Sounds like a 'fun day' not to mention all the good fellowship. **Don't miss it!**

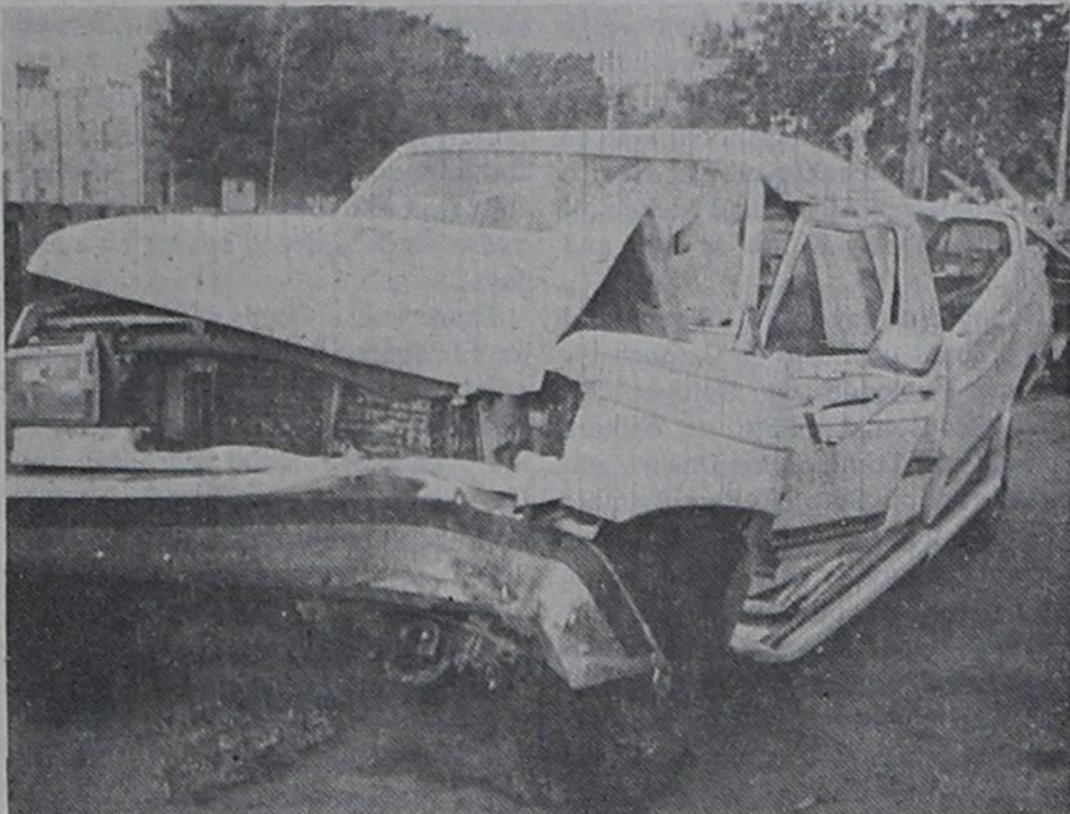

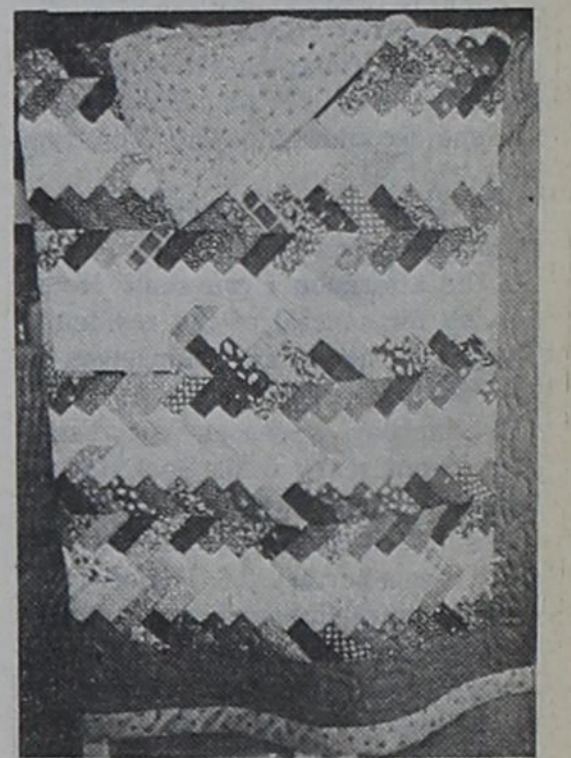

## Medical Physicians & Chiropractics Are Joined

The American Medical Association and its 275,000 members, when working in concert with the Ama, were permanently enjoined September 25, 1987 by United States District Court Judge Susan Getzendanner from "restricting, regulating or impeding the freedom of any AMA member or any institution or hospital to make an individual decision as to whether or not that AMA member, institution, or hospital shall professionally associate with chiropractors, chiropractic students, or chiropractic institutions."

