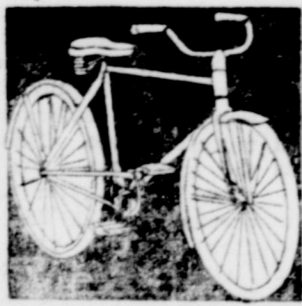

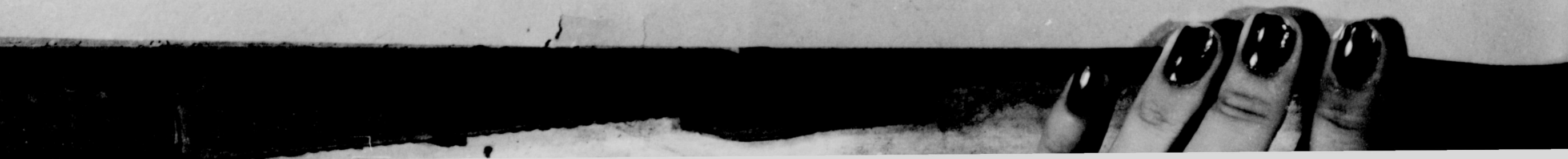

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How much head room is required for broilers raised in batteries?

A. Head room depends, of course, upon the age of the chick. We recommend 11 inches of head room for starting chicks and 14 inches for chicks from six to 12 weeks of age. Broilers should not be left in batteries after they reach 12 weeks.

Q. What is the best age to vaccinate pigs against cholera?

A. Veterinarians are favoring more and more the early vaccination of pigs by the double treatment method. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company, results on 25,000 pigs show that vaccination at six weeks of age has given complete life-time protection. The following are advantages of vaccination of younger pigs:

1. Greater freedom from temporary adverse effects of vaccination.
2. Smaller quantities of serum and virus required.
3. Smaller animals more convenient to handle.

Q. How often should dairy cows freshen?

A. For maximum production, dairy cows should be bred to freshen at approximately the same time each year. If your cow freshens in March this year, she should be bred in June so that she'll freshen again next March.

Q. What causes my hens to eat their eggs, and how can I break them of this habit?

A. The cause is unknown, but the problem is probably created by an egg being accidentally broken, the hen tasting it and developing a craving for eggs. To overcome this problem we recommend the following to keep the eggs from being broken:

1. Feeding adequate oyster shell and vitamin D in the ration to overcome thin-shelled eggs.
2. Keeping the nests well littered so the hens can't break the eggs.
3. Gathering the eggs at least three times a day.
4. Darkening the nests.
5. Clipping the beaks of egg-eating hens.

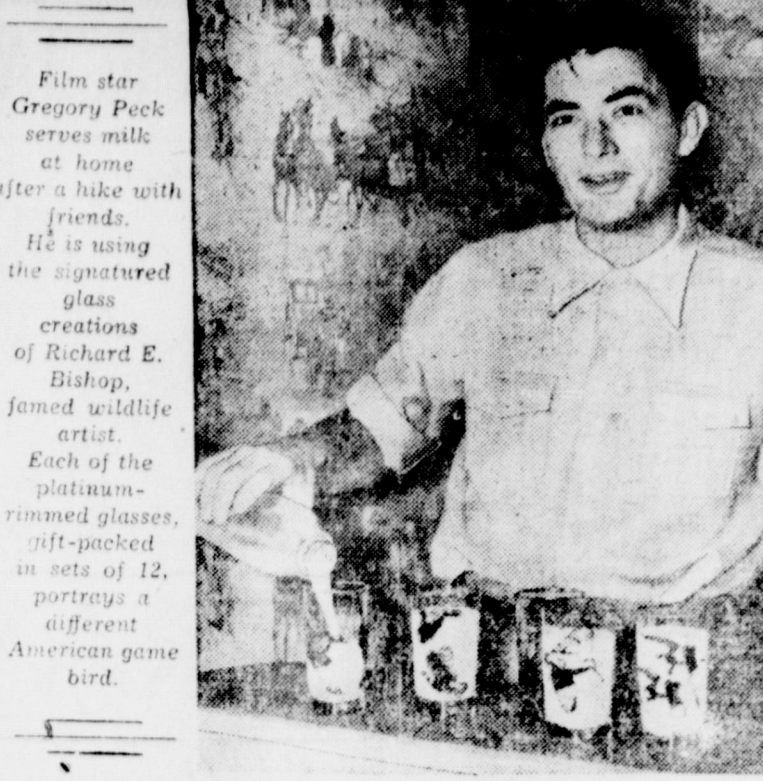

News In World Of Religion

By W. W. REID

With the endorsement of the United States Department of Agriculture and of church leaders of all faiths, the children of American churches are being asked to plant a "Children's Memorial Forest" near Nazareth, in Palestine, in memory of the more than one million defenseless Jewish children slain in Europe during World War II. The idea originated with the American Christian Palestine Committee, of which Dean Howard M. LeSourd, of Boston University, is director. Dr. Walter Lowdermilk, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, points out that this planting of trees will be a step in reclaiming soil in the Holy Land and making it fit for added populations.

