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## 49 Veterans Sign Up To Study In County Vocational School

A vocational agriculture school for war veterans will be started in Wheeler county about June 1.

Forty-nine veterans have already indicated intentions to enroll and at least eight more have made applications.

Decision to employ instructors and get classes started as soon as possible was made by the Wheeler County Board of Education after a public meeting at the court house Tuesday night.

The school will be set up under provisions of the GI Bill and veteran-students will receive subsistence payments of \$65 per month if single and \$90 if married.

## Next Saturday Is Day Voters Will Decide On Legalizing Of Liquor

Next Saturday is the day when voters go to the polls to decide whether the sale of all alcoholic beverages shall be legalized in Wheeler county.

The special countywide prohibition election was called by the county commissioners court last month on petition of 269 qualified voters.

County voters are advised that the customary polling places will be used with the exception of the former Ramsdell and Locust Grove boxes which were abolished last fall.

Persons in the old Ramsdell precinct will vote at Heald and Lela while those in the former Locust box will vote at Twitty.

Saturday will be the first time since repeal of national prohibition laws that Wheeler county citizens have voted on the proposal to legalize all alcoholic beverages.

There have been elections on the sale of beer and wine but never before has the sale of so-called hard liquor been proposed on a local ballot.

Wording of the ballot will be: "For legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages." "Against legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages."

It is the general opinion that the county will go dry by a large majority, some persons considered in a position to gauge countwide sentiment, predicting the wet proposal will be defeated by a two-to-one vote.

Shamrock, wet in previous beer and wine elections, is expected to give a substantial dry majority while the Le-

**A Pound of Prevention Is Worth 2,000 Pounds Beef Texas Stockmen**

COLLEGE STATION—A pound of DDT is worth 2000 pounds of beef to the Texas stockmen during fly season this year.

A tall statement? Entomologist Charles A. King, Jr. of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, says "figure it up yourself". One pound of wettable DDT powder, mixed in 25 gallons of water, will spray about 25 head of cattle. Stockmen who have used DDT spray the past two years will testify that beef animals will put on an average of 80 pounds of flesh as a result of thorough spraying throughout the fly season. When 25 head gain 80 pounds, that's 2000 pounds of beef from one pound of DDT.

King says that the fly season is getting underway now, and experienced stockmen are checking up on spraying equipment and DDT supplies. Four pounds of wettable DDT powder at a strength of 2 of one per cent, mixed in 100 gallons of water, is the spray to use. When to spray? King says "let the flies tell you". If the pests are thick, the spray is needed. A lot of factors enter into the

"when to spray" picture. The treatment holds flies for months, but a heavy mean the job needs to be done a ten-day period. Dairymen also have a chance to cash in on it. Some people, it is said, their talk. Some of those over seem to make more on the world than run dry of ideas.

Q—I am an honorably discharged World War II veteran, and would like to know of what benefit is a guaranteed loan if I purchase a home under the G. I. Bill?

A—The guaranty provides or increases the security you have to offer for a loan by the amount of the guaranty; it tends to induce the lender to lend more nearly the full purchase price of the property and to give you a better rate of interest, and finally 4 per cent of

the amount guaranteed is paid to the lender by VA and is an outright gift to you.

Q—My wife and I plan to purchase a \$9,000 home. We are both World War II veterans. Can we acquire the property jointly and so increase the amount which may be guaranteed?

A—Yes, you may acquire the property jointly, but the maximum guaranty may not exceed 50 per cent of the loan.

Q—I have a G. I. loan on my home and would like to know if I can have the loan extended?

A—Yes, you can have the loan extended if the lender is willing to give you more time, but the extension must provide for complete payment of the loan within the 25-year maximum period provided by law.

Q—What is the largest amount I can borrow under the G. I. Bill and still have the loan guaranteed?

A—There is no limit on the amount which can be borrowed under the G. I. Bill. The limitation by law is on the size of the government guaranty and not upon the size of the loan.

Ex-GI Joe thus far has proved to be a good loan risk, according to latest Veterans Administration figures on defaults for loans guaranteed by the Government under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill).

As of March 25, VA had approved for guaranty more than 643,000 home loans with a face value of \$3,642,000,000 and carrying guarantee commitments of \$1,777,000,000.

