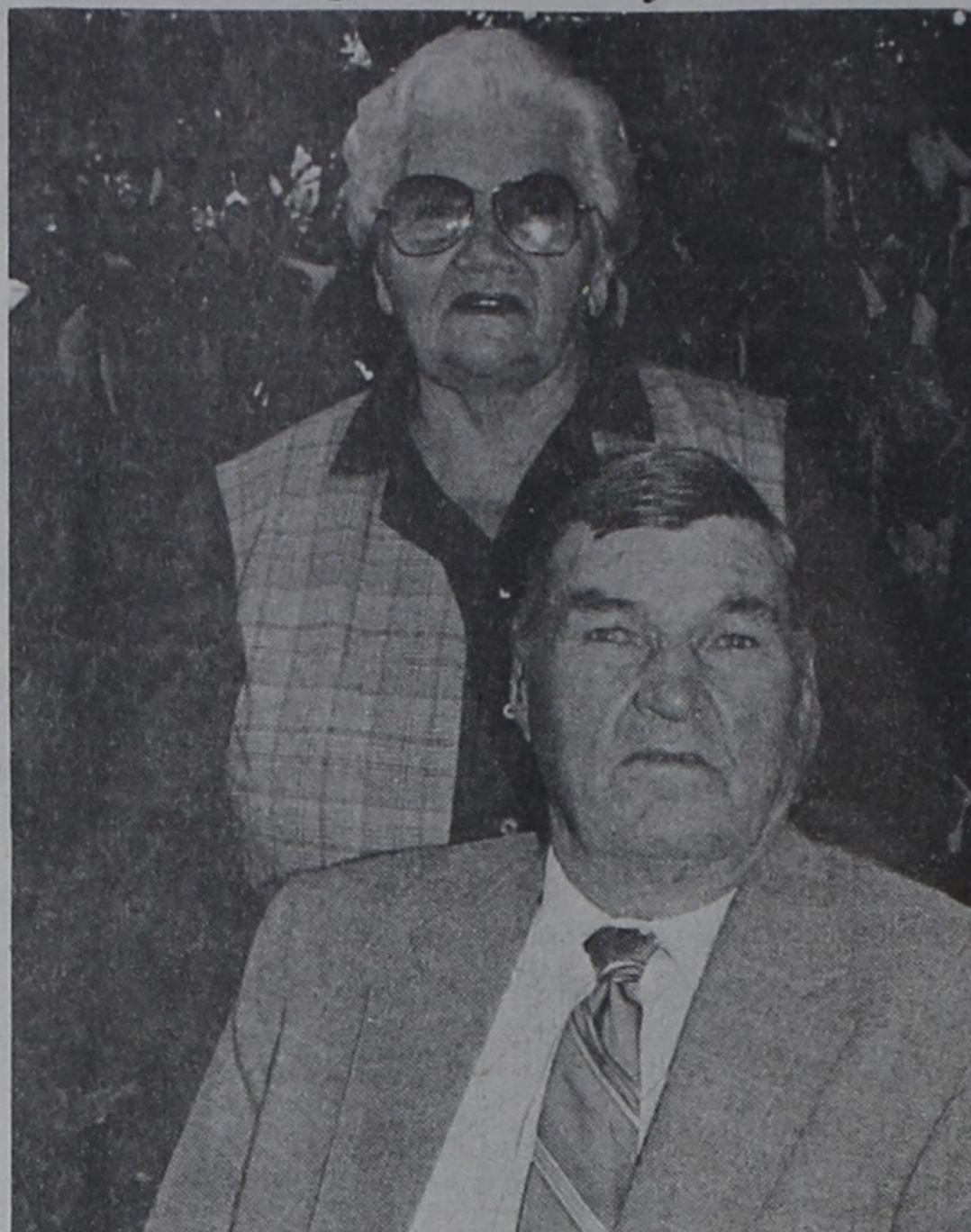

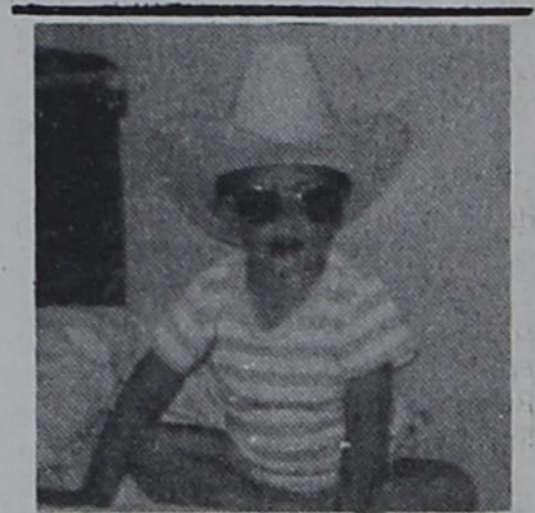
Two of our cats have gone missing; found one up south of mail box chewed up by dogs or coyotes. Sure hope all don't get killed. They keep rats and mice away.

