

LETTER TO THE EDITOR PARI-MUTUEL GAMBLING **MYTHS OR FACTS**

Dear Editor:

On November 3, 1987, Texas voters will have the responsibility of going to the polls and making a decision which will have long term effect on Texas. A referendum conderning pari-mutuel gambling? Here are some myths and facts put together by TEXANS WHO CARE.

Myth: Pari-mutuel gambling produces large revenues, enough to avoid tax increases.

FACT: No state receives even 1% of its revenue from pari-mutuel gambling. The Texas budget for 1988-1989 biennium is \$38.3 billion. Pari-mutuel gambling, even after a five-year growth period to allow for the industry to reach maximum output, is estimated to add only \$110 million a year, 1/2 of 1% of the annual budget. This figure does not include increased law enforcement or social

MYTH: Pari-mutuel gambling is a solid industry which will help diversify the Texas economy.

FACT: Pari-mutuel gambling is a dying industry with declining revenues and attendance. Many states have had to lower the tax rate the tracks pay to bail them out; others have used industrial revenue bonds to build the tracks or provide funds for capital improvements.

MYTH: Pari-mutuel gambling does not involve illegal gambling or organized crime.

FACT: Law enforcement officials think otherwise. When Jim Adams was director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, he stated that legal gambling DOES increase illegal gambling. Organized crime is involved in the gambling business, according to the former director of the FBI, William Webster. Among other criminal activities associated with pari-mutuel gambling are insurance scams, race-fixing, and government

corruption. MYTH: Pari-mutuel gambling does not take money from the poor.

FACT: Pari-mutuel gambling is regressive, drawing a higher percentage of income from the poor than others. Governments responsibility is I sincerely feel that I am qualified to to look after the welfare of all its

> MYTH: The people want to gamble at horse and dog races.

> FACT: On November 3, the people will decide this issue. Some polls Show people favor horse racing, with fewer favoring dog racing. The 1987 election will be the real test. The problem, even with this vote, is this really the will of the people? This election has no political offices on the ballot. Their are no personalities to draw out the voters. People who go to the polls will decide the issue, but will this be your choice? If you fail to take time to vote, you may be by silence casting a vote in favor of pari-mutuel gambling in Texas. Will you as a voter let someone else determine your future and the future of Texas? Take time to vote on November 3, 1987.
