

Locker Equipment Shipped Jan. 3

Cold storage rooms of the new Wheeler cold storage locker plant have been completed and other necessary renovation made on the ice plant building and things are in readiness for the compartments and machinery to be installed upon arrival.

The equipment was shipped from a northern factory on January 3 and should have arrived in Wheeler before now. Authorities have sent out tracers to find the shipment that has been in transit since that date.

It is estimated that it will take only a week or 10 days to get the plant in operation after the equipment arrives.

Much of the credit for helping secure the 326 unit cold storage locker with local authorities when the plant was up before War Food Administration at Washington and the state USDA war board. After helping get the application in proper form, Mr. Worley saw that it was given immediate consideration by proper authorities. The application for the plant was approved by the War Food Administration Nov. 3 and a few days Production Board.