Reports to reflect the AMA's representations to the Court that it is now "ethical for a medical physician to professionally associate with chiropractors provided the physician believes that such an association is in

the best interest of its patient;" and 3. to publish the Injunction Order in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

## FAMILY TIME

In 1837, families living in the Republic of Texas had to grow their own grain and grind their own flour. They had to mix their homegrown ingredients to bake their own bread. Today, bread is baked in a computerized bakery, thin-sliced and plastic-bagged and delivered to the local grocery store.

This tribute to hard-working, early Texans, is to remind you that although the bakery can do your bread for you, no one else can do your family. The family is an indispensable part of personal growth and development. It should be encouraged, enlivened and enhanced. One way to strengthen your family is through planned "Family Time".

Most families today don't spend much uninterrupted time together. Families and family members must compete with ballgames, chores, television, meetings, school work...

Family Time is based on the idea that each family can benefit from spending time together. Family Time is spent in quality projects, events and happenings which deepen, enrich and bring joy to family life. Family Time is a planned event which occurs each week.

Family Time doesn't have to be an elaborate or costly event. For example, try a "how-to" night, where family members (especially children and teens) learn some useful new skill, like how to write a check or change a tire. A family service project, such as picking up litter in a park, or baking cookies and sending them to someone, is another type of family time activity, or you can play games, do puzzles or discuss a television program you have watched together. With some thought, your family can think of numerous activities for family time.

Be creative in planning Family Time and allow each family member to share in the planning. Remember, however, that what you do is less important than doing it together.

## THE FAMILY: THE SIGNIFICANT TEACHER

On the isolated early American frontier, parents had to teach children everything they needed to know, from reading, writing and arithmetic, to planting, plowing and preserving. Their classes were small, students learned at their own pace and there were few dropouts.

Education in the eighties cannot follow this model, but families continue to be significant teachers. Families teach their children about culture, values, beliefs, getting along with others, self-reliance, love, goal-setting and work. To support these ideals, families are charged with providing children with experiences and opportunities that will give them educational skills to reinforce each of the family's values.

If parents want their children to prosper in an advanced, technical and oftentimes impersonal world, they must give them a strong emotional and educational foundation. Mass production may have worked for Henry Ford, but it doesn't work in education. Children cannot be placed on assembly lines and expected to grow as individuals. Families must continue to be the primary teachers of all children and take that responsibility seriously. When families and schools support each other, the child grows in strength and maturity.

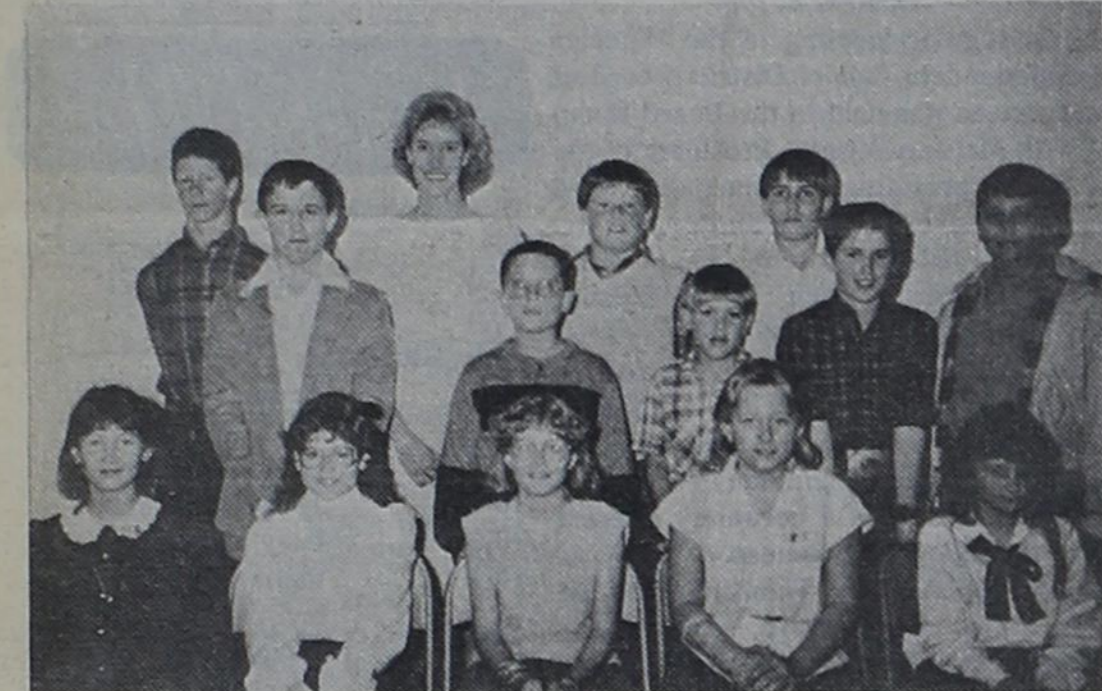
