"In the three years in office, I have attended five tax schools and I am working on my full certification," stated Hefley.

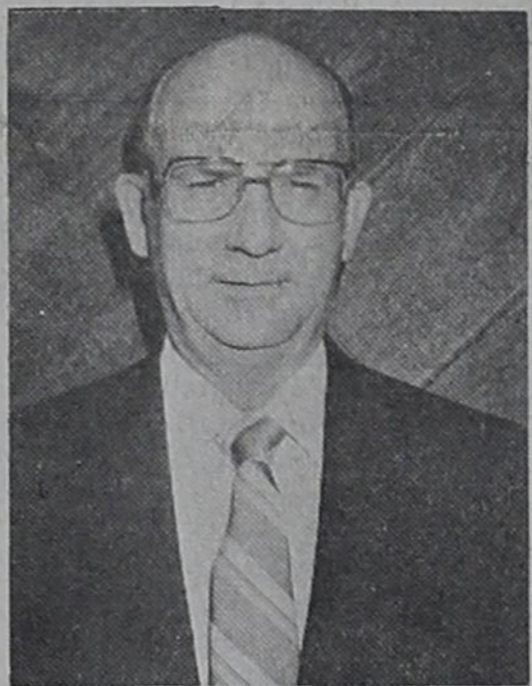
"I have enjoyed working for the people of Wheeler County over the past three years," he continued.

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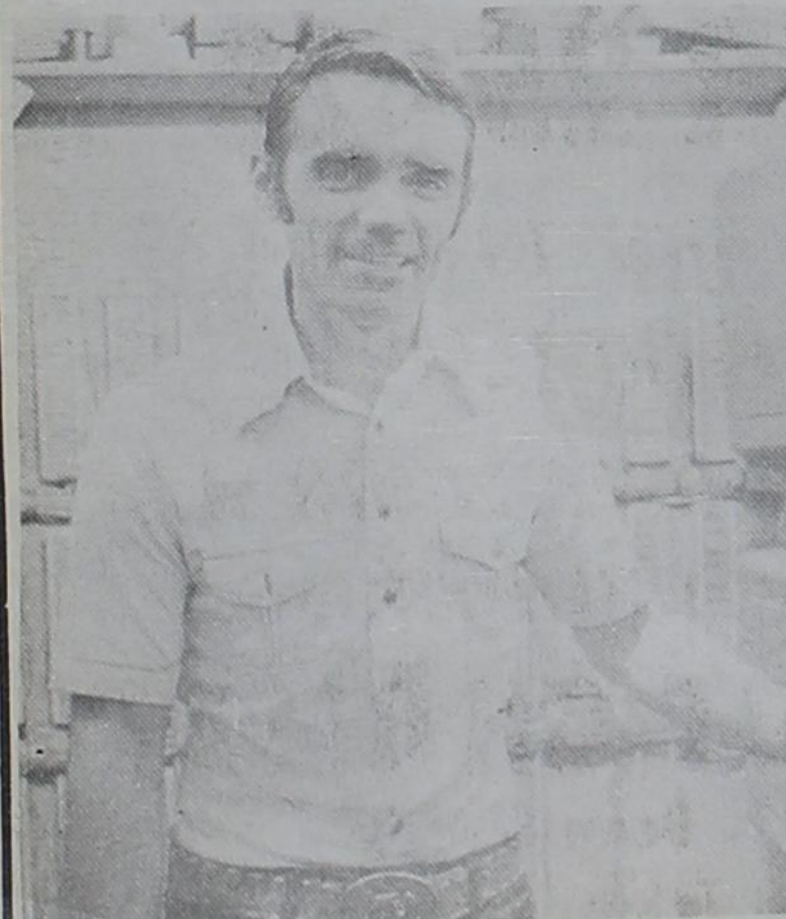

**PARI-MUTUEL GAMBLING:
IS IT GOOD FOR TEXAS?**

Well over a year ago, the state legislature passed a bill that would allow pari-mutuel gambling in Texas on dog and horse races, provided that pari-mutuel gambling was first approved by a statewide referendum and then by local county option. There are some restriction on the location of dog racing with approved pari-mutuel wagering. The question is "Will this be good for Texas?" On Tuesday, November 3, 1987 the voters of Texas in the general, statewide election, will be asked to vote, in a binding referendum, whether to be "for" or "against" pari-mutuel gambling on dog and horse racing.

