J. B. Crowder, Jr., Chief Store Keeper, has been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received during battles for the Solomon Islands. Crowder, after 35 months service aboard the Aircraft Carrier Enterprise, was one of three survivors of a damaged control party of 45 men when a Japanese bomb crashed to the third deck during a battle of the Eastern Solomons.

He was presented with the award June 27 by Rear Admiral Arthur H. Mayo, (SC) USN at the Naval Supply Depot, Oakland, Calif., where he is now stationed.

New methods of induction of men into the armed forces will become School and upon the completion of effective July 1, according to instruc-

> After that date men will not be classified for army or navy service examination at Lubbock but will be placed in two classifications, for "general military service" and "limited military service."

> From this pool the draft board will fill induction quotas. No limited service men will be taken except on instructions from the state board.

> not be required to take a second preinduction physical examination, even if more than 90 days have expired since they were examined, but will be given an examination at the time they are ordered up to report for induction. If they pass they are immediately inducted.

Correction At Last-Maybe! At long last the Office of Price Administration has admitted that the Highest Price Line Limitation order is responsible for the disappearance of low-priced clothing from retail shelves. The OPA Administrator says frankly that much of the shortage could have been eliminated, "if we in the OPA and other agencies had

been on our toes Congressional, public and distributor demands are finally forcing reconsideration of obviously unworkable price rules. Meanwhile, consumers have been conscious of dwindling supplies of low-priced wearing apparel. Moreover, according to the OPA Consumer Advisory Committee, "the quality of many items is so low as to be wasteful of manpower and materials.

The public can forgive mistakes in as gigantic an undertaking as rationing and price control, but it will not forever excuse stubborn refusal to make corrections.

The magazine Newsweek observes that "even if more low-priced clothes are made available, they are bound to cost more than the same items did before the war, despite the OPA's struggle to hold prices down. Labor and material costs have gone up and these cannot be absorbed by the manufacturers or the merchants."

It now remains to be seen whether OPA will actually get action, or whether relief will continue to be stymied in bureaucratic

Startling But True

The National Safety Council, in making the Safety Awards to the commercial airlines recently, brought out some startling figures as to the safety records of the airlines of the United States during 1943.

During the past year, of the 17 domestic airlines listed in the Council's Air Transport Safety Awards, 16 operated one billion two hundred and twenty-five million passenger miles without a passenger fatality. This is equivalent to picking up at their home airports every man, woman and child in the cities of Birmingham, Little Rock, Beverly Hills, Denver, Hartford, Tampa, Des Moines, Louisville, Baltimore, Dayton and the two Portlands, plus all the people in Nevada, Wyoming and Vermont and flying all them to points 200 miles away and bringing them safely home. Unbelievable but true.

Local Employers May Hire Workers Without Referral By U. S. E. S.

Employers in Wheeler county will be permitted to hire male workers without referral by the United States 28-2tp Employment Service under authority of the Area Director of the War Manpower Commission and the Amarillo Area Management-Labor Committee. This constitutes a special arrangement under the Priority Referral Program of the War Manpower war, extra nice. Priced to sell at Commission, which goes into effect at midnight, June 30, Otis R.
