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Wheeler Voted Back Into District 3-A

Wheeler high school has been re-instated as a member of District 3-A, entitling the Mustangs to continue competing with athletic teams of the larger schools of the 5-county area, Supt. W. O. Carrick said this morning.

The action was taken at a short session of 3-A school superintendents held at Wellington Wednesday night just before the Wellington Skyrockets and members of the all-district football team were entertained at their annual banquet.

The Mustangs' re-admission to the 3-A conference came by unanimous vote. Wheeler had been dropped from the district roster on December 16 because of the poor athletic competition Mustangs had shown in recent years and because of charges of bad sportsmanship on the part of Wheeler fans and the poor conditions of the Mustang playing field.

The case was re-opened at the instance of Supt. Elmer worked tirelessly with Carrick in ironing out the difficulties. J. Moore of Shamrock, Moore and Bob Clark of Shamrock, responsible for Wheeler having been dropped.

Carrick today expressed his thanks to both Wheeler and Shamrock people who assisted him in his efforts to re-gain admission to the conference. He said membership in 3-A is worthy of any school's best efforts and called fans and students alike to cooperate in maintaining a brand of sports of which the entire district will be proud.

Public Is Invited To Attend Opening Rogue Theatre On January 30

The public will get a chance to view Wheeler's new and larger Rogue theatre next Thursday, January 30, when the doors will be open at 6:30 p. m., Lee Guthrie, owner announced this week.

There will be a 30-minute period for the public to inspect the modern building and equipment. Mayor R. H. Forrester will make a brief talk and at 7 o'clock the picture, "Three Little Girls in Blue," will go on the screen in beautiful technicolor.

Mr. and Mrs. Guthrie and Corky, cordially invite the public to be present for the opening. They are understandingly proud of the new Rogue which is one of the finest movie houses in the country, regardless of size of the city.

The new building which is 50 feet wide in the auditorium, seats 500 people and is newly equipped throughout with exception of some seats removed from the other theatre because only 270 new ones were presently available. Complete new equipment has been installed consisting of E-7 Simplex projectors and Simplex dual sound system, new plastic screen, large cooling system, circulating heaters and pop corn machine.

The front of the building is occupied by the ticket office on one side and a pop corn room on the other. The theatre has large ladies and gents rest rooms, sound proof cry room, and a fire-proof projection room with automatic fire shutters. A 50-seat balcony storage room and office, occupy the mezzanine floor.

Wheeler's fine new theatre is the result of much planning by the Guthries and represents a large financial investment. It was on June 9, 1930, that the Guthries showed their first picture in Wheeler, "Street Girl," the first talking movie brought to Wheeler. They had purchased the theatre from Dr. H. E. Nicholson.

From the start, the Guthries have given patrons of the Wheeler territory the very finest projection and sound service possible and have made additions looking to the public's enjoyment.

Their opening picture, "Three Little Girls in Blue," stars June Haver, George Montgomery and Vivian Blaine, and is an outstanding attraction. On Friday, January 31, the same picture will be shown, starting promptly at 6:30 o'clock without any preliminaries. Two complete shows will be given each night and the management trusts part of the public will plan to attend the second night, avoiding too large a crowd.

Mr. Guthrie announces that beginning Saturday, February 1, the regular schedule will be resumed with no advance in prices except that all admissions, including Friday and Saturday, will be 14c and 40c. In the past Friday and Saturday show was 35c and the child admission will include all children occupying seats.

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PROMOTION TO MARVIN JONES

The many Wheeler county friends of Marvin Jones, the Panhandle congressman for 24 years, will be glad to learn he has been nominated by President Truman to be chief justice of the United States Court of Claims.

He was named to succeed Richard S. Whaley of South Carolina, who announced his retirement because of age last week, the Associated Press reported.

Judge Jones has been a member of the court since 1940, when he was nominated to judge ship by President Roosevelt. He served as 18th Texas District congressman from 1916 to 1940.

He was one of the nation's leaders in agricultural affairs while a member of the House. He was ranking minority member of the House Agricultural Committee before the Democratic landslide of 1931. From 1931 until his retirement, he served as chairman of the committee.

During the war, Judge Jones took leave of the court to serve as war food administrator for two years. He also was farm advisor to the economic stabilizer. In the former post, he presided over the United Nations conference on food and agriculture in Hot Springs, Va., in 1943.

The jurist returned to the court in 1945, and has been designated an associate justice of the Court of Claims.