Many are saying there will be economic development from pari-mutuel gambling. What they are saying is dog and horse racing means a bright new future for the troubled Texas economy. But in state after state, once gambling is legalized, the unhappy truth is that horse and dog racing brings in less than 1% of any state's revenue. With the additional cost of policing and collecting the

taxes, it is questionable if the additional revenue gained would even offset these new costs.

Pari-mutuel gambling is an activity that can only produce revenue to the state if the majority of the bettors lose. It is bad public policy for a state to create a vested interest for itself to make losers of its own citizens. It is bad public policy for the state to be a partner in a business which will increase illegal gambling, street crime, and attract organized crime. It is bad public policy for the state to try

to collect revenue from an activity as regressive as pari-mutuel gambling.

One of the hidden costs of legalized pari-mutuel gambling is legalized gambling actually creates gamblers. Statistics reveal 10% of all new gamblers will become addicts - an affliction as destructive as alcoholism or drug abuse. Compulsive gamblers are responsible for 17% of wife abuse and 13% of child abuse cases. They commit 40% of all white collar crime. A shocking 86% admit to committing felony crimes while pursuing their addiction to gambling.

At various times the gambling industry tries to direct public attention away from the wagering aspect. At the fourth National Conference on Public Gaming, the keynote, Raymond Blanchard, declared: "We've got to convince the people we're not in the gambling business, we're in the public revenue business." But **Gaming and Wagering Business**, a trade publication for the gambling industry, disagreed: "What differentiates pari-mutuel horseracing and other forms of commercial gambling from other leisure-time entertainment activities is the element of betting." There is betting on almost every sporting event. But the event itself is not dependent on betting to remain a form of leisure-time entertainment. Football, baseball and basketball games would still be enjoyed primarily because of the game and not because of any gambling that might be incidental to the game.

The ultimate outcome of the issue of pari-mutuel gambling is now in the hands of the voters of Texas. How the vote comes out on November 3, 1987 just might alter the course of Texas history. Will Texas be a state with increased crime, wife and child abuse, and felony crimes associated with addicted gamblers? Will Texas

become a state of losers in order to feed the state revenue coffers? Or will the voters reject this referendum as they have for the past 50 years?

WHEELER COUNTY SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT Annual Report

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as its primary purpose. Its boundaries coincide with the boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident landowners in the district and are actively engaged in farming or ranching. The current Board of Directors consists of Clarence Zybach (who has served on the board since its creation), Paul Macina, Jim Batton, Darville Atherton and John Vermillion.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS staff consists of Fred Allison, Jr. - District Conservationist, Kenneth Reed and Myron Merz - Range Conservationists, and Ben Westmoreland - Conservation Technician. Harold Nash is employed as a district clerk. The SWCD works very closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1987 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been very busy during 1987. Most of the business was the result of a new government program - The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Under this ten year program, highly erodible cropland is converted to grassland with government assistance. The land user receives an annual rental payment each year in return for not farming land in the CRP program. Five sign-up periods have been held to date. Wheeler County has 252 active contracts on 45,723 acres. Another sign-up has been announced for February 1988. Wheeler County is eligible for about 56,250 acres.