As of the same date, claims had been made against the guaranty by lenders in only 212 home loan cases, and 42 of these subsequently were withdrawn by the claimants. Of the remainder, 135 claims in the net amount of \$235,400 have been paid—and this amount will be reduced by further recovery through liquidation of security for the loans.

VA said the small number of current defaults could not be expected to reflect the long-term trend. The loans are made repayable up to 25 years. The contracts have been negotiated since September, 1944, when the program went into effect.

Casualties among veterans who went into business with the aid of GI loans are considerably higher. Of 59,450 such loans totalling \$187,000,000 some 960 have resulted in claims. VA has paid \$32 for \$680,000, also subject to further recovery through liquidation of assets.

VA said business loans are made repayable in much shorter periods of time than real estate loans, therefore a higher rate of defaults during the 2½ years of operation of the G. I. Bill is to be expected.

Only 26,700 farm loans, had been approved by VA through March 25. Claims had been filed against 68, of which 42 had been

paid in the amount of \$31,700. Farm loans may be amortized over periods up to 40 years.

On the other side of the ledger, VA said that 12,590 loans of all types had been repaid in full by March 25. These included 7,698 home loans, 3,920 for business and 972 for farms. Their aggregate face value was \$42,470,000.

tion of the State Department of Health.

(f) HUMAN EXCRETA: The urinary and bowel discharge of any human being.

SECTION 5. DISPOSAL OF HUMAN EXCRETA:

(a). All human excreta in populous areas must be disposed of through properly managed sewers, treatment tanks, chemical toilets, approved privies, or by other me-

thods approved by the State Department of Health. The disposal system shall be sufficient to prevent the pollution of surface soil, the contamination of any drinking water supply, the infection of any flies, cockroaches, or creation of any other nuisance. (b). All effluent from septic tanks hereafter constructed shall be disposed of through a subsurface drainage field designed in ac-

**FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING**

Q. How can I get rid of lice in my hogs?

A. Results at the Idaho Experimental Station indicate that hog lice may be controlled by spraying hogs twice at 14-day intervals with either DDT or rotenone. Fourteen days after the first treatment the degree of infestation of lice was reduced more in the DDT group than in those treated with rotenone, due probably to the higher residual effect of DDT. After the second treatment with DDT all pigs were free from lice, and in the rotenone group only one pig was slightly infested with lice.

Q. Do mites remain dormant in poultry houses over the winter?

A. Yes, they do remain dormant in brooder houses, colony houses, and range shelters. These should be thoroughly cleaned in the spring, or the mites will cause a lot of trouble when the warm weather comes. Make sure that all cracks and crevices are cleaned out. Then spray with a good insect oil, such as Parina Insect Oil, which will keep down mites for as long as a year.

Q. Will feeding vitamins to calves prevent scours?

A. Preliminary results from experimental work at Cornell on the value of supplementary vitamins in calf nutrition indicate that there was no difference in the incidence of scours nor in the rate of recovery on two test groups of calves. The one group of calves received supplementary vitamins, while the other group received the same care and management but were fed no supplementary vitamins. Observations clearly indicate that extra vitamins did not prevent scours. Furthermore, the calves recovered from scours whether they received the vitamins or not.

Q. Can turkeys be raised in batteries?

A. Turkeys are often started in batteries and kept there until four weeks of age, but it is more practical to keep them there only two weeks. Turkeys do not adjust themselves well to a change in environment after two weeks of age.

**Dr. Cox Says Typhoid Vaccination Is Needed**

If you have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever within the last two or three years, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises you to go to your doctor or to the nearest health officer and have him give you the three "shots" that will protect you against the disease.

The three shots that will protect against typhoid are given at intervals of one week apart," Dr. Cox stated. "As it takes some time for the protective treatment to be established throughout the system, it is wise not to delay in having it done. My advice is, have it done now so that immunization may be completed before summer arrives and vacation trips are taken."

This advice was addressed particularly to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and other youngsters who are looking forward to spring and summer hikes and trips. It is, however, meant also for others, young and old, whose business or pleasure during the summer will take them places where there may be doubt as to the purity or safety of the water supply, or as

to the care with which food handled. The old adage that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is particularly applicable to this disease, which is so dangerous and debilitating when it does occur, and which can be prevented so easily through immunization.