WORLEY STAYS ON FARM WORK IN WASHINGTON

Congressman Eugene Worley of Wheeler county has been announced as a member of the House Committee on Agriculture, a post he wished to continue on in the hope he can be of greater service to his Panhandle district which is largely agricultural.

While in the district last summer Worley discussed the possibility of shifting to the Committee on Foreign Affairs because of present interest in the drafting of world peace plans.

Washington dispatches quote him: "I feel that I can be of real service to my district and the State of Texas by remaining on the Committee on Agriculture during the drafting of a postwar farm program. With Republicans in control of Congress there is danger of discrimination against Southern agriculture unless the Southern members watch carefully. I intend to fight for a bill which gives the same consideration to cotton, cattle and other Southern crops as for those grown in the Midwest and North."

COUNTY'S 1947 CAR TAGS HERE

Wheeler County's 1947 motor vehicle license plates arrived Monday at the office of T. J. Daughtry, tax assessor-collector.

The plates are finished in black with white letters and numerals. The lettering "A-J" signifies Wheeler County, and motorists this year will receive two plates for each vehicle, one for the front and one for the rear, just like they did back in pre-war days.

Wheeler County is fortunate to receive the metal plates, Daughtry said, adding about one-half the counties in Texas will receive only stickers at present, but that later they will be replaced by plates.

The plates will go on sale at the assessor-collector's office in Wheeler and J. B. Zeigler's office in Shamrock on February 1. They cannot be placed on vehicles before March 1, however, and must be on by April 1.

Daughtry stated Monday that 1,650 poll tax receipts had been issued up to that time, which is a fairly large number considering the fact that 1947 is an off year as far as regular elections are concerned. Last year, 2,800 poll taxes were paid.

There were 148 Wheeler county claimants for unemployment benefits listed in the files of the Pampa district Texas Unemployment Compensation office on January 20, according to L. F. Fort, manager.

Total unemployment including veterans, was 674 in the four county area served by Pampa. On January 1, there were 574 active claimants compared to 674 on January 20.

The report showed 49 Wheeler county veterans were self-employed which are not counted as unemployed but are listed to reflect the number of veterans who are conducting their own business and receiving aid under the GI bill at the time.

Of the total of 674 listed as unemployed in Gray, Wheeler, Roberts and Carson counties, 408 of them were veterans drawing unemployment benefits under the GI bill.

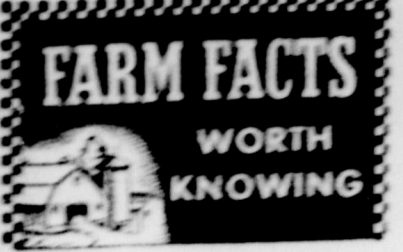

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. Are there any figures to show the effects of feeding wheat with DDT?

A. Yes. Kansas State College has recently put out a bulletin giving actual results in test demonstrations using DDT to control the horn fly. More than two million cattle were successfully treated with DDT for horn flies during the 1946 grazing season. These cattle gained about 34 lbs. a head more than untreated cattle. According to this horn fly alone was causing a loss of at least 25 million dollars annually to Kansas cattlemen.

Q. Does a hen's body weight have any influence on her ability to produce eggs?

A. No. According to the Virginia Station Technical Bulletin No. 94, measurements of 204 White Leghorn pullets indicated that neither body weight nor the normal range nor body type was shown to be a reliable index of egg-production ability of the hen, nor could either be used as a guide in predicting future egg production or in estimating the past production of a hen. However, birds that are definitely under weight or over weight should not be kept in a laying flock.

Q. Does feeding wheat germ oil increase the fertility of bulls?

A. Probably not. After extensive, independent trials, the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm and researchers at Cornell University have been unable to find that wheat germ oil makes any difference in the fertility of bulls.

Q. Will calves vaccinated for Bang's disease spread the disease to other cows?

A. The evidence is that a properly vaccinated calf will not spread Bang's disease to disease-free cows.

Q. How long may hatching eggs be kept before they are put in the incubator?

A. Hatching eggs should be placed in the incubator after a maximum of one week, although it is possible to keep them as long as two weeks. Hatching drops quite rapidly after the eggs have been held for ten days.

Deep Breking Will Prevent Wind Erosion

Plans have been made for entering both teams in the Samnorwood tournament, January 31 and February 1.