Sodbuster and Cross Compliance are terms that farmers and ranchers of Wheeler County will be faced with for the next several years. The Food and Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have a conservation plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully applied by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 1156 farms that must be under conservation plan by January 1, 1990. There have only been 24 plans prepared thus far. If you desire federal funds in 1990, do not wait until December 1989 to get an approved conservation plan.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD-SCS for 1987 include: New District Cooperators - 82 for 35,150 Acres; Conservation Plans Updated - 147 for 55,952 Acres; Individuals and Units of Government Assisted - 434; Individuals Applying a Practice - 214; Grass Seeding - 35,417 Acres; Conservation Presentations and Tour - 6; RC&D Erosion Control Structure Completed - 1; Brush Management - 320 Acres; Deferred Grazing 35,150 Acres; Cropland Benefited from a Conservation Practice - 40,646 Acres; Rangeland and Pastureland Benefited from a Conservation Practice - 6258 Acres.

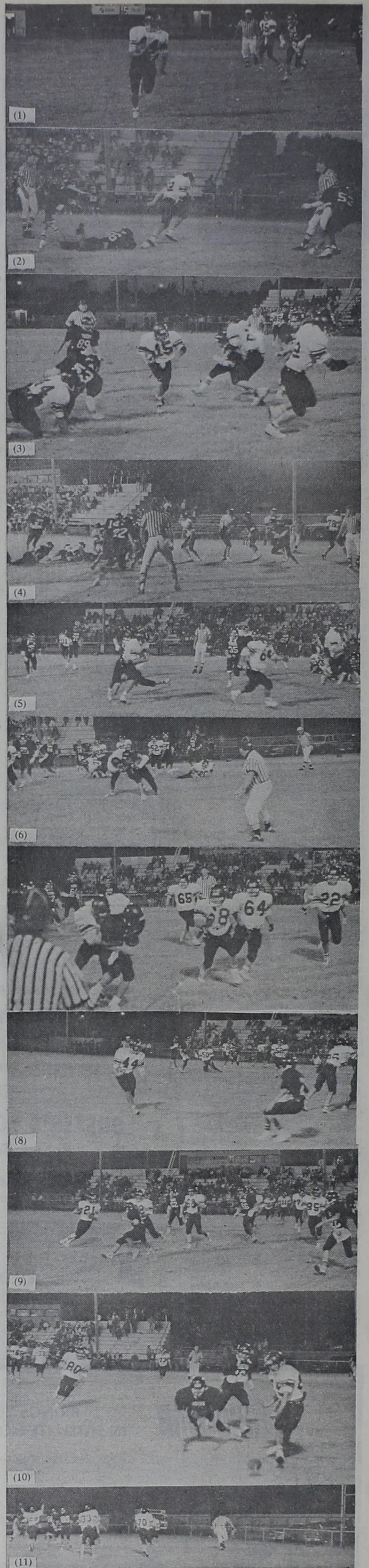

So thoroughly did the Mustangs dominate the Panthers after the Panthers scoring drive, Follett could only muster 75 yards in total offense for the rest of the game.

Wheeler iced the win when they scored 21 points in the second quarter to take a comfortable 21-7 lead into halftime and then added an insurance 7 points in the third quarter to get their final margin.

It only took the Mustangs 6 plays the second time they had the pigskin to get what looked like would be the tying touchdown. Wheeler opted for the two pointer and Smith got it.

With 2:38 remaining on the clock in the second period, Wheeler was on their 37 following a Follett kick. Shane Guest, Mustang wingback, broke loose around the left side on a reverse and was finally pulled down on the Follett 6. It only took two rushes by Smith to get the touchdown and then Lee McCasland booted the extra point.

Wheeler missed a couple of field goal tries in the game and the first one came with 1 second to play in the first half as McCasland was short on a 31 yard effort. McCasland missed another try from 48 yards as the game was winding down.

The Mustangs final TD came just 27 seconds before the third quarter ended when Smith took a pitch from Bradstreet and dashed 30 untouched yards for the touchdown. McCasland booted the extra point and Wheeler had easily cleared the Follett hurdle.