Bishop Herbert Welch, of the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, announces that in addition to giving some of its relief funds to the "Heifer Project Committee" originated by the United Brethren Church, the Methodist Committee has recently sent 44 draught horses, 39 Holstein heifers and one bull to Europe, for use by Methodist farmers in the Masurian Lakes section of Poland.

Church leaders of several communions have been aroused by the recent announcement by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace that its investigators have discovered that public schools textbooks ignore almost completely the contribution to progress made by American Negroes in many walks of life. This conclusion was based

on the study of 413 approved textbooks in history and related subjects. The investigators also found that very few textbooks have done anything to lessen racial prejudice and promote understanding, and that some "tend to perpetuate antagonisms now current in American life." It is a subject that will receive attention in church and church educational circles during coming meetings and conventions.

In urging that church people give generously of food and clothing through Church World Service and denominational relief agencies for the needy of the world during the Lenten weeks, Bishop Elwood L. Haines, of Iowa, says, "If fasting will sharpen our own spiritual sensibilities, then by all means let us fast in Lent. If helping others to be fed with spiritual food will increase our own realization of our need for God and his grace, then by all means let us give to work relief during Lent."

Florida's recent record cold-wave destroying much fruit and vegetables, has thrown 50,000 migrant farm laborers out of work, and most of them will be penniless before they can hope to travel north for new spring farm jobs, according to Miss Margaret J. Harris, of West Palm Beach, of the staff of the Home Missions Council of North America. More than half these workers are American whites and Negroes, migrating in family groups; others include Bahamians, Jamaicans and Barbadians brought from the West Indies by agreement with the British government. Miss Harris is cooperating with Florida authorities in directing some of the migrants into other work; but the non-residents are having to depend on the Salvation Army, the Red Cross, the local churches and church agencies for relief.

"I am seeing a country through the pangs of birth pains; I have been in the midst of riots and trouble," says Dr. Harold Ehrenzperger, of Nashville, Tenn., prominent Methodist clergyman and editor now visiting in India. "If you were to ask me just what my reaction is, I should say that I am now convinced more than ever before that no matter what the outcome of all this may be, there is one imperative. That is: a religion that can give people a sense of the sacredness of human personality and a unity that grows out of a God-concept that has in it the fundamental and all-important aspect of fatherhood, so that we all feel relationship that is now superficial and surface sentimentality. I shall come back with a sense of the terrible problems that face all of us, for I think we need the religion as much as India. What we need is a world revival, or better, a new world understanding of Christianity. Each country needs it in its own peculiar way, but we all need it."

Some of the people who say "Yes, yes" to everybody, may find people saying "No, no" to them when they want something.

DR. COX GIVES TIMELY TIPS

AUSTIN—Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports now that swimming pools are soon to open, was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Vacation days are apt to include excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and sometimes without the usual life-guard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and cur-

rents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted; swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

100 ARE KILLED IN '46

The toll exacted from accidents in 1946 today by the National Council is 4 per cent. Despite the increase, the final Council said the final four months of the year the traffic deaths toll up 45 per cent.

The 1946 all-accident death rate was 714 per hundred thousand population. Only five years since 1900 had lower rates, and the lowest (68.1 for 1921) was only 4 per cent less than the 1946 rate.

Nevertheless, one out of every 13 persons in the United States suffered a disabling injury in 1946.

The estimated economic loss of \$5,690,000,000 from accidents in 1946 covers both fatal and non-fatal accidents and includes wage losses, medical expense and overhead costs of insurance for all accidents, production delays, damage to equipment in occupational accidents and property damage from traffic accidents and fires.

Deaths of children under 5 increased 4 per cent in 1946, but children in the 5-14 year group had an 8 per cent decrease. There were 12 per cent more deaths in the 15-24 year group, and 5 per cent more for the 25-44 group. Persons

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45 to 64 years had a 5 per cent increase in deaths, and older persons a 2 per cent rise.

Falls, always a heavy killer, brought death to 27,800 persons in 1946—about the same as in 1945. Deaths from burns numbered 10,200—a 3 per cent increase from 1945. Drownings in 1946 totaled 7,300—an increase of 2 per cent. Firearms accidents rose 24 per cent to 3,100.

Catastrophes in which the toll was at least five lives were less frequent in 1946. Up to the closing days of 1946, the number of deaths in such catastrophes totaled about 1,300, according to the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. This was the lowest since 1941.