COLLEGE STATION—Demonstration in Terry County indicate that breaking land deeply is a worthwhile practice in preventing wind erosion and getting larger crop yields in West Texas.

Terry County Agricultural Agent E. N. McClain reports that the demonstrations carried out show that land broken deep enough to bring clay to the top of the ground suffers "scarcely any" from wind erosion, and "in practically every instance" deeply broken plots showed crop yield increases over unbroken land.

On the J. J. Jones farm in the Jackson Community, a plot was broken 12 inches deep and planted in milo. County Agent McClain says, his plot yielded 400 pounds more grain than a plot of equal size that was not broken deeply. And on the Beavers farm near

Wellman, 150 acres were broken to a depth of 26 inches and double the amount raised on shallow-broken land.

The clay brought to the surface by the deep breaking offers a definite resistance to erosion, McClain says.

Information On Poultry Livestock Diseases Now Available From A. & M.

COLLEGE STATION—A service long-needed by poultry and livestock producers has been started by the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

The service consists of a system of monthly reports, coming from county agricultural agents and veterinarians, giving information on poultry and livestock diseases, where and when the disease occur, and the number of cases occurring.

Dr. E. A. Grist, veterinarian for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who operates a central clearing point for the information, reports that the system of gathering information has been in effect for four months, and the figures gathered to date have afforded excellent opportunity to issue timely disease warnings and suggested control programs.

With the aid of the Economics division of the Extension Service, the information is being compiled according to Texas soil areas and types. Dr. Grist points out that while it is impossible now to measure the real worth of the system, it has shown more clearly the need for better poultry and livestock disease control in Texas.

For instance, mastitis of dairy cattle, an udder inflammation, is a disease that is ordinarily considered a small item affecting dairy production. Yet during September, October, and November, county agents and veterinarians reported over 4,000 cases of mastitis in Texas. Cases occurred in every county in the state.

Dr. Grist says that such a livestock summary can be of great value in developing future programs to prevent and control livestock and poultry disease.

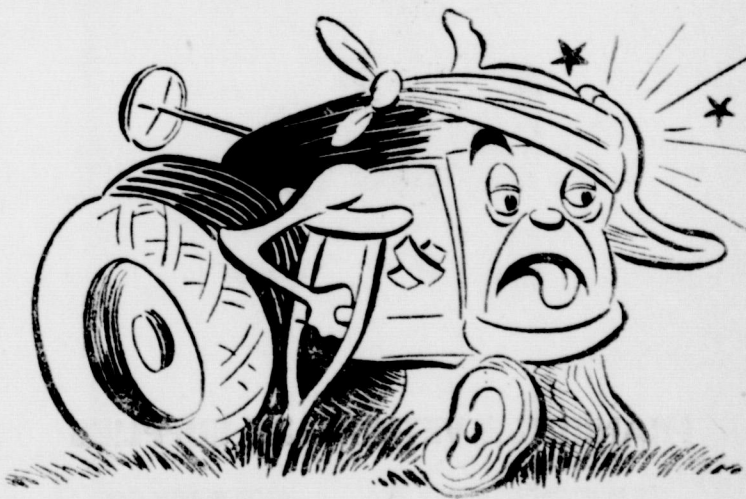

Veterans' News

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q—Does Veterans Administration pay any part of any guaranteed loan?

A—Yes. Veterans Administration will pay to the lender as a credit on the loan an amount equal to 4 percent of the amount guaranteed. This is a gift and is not to be repaid by the veteran.

Q—Can I use my terminal leave bonds as security for a G. I. loan?

A—No. Terminal leave bonds are non-negotiable and non-transferable. However, they may be used to pay premiums on National Service Life Insurance.

Q—What are the compensation rates payable to World War II veterans for service-connected disabilities?

A—The rates range from \$13.80 a month for a 10 percent disability to \$138 a month for total disability. For certain specific disabilities, the rates may be as high as \$360 a month.

Q—Where can I get information about readjustment allowance?

A—For specific information about readjustment allowances and your eligibility for them, you may inquire at a public employment office or at an office of the unemployment compensation agency in the state or territory in which you reside.

Q—I have been working part time and my readjustment allowance has never been over \$15 because of my income from other sources. Am I entitled to additional weeks of readjustment?

A—The number of weekly allowances to which you may be entitled is strictly limited. You receive payment of a weekly allowance, regardless of the dollar amount, you use up one of the limited number to which you may be entitled.

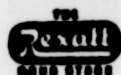