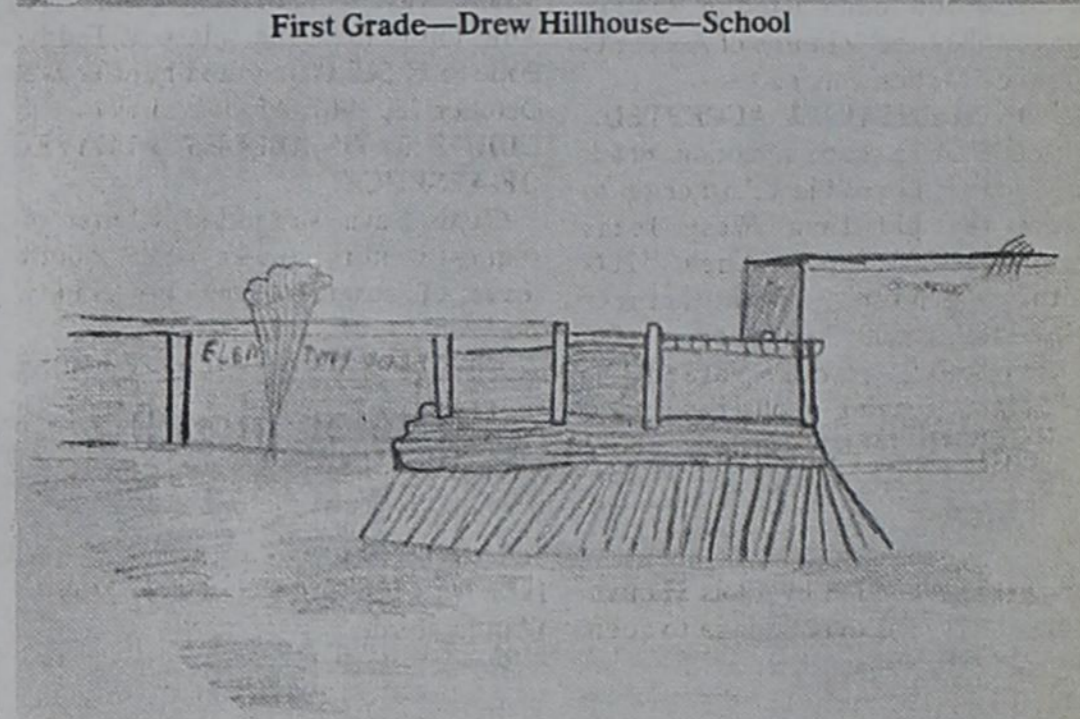

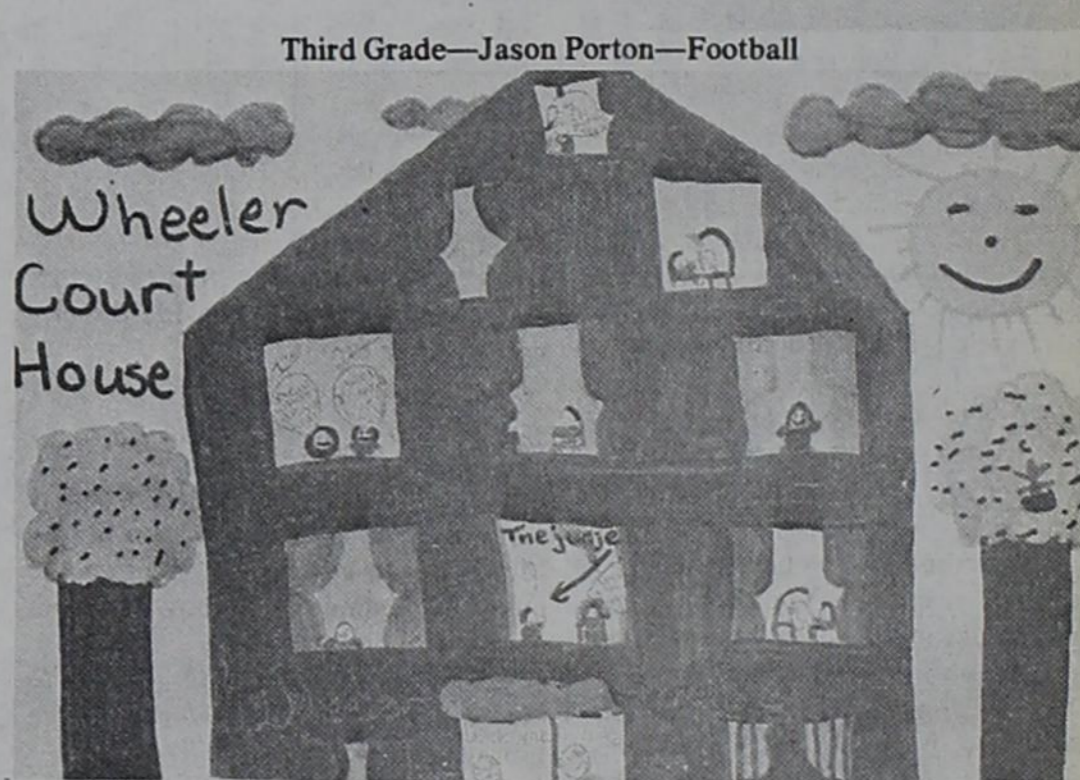

