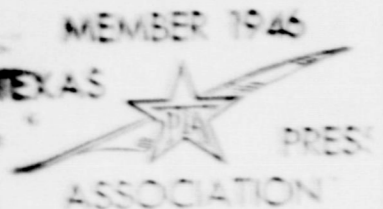

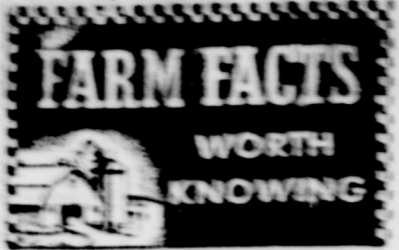

Are sheep ever infected with Bang's disease? A. Yes, there have been a few cases reported, but the disease is most common among dairy and beef cattle, goats and hogs.

How much straw is needed in the brooder house for baby chicks? A. The Bulletin Poultry Company, Research Farm recommends no more than two chicks per square foot during the first six weeks. Poultry up to 20 weeks should have three square feet per bird, while 21 to 40 weeks require 4 square feet per bird.

Is fattening beef for market now a common grade steers compared to feed steers? A. According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, common grade steers are raised only to a very short feeding period and are profitable only when their cost is bought very cheaply.

Required less feed per 100 lb gain. Made larger daily gain. Carcasses graded one full lb higher. Dressed 1.5% more. Pastured more rapidly.

How much feed is required to raise a steer to confinement for sale to market? A. The average amount of feed required from start until 20 weeks of age is about 10 tons, although this will vary according to the breed, condition, variety and state of confinement.

FIXING UP the HOME

KEEP KITTY HAPPY
 THE companionship of a cat or kitten in the home is sometimes marred by the animal's destructive habits. Cats have a natural urge to keep their claws very sharp and a fine oriental rug or a good heavy piece of upholstery material makes a very fine sharpening surface. It is a little hard, however, on the furniture.



Give kitty a good sharpening post and a training course and your troubles are over. You can make one of these "clawing posts" very easily with a piece of 4" by 4" lumber about 18" long, a piece of old carpet large enough to cover the post and a handful of catnip. You will also need, as a base, a piece of one inch board large enough for kitty to sit on when clawing.

Nail the post to the center of the base, tack the carpet neatly on the post with the catnip inside the carpet and the job is done. Then, every time kitty puts a paw threatening toward a chair or rug, scold him and take him immediately to his new toy. If he is watched carefully for about a week and punished each time he errs, he will soon give up his destructive habits. If you have little room for a post with this large base, put a hook into the top and hang it in a corner of the kitchen.