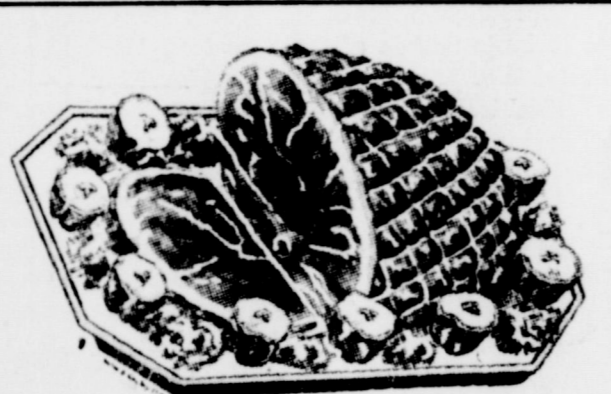

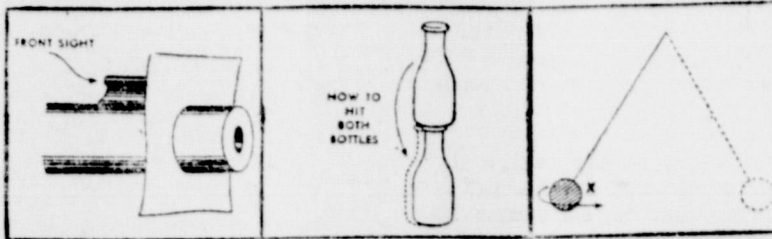

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Why is it that National Service Life Insurance premiums are so low, yet there are no restrictions as to occupation, travel or residence?

A—Premiums are kept at a minimum because all operating expenses and all excess costs resulting from death or total disability traceable to the extra hazard of the military or naval service are borne by the government and paid from separate appropriations.

Q—I would like to reinstate my National Service Life Insurance term policy which lapsed in 1945, and would like to know how to go about it?

A—Through August 1, 1947 the requirements to reinstate a term policy up to and including August 1, 1947, regardless of the date of lapse, are the payment of only two monthly premiums and a signed statement that you are in as good health as you were on the date of such lapse. Such statement of comparative health ordinarily will be acceptable. You can obtain an application for reinstatement at any Veterans Administration office.

Q—What is the due date of my premium on my National Service Life Insurance policy?

A—The date on which a premium is due is the date in the month as that on which the insurance originally was made effective. This date is on the insurance certificate.

Q—My National Service Life Insurance premiums have been waived due to a total disability. Can I convert my term insurance to a permanent plan and still have my premiums waived?

A—You have the privilege of converting to ordinary life, 20-payment life, or 30-payment life and the waiver of premiums will remain in effect as long as you are totally disabled.

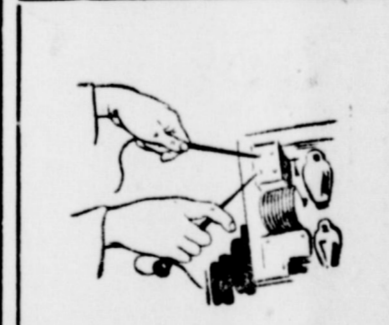

for a while, then they are sent to other countries, and copies of other books are sent to Wheeler county. Any book or money donations made from the citizens of Wheeler county would stay in Wheeler county and would not be sent out of the county with the circulating books.

Wheeler county would be expected to take care of the salaries of the local librarian, furnish the space for the library, and the upkeep of the bookmobile. Until the plan was tried, it has been suggested that we hire one librarian to supervise the entire county. If so, as the time may be, could stay in the bookmobile library two days a week, the sub-station library one day a week, service the north part of the county with the bookmobile one day a week and the south end of the county (based on a 48 hour week). These details would of course have to be worked out with the Commissioners Court. The above is merely one suggestion.

The thought was brought out in the meeting that if children were given access to a library they would have their minds occupied with subjects that would help them in their education and also give their time usefully instead of having them in their own de-

The county's 5,280 single-family homes will account for most expenditures, the study revealed. Painting is the most often wanted improvement, with about a third of all owners planning to redecorate home exteriors at some point of the interior. At least one out of every 10 dwellings needs carpentry repairs, and large numbers will have wallpaper repaired, bathrooms tiled or showers installed during the year, according to the report.

As evidence of the increase in building supplies, Orman pointed out that floor and wall improvements are expected to hit an all-time high this year. "Stagnated production of materials means that the construction industry can both build record numbers of houses and to the repair work neglected during the war," he said.

Some repair expenditures in the county are part of a \$24,880,000 modernization program, he said, undertaken in Texas this year, according to the study.

There is no greater or more worthwhile way to invest our time, efforts and money than in training the minds of our children in the right channels. Our teachers would be greatly benefited in their efforts to educate our children if they could give their reference work on nearly every subject and the child would have access to numerous books pertaining to the assigned subject. Our adult population would have the opportunity to continue with their education as well as derive a great deal of pleasure from a library.

"At the present time there is a bill before the Texas Legislature to allocate additional money to the library fund. Our representatives have received numerous letters and telegrams from people all over Texas who are interested in seeing that this bill is passed. It would not be amiss for every citizen in Wheeler County who is interested in this bill to write to Gov. Hammond, Austin, Texas, and tell him that we want this bill passed.

"If you are interested in a better County, sit down right now and get a letter off to Mr. Hammond on this and let the Wheeler County commissioners know that you are interested in obtaining a library. If you desire additional information on this project, write to Woodrow Sims, Statehouse, who is chairman of the committee. This is a worthy movement; let's all get behind it and see that Wheeler County gets its much needed library."