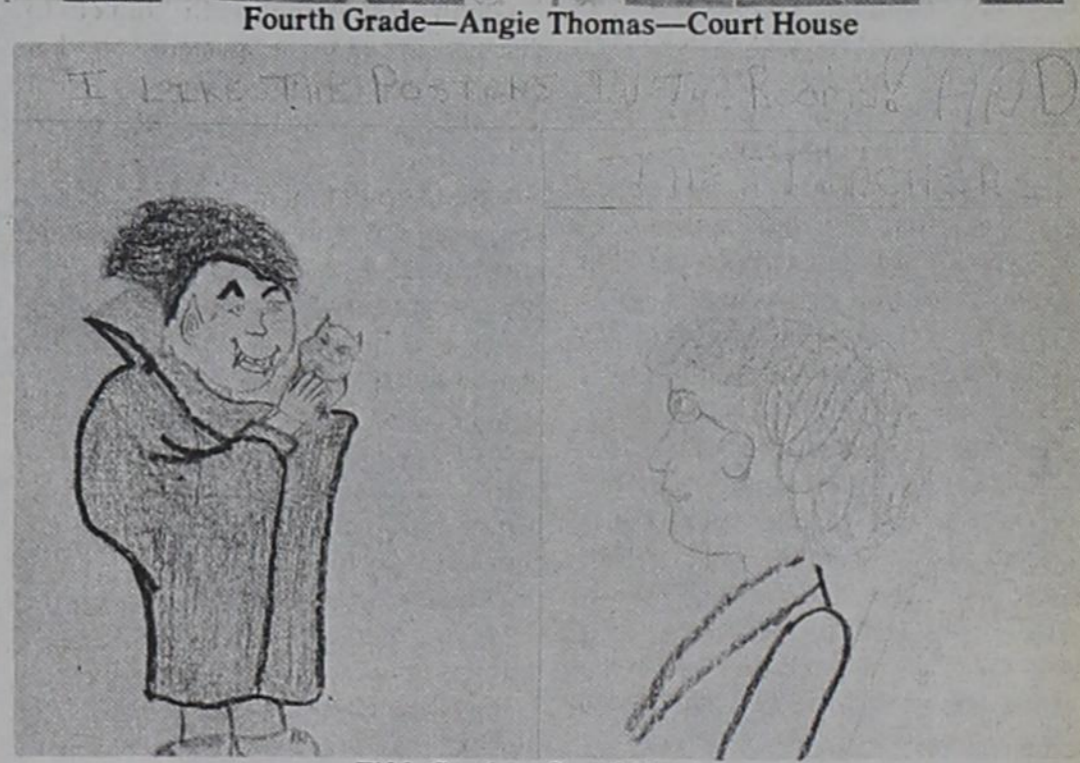

