The Wheeler Mustangs gained their fifth straight district football championship last Friday night by whipping the Booker Kiowas by a 27-0

margin and in doing so, they avenged a shutout by Booker last year.

As Don Meredith used to sing on NFL Monday night football, "Turn out the lights, the party is over," and it could have been rendered five plays deep in the second quarter when Grayson Benson skirted left end from 13 yards out to give the Mustangs a 21-0 lead.

The victory moved the Mustangs into the zone playoff game of the state playoffs next week against probably the winner of the Happy-Nazareth game that will be played Friday.

The Mustangs victory wasn't as easy as the score would indicate as the Kiowas fought the Mustangs statis-

tically to a draw but good field position and taking advantage of their opportunities helped propel the Mustangs to a win they have looked forward to for a year.

### Converting Cropland To Grass By 1995

The 1985 Food and Security Act dictated that all highly erodible land would have an approved conservation plan by January 1, 1990. After 1990 a producer will be ineligible for federal funds if it is determined that he is not following an approved conservation plan. Some of the soils in Wheeler County that are presently being farmed will need to be converted to grass by January 1, 1995. The soils involved are Delwin fine sand (DeB & DfC3), Pratt fine sand (PtB), and Tivoli fine sand (Tv). In addition to these soils, there are soils that may need to be terraced by 1995. Producers who are farming these soils might consider placing this land in the CRP program. Another sign-up is tentatively scheduled for February 1988. If you have questions about the provisions of the 1985 farm bill, contact the SCS office in Wheeler.

## Texas Men 26 Reach Important Milestone

Men who turn 26 during the remainder of 1987 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Young men born in 1961 were required to register with Selective Service in July of 1980 when President Carter reinstated the registration requirement. These men turn 26 in 1987. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept a young man's registration after he has reached his 26th birthday.

Harold Doyle, Texas Selective Service State Director, warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student financial aid, job training benefits and most federal employment. Additionally, non-registrants face possible prosecution as felons.

Texas has registered nearly one million men since 1980.

