THE DILEMMA OF TAXING AUTOMOBILES

None of Texas, three most populous counties makes any real effort to collect ad valorem taxes on automobiles. Tarrant County's new "outside" collectors of delinquent tax declare they will attempt. Some Texas counties reportedly do not even assess auto-

mobiles for taxation as personal property, experience having shown that all except a minor percentage of such items will go unpaid.

The municipal government of Fort Worth undertook a few years ago to collect delinquent taxes of this kind through summary seizure of automobiles on which the levy was unpaid—the same method that contract collectors for the county now propose to use. The effort quickly was abandoned for two reasons: The strong public resentment aroused by the seizure of automobiles, and the conviction that the measure bore unfairly upon owners of the few cars, out of the thousands on the tax rolls, that the tax collector was unable to seize without employing a veritable army of helpers.

While legally no different from taxes on any personal property, the ad valorem tax on automobiles is so widely detested and evaded that the few who pay it are made to feel like sticklebacks. The aversion to payments of the levy undoubtedly arises from the feeling that the automobile is the most over-taxed of all common possessions. It bears a staggering and inescapable burden of gasoline taxes, registration fees, excise taxes and a variety of other direct and indirect levies. Competent estimates are that the average motorist pays \$133.74 in special taxes during his first year of ownership of a new car—considerably more than the annual tax on the average-sized home.

Suggestions have been made that unpaid automobile taxes be "forgiven" and the items wiped off the county's books as uncollectible. An inquiry as to whether this can be done has been addressed by Commissioners Court to State Comptroller Sheppard. But it is apparent that neither this official nor any other can authorize the forgiveness or empower the county to cease assessment of a tax that is prescribed by law. The legal means of eliminating a tax that has been rendered largely inoperative by being generally ignored lies in legislative action to repeal it.

For years tax collectors and their organizations have been recommending this step. They want to avoid cluttering their books with items they have little or no chance to collect but which swell the total of taxes outstanding. The Legislature has failed repeatedly in efforts to insure collection of automobile taxes by passage of a law making their payment a

prerequisite to issuance of annual license plates.

Except in a minor number of cases, ad valorem taxes on automobiles are paid only by commercial firms which file and swear to a rendition of their property. Requiring such owners to pay, while others escape, is a manifest unfairness. It has been argued that forgiveness of the delinquencies would be unfair to those who customarily have paid in the past. Continuance of the present system is only to maintain the same discrimination in the future. Why perpetuate inequity?—From The Fort Worth Star Telegram.

State Health Officer
Gives Standards For
Public Swimming Pools

AUSTIN—A pamphlet entitled "Maximum Swimming Pool Standards" is being distributed by the State Health Department throughout the State to operators of swimming pools or other interested parties according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The standards set up were prepared for the protection of public health and include recommendations of the Joint Committee on Bathing Places of the Conference of State Sanitary Engineers and the American Public Health Association. These standards provide for proper sanitation practices at all types of pools from the "fill and draw type" to the modern "recirculating type."

Some of the specifications for standard sanitation are that the bacterial quality of the water should be equal to that of safe drinking water; frequency of changing or recirculating water should be such that maximum safety will be provided as well as proper economy; the water should be sufficiently disinfected to kill all disease bacteria and standards for cleanliness and algae control should be enforced.

Dr. Cox advises that the State Department of Health offers many services to the pool manager or operator. These services include free bacteriological analysis of the water, free kits for making chlorine residual tests on the water, and information and advisory ser-

vice on any problem that may be encountered in sanitation, engineering, or operation. All operators or managers are invited to write the State Health Department if they wish to obtain the





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CONTROL OF NUT GRASS IS REVIEWED

COLLEGE STATION — Nut grass, or coco grass, is the pest that has long been plaguing farmers and gardeners. Recent inquiries to the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service call for an explanation of nut grass control.

E. A. Miller, Extension agronomist, says that killing nut grass is not easy, and usually a lot of prolonged effort is necessary to do the job. The main object is to keep down, as much as possible, the above-ground end of the grass during the growing season. This causes the roots to become exhausted.

On land that is fertile enough to grow dense crop stands, the nut grass can be crowded out, but even then it may take several years to eradicate it completely. Crops that are adapted to "nut grass crowding" are cowpeas, sweet potatoes, sudan grass and sorghum for summer and oats, barley, wheat, rye or rye grass for winter.

Growing summer smothering crops to eradicate nut grass is made more effective by following the cover crop with small grain or rye grass in the early fall.

On small areas of land thickly infested with nut grass, pasturing hogs is a good nut grass control practice, says the agronomist. If the land is plowed first, the hogs have a better chance to get to the grass roots and kill the plants. Ten hogs can ordinarily be depended on to dispose of an acre of nut grass in about two months. Summer has proved to be the best time to start the hog-pasturing method.

Either plowing or disking every three weeks through two successive growing seasons has knocked

out the nut grass on sandy soils. Miller says this method, together with the smothering crops, has proved to be completely effective.