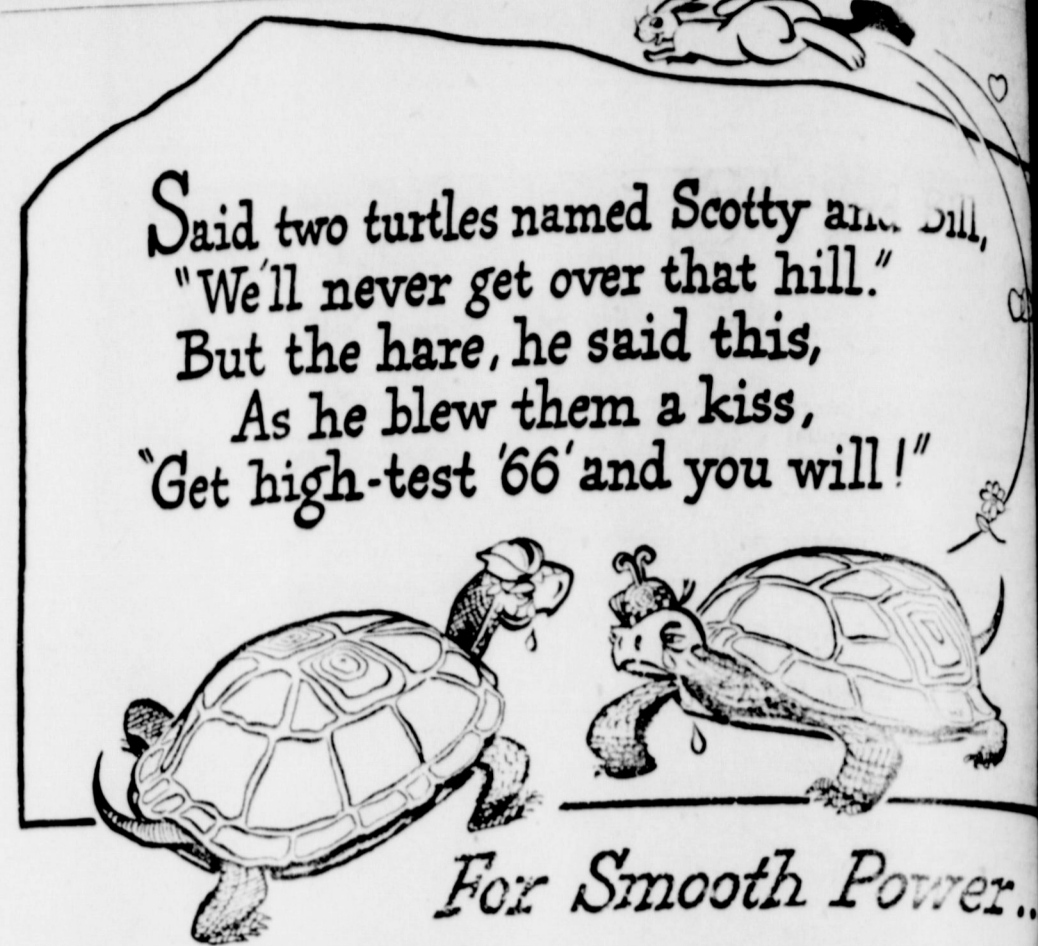

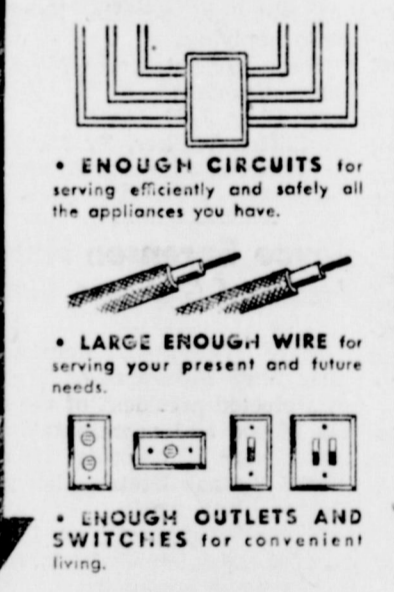

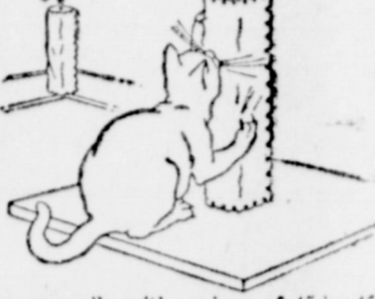

FIXING UP the HOME

KEEP KITTY HAPPY

THE companionship of a cat or kitten in the home is sometimes marred by the animal's destructive habits. Cats have a natural urge to keep their claws very sharp and a fine oriental rug or a good heavy piece of upholstery material makes a very fine sharpening surface. It is a little hard, however, on the furniture.

Give kitty a good sharpening post and a training course and your troubles are over. You can make one of these "clawing posts"

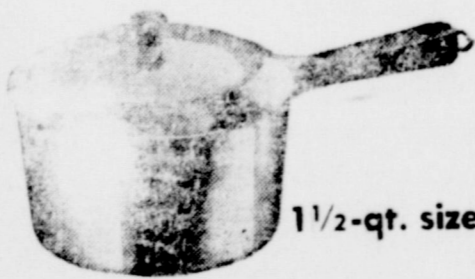

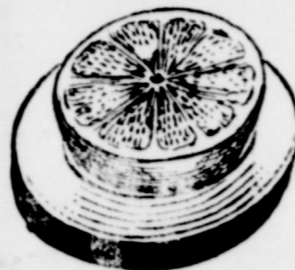

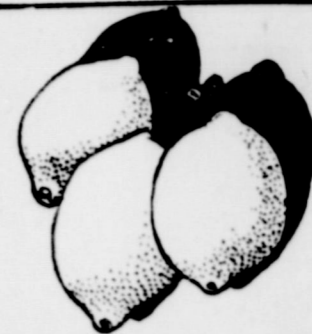

COUNTY ORDINANCE
ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE PRODUCTION, TRANSPORTATION, PROMISING, HANDLING, SAMPLING, EXAMINATION, READING, LABELING, READING, AND SALE OF MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS;

THE INSPECTION OF DAIRY HERDS, DAIRIES, AND MILK PLANTS; THE ISSUING AND REVOCATION OF PERMITS TO MILK PRODUCERS AND DISTRIBUTORS; THE PLACARDING OF RESTAURANTS AND OTHER ESTABLISHMENTS SERVING MILK OR MILK PRODUCTS; AND THE FIXING OF PENALTIES.