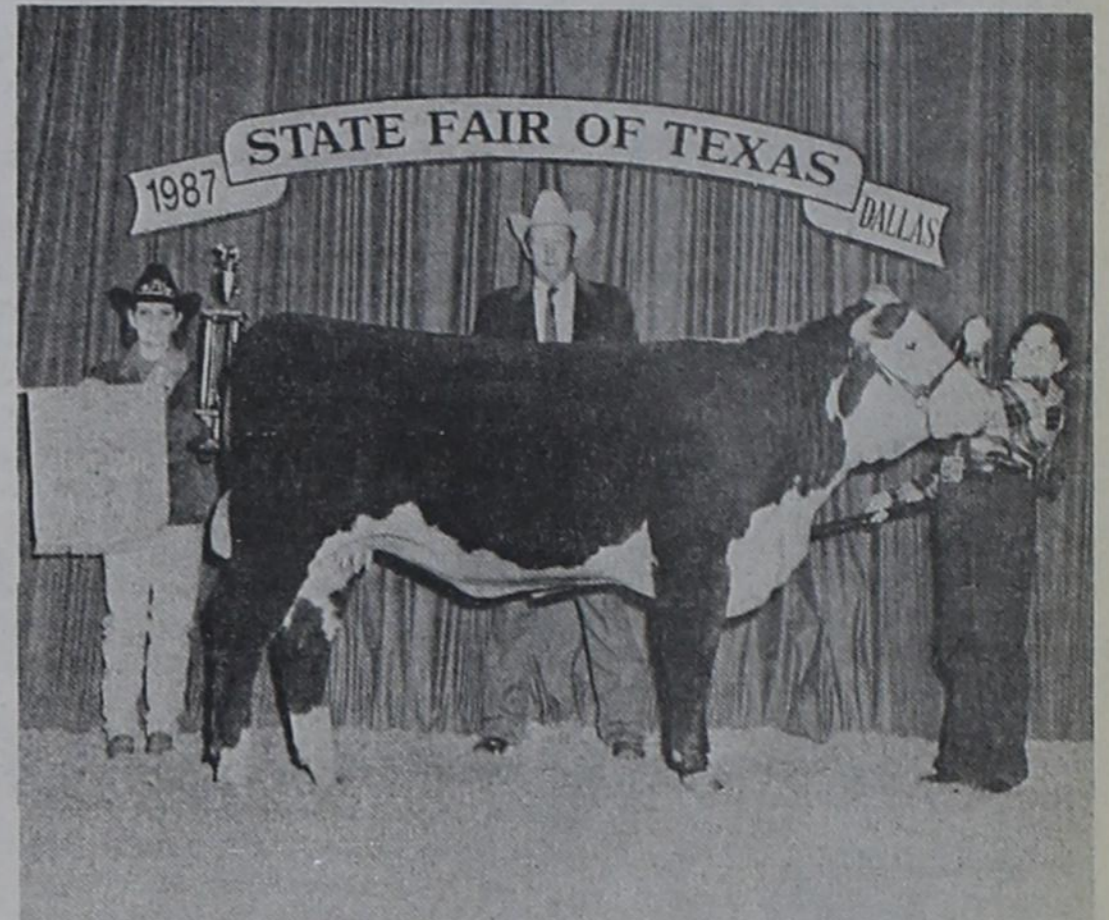

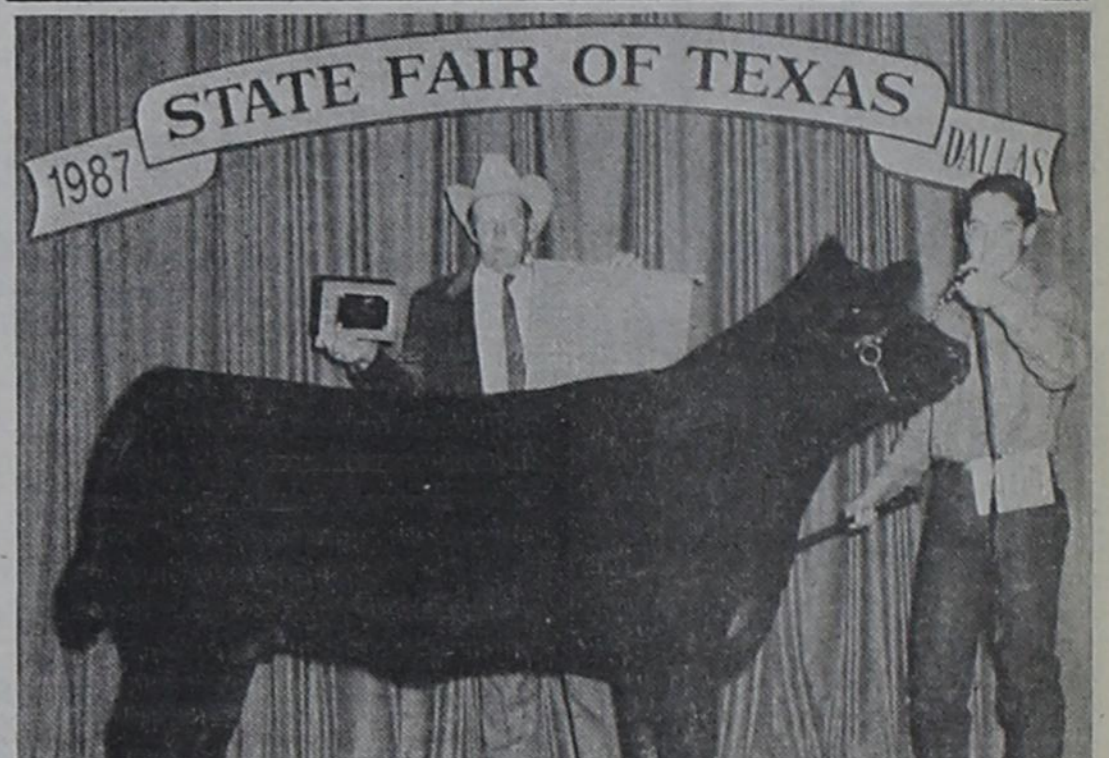