Holstein Tops Thousand Pound Butterfat Mark

COLLEGE STATION—L. Jaicie

Corona Starlight, a seven year old Holstein cow, is the first of her breed in Texas to produce as 1,000 pounds of butterfat in a year's time.

The Holstein Friesian Association has informed Extension dairy-men of Texas A. and M. College that the cow, now on the Neale

farm near Waco, produced 27,408 pounds of milk and 1,097.3 pounds of butterfat in 365 days, on three-times-a-day milking.

The new record makes Starlight the highest butterfat producing Holstein in Texas, and second highest producer of all breeds in the State. Texas' butterfat champion is Welcome Volunteer Sable, a five year old Jersey owned by J. Chester Elliff, of Tulia. Last January, Sable completed a record of 1,155 pounds of butterfat to top all breeds in the state.





LEGAL NOTICE

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a five-cent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as follows:

SECTION 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes

permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied.

SECTION 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars, and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Ten Million (\$10,000,000.00) Dollars; Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than twenty (20) years from their respective dates, and in no event later than twenty-five (25) years after the date of the adoption of this amendment. This amendment shall be self-enacting.

SECTION 19. Said boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now appropriated by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

SECTION 20. "ALL BONDS OR NOTES issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."

SECTION 21. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

SECTION 22. "Against the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax

on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

SECTION 23. "The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state."

SECTION 24. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the fund in the treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such election and election.

SECTION 25. For going through the year of 1946 without a single fatality, 153 cities with populations between 5,000 and 100,000 have won places on the National Safety Council's honor roll.

SECTION 26. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

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FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How many chicks shall I purchase now to be sure of having a laying flock of 100 hens next fall?

A. If you are buying straight run chicks, you should buy about 300 to take care of mortality and culling. With sexed chicks, it will take about 150 in order to have a laying flock of 100 in the fall.

Q. What causes a dull film to form on milk cans, milking utensils, and clothes used around milk?

A. When vessels that have held milk are dipped in hot water, the heat causes the thin film of milk to coagulate or harden. The same thing happens to dish cloths, table cloths, or towels that have been saturated with milk. The resulting film is known as soapstone. It not only causes an unsightly appearance but may give bacteria a hiding place. We recommend the following steps for cleaning milk utensils:

1. Rinse thoroughly in clear, cold water (no soap).
2. Wash in hot water with a good washing powder.
3. Rinse in clear hot water to remove the soap.
4. Rinse in clear water containing a good disinfectant such as Purina Chlorox. Powder just before using again.

Q. Have any studies been made on the best types of legume hays or grasses for roughage in feeding beef cattle?

A. The Southwest Georgia Experimental Station made a study on the relative merits of the following hays in the ration for beef cattle: peanut, soybean, peanuts on the vine, sericea, kudzu, and annual lespedeza. Sixty steers were divided into six comparable groups as to weight, breeds, and grades as feeder steers, and were fed for 155 days. All cattle were weighed on three successive days at the beginning and at the end of the experiment. Cattle were graded as feeder steers at the beginning, finished steers at the end, and carcasses were graded after hanging in the cooler for 24 hours. The entire test was then repeated. In both cases peanut hay proved economical and effective for producing heavy, finished steers of the better grades, and fine quality carcasses. The next best results were obtained with kudzu.

determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

COLLEGE STATION—Texans are now using the facilities of almost 500 frozen food locker plants in the state.

As of November, 1946, there were 403 locker plants in the state, according to a survey made by Roy W. Snyder, meat specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. More recent figures show over 500 plants operating, says Snyder, although a few of that number are meat-curing concerns that cannot be classed as actual food locker plants.

"We have had an enormous increase of locker plants here in Texas," Snyder says. One or more plants is in operation in 210 of the state's 254 counties. The only sections of the state in which the plants have not spread rapidly are in extreme West Texas—the Big Bend country—and East Texas, answer to the West Texas condition, says the meat specialist, is large ranches and scattered population. He believes that East Texas counties are just "a bit slow in starting", but that the plants will spread over that portion of the state in time.

VET STUDENTS NOT PAID FOR VACATION TIME

G. I. readjustment allowances are not intended as summer vacation pay. L. P. Fort, local manager of the Texas Employment Compensation Commission, advised Wheeler County student veterans today.

The TUCC cooperates with the Veterans Administration in administering the readjustment allowance part of the G. I. Bill of Rights, Fort said.

Even if he is otherwise qualified, a veteran is not eligible for readjustment allowances for unemployment if he is receiving subsistence allowances for education or training under the G. I. Bill or if he is not available for suitable work, Fort said.

"That in between school terms and during vacation periods veterans should make sure that their Federal government school subsistence allowance payments have been discontinued before claiming readjustment allowances.

"Further, the veteran who is planning merely to rest and play between school terms is not eligible for readjustment allowances. Among other things he must be available for employment and seeking a suitable job during each period for which he claims readjustment allowance."

The law provides that further rights to readjustment allowances shall be forfeited by a veteran who knowingly accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled. In

addition, misrepresentation fraud are punishable by fines and prison sentences. In as many of the investigations have been handled by the FBI.