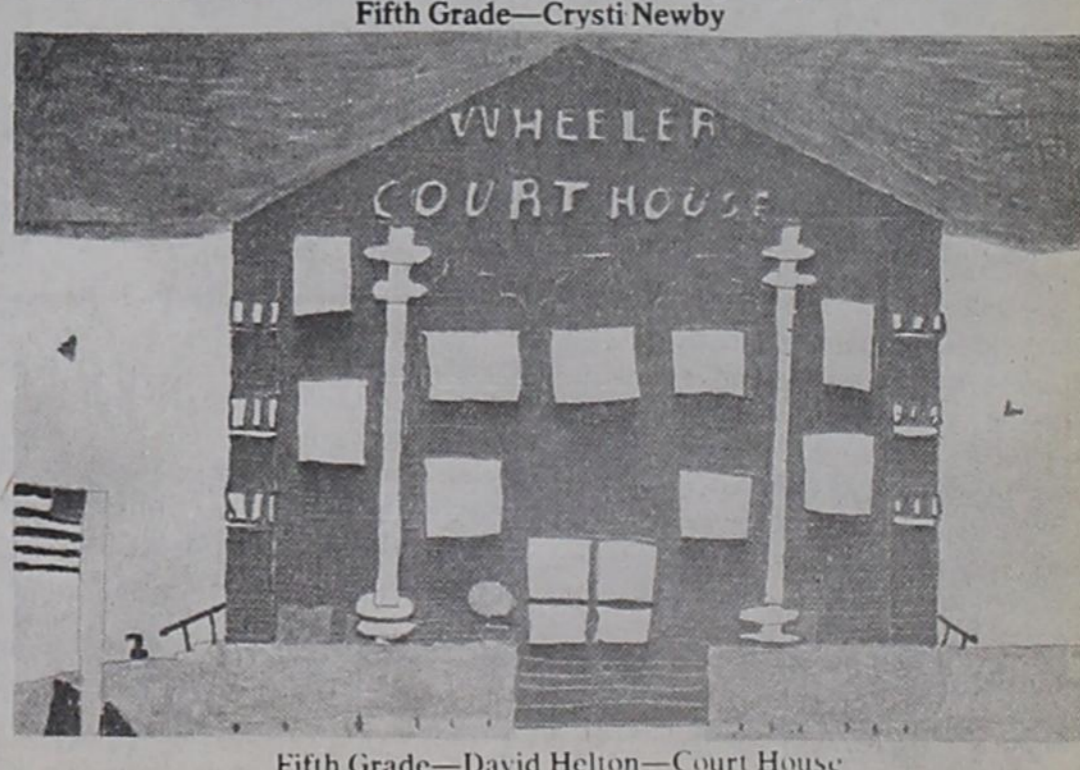

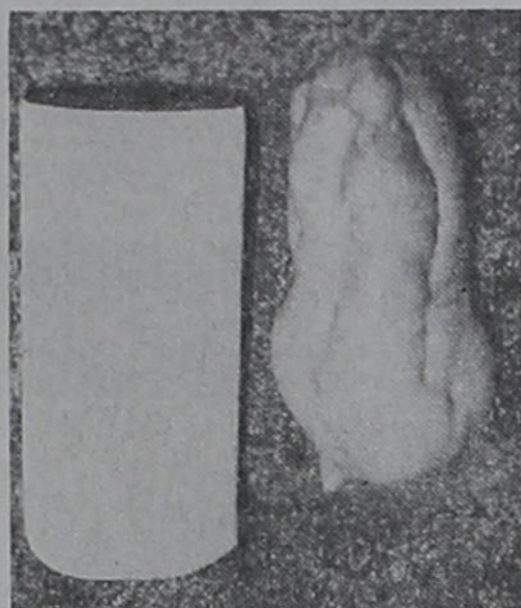