The County of Wheeler ordains: Section 1. The production,

transportation, processing, handling, sampling, examination, grading, labeling, regrading, and sale of all milk and milk products sold for ultimate consumption within the County of Wheeler, or its police jurisdiction, the inspection of dairy herds, dairies, and milk plants, the issuing and revocation of permits to milk producers and distributors, the placarding of restaurants and other establishments serving milk or milk products, and the fixing of penalties shall be regulated in accordance with the terms of the unbridged form of the 1939 edition of the United States Public Health Service milk ordinance, a certified copy of which shall be on file in the office of the county clerk: Provided, That the blank spaces following the words "County of" in said unbridged form shall be understood to refer to the county of Wheeler: Provided further, That in section 7, item 1r, of said unbridged form the abortion-testing requirement shall be effective within two (2) weeks after the adoption of this ordinance: Provided further, That section 8, 16, and 17 of said unbridged form shall be replaced, respectively, by sections 2, 3, and 4 below.

Section 2. From and after the first day of April, 1947 the date on which this ordinance takes effect no milk or milk products shall be sold to the final consumer, or to restaurants, soda fountains, grocery stores, or similar establishments except grade "A" raw milk or grade "A" pasteurized milk: Provided, That when any milk distributor fails to qualify for one of the above grades the health officer is authorized to revoke his permit, or in lieu thereof to degrade his product and permit its sale during a temporary period not exceeding 30 days or in emergencies such longer period as he may deem necessary.

Section 4. All dairies and milk plants from which milk or milk products are supplied to the county of Wheeler which are hereafter constructed, reconstructed, or extensively altered shall conform in their construction to the requirements of this Ordinance for grade "A" dairy farm producing milk for consumption in the raw state, or for grade "A" pasteurization plants, respectively. Properly prepared plans for all dairies and milk plants which are hereafter constructed, reconstructed or extensively altered shall be submitted to the county health officer or county sanitarian for approval before work is begun. In the case of milk plants signed approval shall be obtained from the health officer and/or the county health department. (Floor plans showing dimensions of each room, arrangement of equipment, light, ventilation, floor and wall construction, doors, drains, location of toilet, etc., of proposed pasteurization plants should be submitted to the State Department of Health at Austin, Texas for approval before construction or reconstruction begins.)

Section 5. Any person, firm, or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction be punished by fine in any amount not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

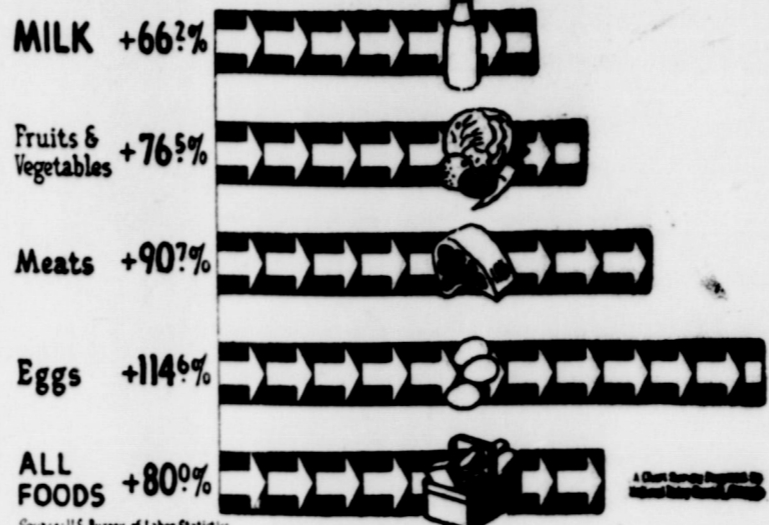
Section 6. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed; and this ordinance shall take effect the first day of April, 1947.

**YOKE OFF COW
WILL HELP
CALF CROP**

COLLEGE STATION—"Best way for a farmer to get a high calf crop and fast growing calves is to take the yokes off his cattle."

