21-Year-Old Veteran Critically Hurt While Trying Overtake Bus

The desire to drink a soda my cost the life of Eugene Miller, 21-year-old navy veteran of Belle Fourche, S. D., who was unconscious in Wheeler Hospital Wednesday night, suffering from a fractured skull.

The young man was aboard an eastbound Trailways bus en route to meet his fiancee in Oklahoma City when the vehicle made a scheduled stop at Wheeler Sunday afternoon.

Craving a drink, Miller disregarded the driver's caution that the stop would be only momentary, and left the bus to satisfy his thirst. The vehicle departed without him.

Discovering his predicament, Miller enlisted the help of by-standers in finding transportation to overtake his bus. L. Beasley who resides east of Wheeler, volunteered to take nim in his 1939 Ford Tudor.

Witnesses said Beasley almost turned his car over as ne raced the first block. He lost control of it two blocks farther east, the car rolling over several times east of the Wheeler locker plant. The driver was unhurt but his passenger, rendered unconscious, was taken to the hospital where his condition has remained critical.

State Health Officer 119 W. 2nd. Gives Standards For Public Swimming Pools

AUSTIN-A pamphlet entitled Maximum Swimming Pool Standards" is being distributed by the State Health Department throughout the State to operators of swimming pools or other interested parties according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The standards set up were pr pared for the protection of public health and include recommendations of the Joint Committee on Bathing Places of the Conference of State Sanitary Engineers and the American Public Health Association. These standards provide for proper sanitation practices at all types of pools from the "fill and draw type" to the modern "recirculating type."

Some of the specifications for standard sanitation are that the bacterial quality of the water should be equal to that of safe drinking water; frequency of changing or recirculating water should be such that maximum safety will be provided as well as proper economy; the water should be sufficiently disinfected to kill all disease bacteria and standards for clearness and algae control should be enforced.

Dr. Cox advises that the State Department of Health offers many services to the pool manager or operator. These services include free bacteriological analysis of the water, free kits for making chlorine residual tests on the water, and information and advisory ser-

CONTROL OF NUT GRASS IS REVIEWED

COLLEGE STATION - Nut grass, or coco grass, is the pest that has long been plauging farmers and gardners. Recent inquiries to the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service call for an explanation of nut grass control.

E. A. Miller, Extension agronomist, says that killing nut grass is not easy, and usually a lot of the above-ground end of the grass permanent nature. during the growing season. This causes the roots to become ex-

On land that is fertile enough to grow dence crop stands, the nut grass can be crowded out, but years to eradicate it completely Crops that are adapted to "nut grass crowding" are cowpeas, sweet potatoes, sudan grass and sorghum for summer and oats, barley, wheat, rye or rye grass for winter.

Growing summer smothering crops to eradicate nut grass is made more effective by following the cover crop with small grain or rye grass in the early fall.

On small areas of land thickly infested with nut grass, pasturing hogs is a good nut grass control practice, says the agronomist. If the land is plowed first, the hogs have a better chance to get to the grass roots and kill the plants. Ten hogs can ordinarily be depended on to dispose of an acre of nut grass in about two months Summer has proved to be the pest time to start the hog-pasturg method

Either plowing or disking every three weeks through two successive growing seasons has knocked