An Era is passing, and I might add: and leaving me behind. This Era was one of youth, dreams and hard work. A time we felt we were staid, a friend to the youth, and a help to the community. My husband was a teacher. He taught, loved and enjoyed the youngster's. We had a business that kept us in public, where we could observe a great deal. The last few years I have lived in the background, just observing as time goes on. The teenagers we knew have grown into manhood and womanhood. They had (and have) a place in the community. They helped the world go on. But so many that I can remember have passed on. I'm thinking of the late Charlie Hix. How could his time here on earth be over, and many others of his time and I still be here? I'm old enough to have been his mother, why am I left here? Don't misunderstand me. I'm not remorseful, nor resentful, nor tired of living. I'm grateful every day for life and friends and the love of God. But I still wonder why I'm left.

An awful thing was the tragic explosion of the Celanese Plant in Pampa. The ripples from it reached far—it touched Wheeler. Ina Mae Anglin told me that their grandson, brother of Bob McCain, was blown through a door, which possibly saved his life. We need to remember these friends in this neighboring community who, at this time, may be in dire circumstances.

I missed my 'seat mates' at church last Sunday. Someone told me that Mary Wofford and Esther Hill were ill.

A long time ago a friend of mine, Joyce Martin wrote me a note and asked why I did not put some recipes in my Here and There. It seemed like a good idea but I didn't get around to it. (Believe it or not I now have "a round Tuit.") I'm sure Joyce thinks I've forgotten all about it, but here, two or three years later, I'm giving you a recipe that she sent me:

PECAN TARTS

Combine: 1 three oz. pkg. of cream cheese, 1/2 c. soft butter, 1 c. flour, pinch of salt. Chill. Shape circle of dough into miniature muffin tins.

Mix until smooth: 1 beaten egg, 3/4 c. brown sugar, 1T. butter, 1 teas. vanilla, a dash of salt and 3/4 c. chopped pecans.

Put mixture into shell and bake 325 degrees for 25 min.

(The above sounds so rich for calorie-conscious people). Oh, well. The Holidays are almost here. We will just have to ignore the calorie-counter.

TURKEY SAFETY A CONCERN

A food safety expert with the Texas A&M University System's agricultural Extension Service cautions against letting convenience, lack of time, or a favorite family recipe get in the way of following safe food handling practices this Thanksgiving.

Because a large frozen turkey can take several days to defrost in the refrigerator, people start to take short-cuts like putting the bird on the kitchen counter to thaw, explains Marilyn Haggard. This practice allows salmonella bacteria to flourish.

"The only safe way to thaw a turkey in a hurry is to use a microwave oven or to thaw in cool water in the sink, changing the water every 30 minutes," she states.

"If you don't want to bother with thawing, you would be better off buying a fresh turkey, which can be kept refrigerated for 1-2 days before cooking."

According to the specialist, both frozen and fresh turkeys should be washed inside and out in cool water and patted dry with a paper towel before stuffing and cooking.

Then wash in hot soapy water all cutting boards, pans and utensils that have come in contact with the raw turkey.

It might seem like a convenience to stuff the turkey in advance, but it could be dangerous, Haggard says.

"When a turkey is stuffed it creates ideal conditions for the growth of bacteria in the cavity. In a home refrigerator, it's very difficult to keep the stuffing inside a pre-stuffed turkey below 40 degrees F, which is cold enough to keep most bacteria from growing."

For that reason, she says, the U.S. Department of Agriculture advises against buying a pre-stuffed fresh turkey.

Haggard recommends preparing and refrigerating the stuffing in advance and it in the turkey right before cooking, or cooking it separately.

If you have a recipe that calls for long cooking at a low temperature, the specialist recommends not using it. At 250 degrees F the turkey and stuffing could take more than four hours to reach a high enough temperature to destroy bacteria.

While it's safe to microwave an unstuffed whole turkey, a stuffed bird is too dense to assure thorough cooking, she adds.

Even after the bird is cooked, food-borne illness can result when perishable foods are allowed to sit at room temperature. In general, foods should never be left at room temperature for over two hours.

That rule applies to leftovers, too, emphasizes Haggard. To insure safe turkey sandwiches, play it safe by removing the stuffing from the bird and refrigerating both immediately after dinner. Later in the evening, you can strip the meat from the carcass and store it in meal-sized portions for later use.

"The symptoms of food-borne illness are seldom life-threatening, but can be serious for young children and the elderly. Since nausea, stomach cramps, and diarrhea are an unpleasant way for anyone to begin the holiday season, it's best to take food precautions," maintains the specialist.