That statement, made by M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, may not seem to add up at first, but along with a little explanation, it means something for the Texas farmer in connection with producing high quality winter pastures.

To Thornton, yokes on cattle show that the farmer isn't furnishing his cows with good enough forage to make them want to stay on their side of the fence.

"This is the time of year," says Thornton, "when we drive down the highway and see large numbers of cattle with yokes around their necks, indicating their restlessness in trying to get the quantity and quality of feed they need. Then, as we drive on, we see contented cattle grazing on green winter pastures—a result of using the type fertilizers that produce high quality grazing. This forces us into the belief that the best way to keep the yoked cattle from tearing down fences is to provide them with the same kind of grazing that the contented cows are getting."

Getting rid of the yokes and furnishing cows with good winter

grazing is a question of building pastures with fertilizer, says Thornton. And this should not be considered an unnecessary expense; it's nothing but a profitable investment. From fertilized, well-developed winter pasture will come more calves that weigh more, are more alert and vigorous.

At the same time, cows will produce more milk and stand up better under nursing and other trials of high quality forage, the cow will "miss a calf" once in a while, and the calf that she does produce will be small and will grow slowly. Good winter forage will keep the cow's weight up, and she will be ready to produce a good calf every year.

The gist of the thing is, says Thornton, that now is when stockmen should begin to fertilize pastures to have good green forage next winter for their breeding stock. A sack of fertilizer on a pasture is a step toward a big herd of quality calves, and a better herd of breeding stock in general.

Eliminating yokes on cattle through pasture fertilization is eliminating yokes placed on the farmer by poor pastures.

One of the easiest, most worthwhile means of increasing buying power today is the home production of vegetables in a back-yard garden.

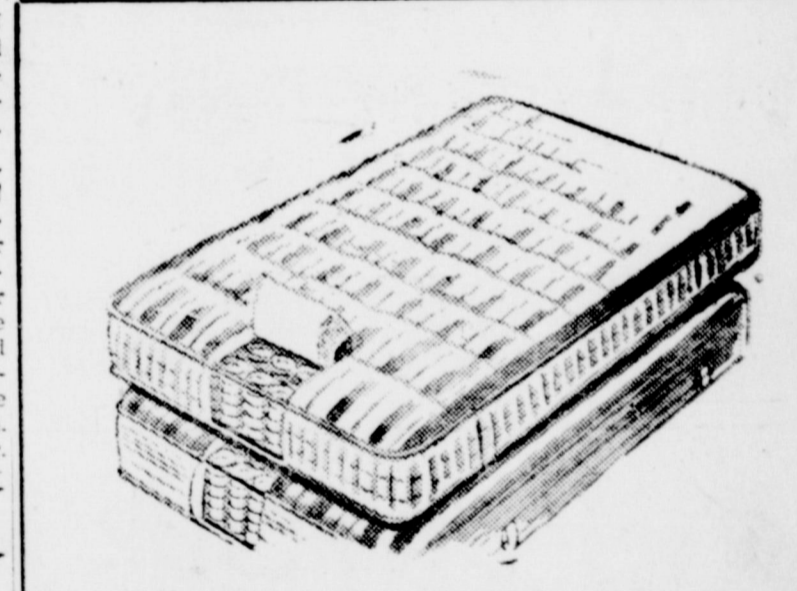

COLLEGE STATION—"The big blow" that swept across West Texas recently had its points—the duster, called by old timers "the strongest puff of wind that has hit Bailey County in many moons", would have caused ten times as much soil damage if it had come along before the days when farmers knew both how to protect their land from wind erosion.
Most Bailey County farmers were ready for it, Adams says. They left stubble in the fields

after the grain sorghum had ground to help anchor down top soil. The farmers are realizing the value of vegetative cover a protection against wind erosion says Adams, and to prevent soil from blowing up moisture loss, they are in too big a hurry to get the land opened up.
The County Extension is working with the Soil Conservation Service in promoting Bailey County's soil conservation program.

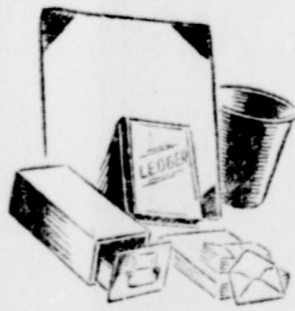
