REYNOLDS TELLS DETAILS ABOUT TRAGIC NIGHT

EDITOR'S NOTE:—For the benefit of Times readers who do not take a daily paper we are reproducing herewith, in part, an account of events which happened to Robert O. Reynolds, his three children and Mrs. Booker Toon between the time they became stuck in the mud near the home of Sam Wolford 9 miles south of Stratford Tuesday afternoon, February 10 until sometime during the night Wednesday, February 11. The account is from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

At Amarillo Reynolds said he, his mother-in-law and the three young children left the Pronger Ranch in a small truck to visit Mrs. Reynolds at Cactus Tuesday afternoon, but ran off the road into a mudhole near the Wolford home, which is between the Pronger Ranch and Cactus.

It was then past 4 p. m. Tuesday and he made his way to the Wolford home to ask for help.

Wolford took his tractor and pulled the truck out of the mud. It was obvious that the cold wave which had already entered the Panhandle would increase in severity and he invited the family to spend the night at his home, but Mrs. Toon was anxious to go on and see the new Reynolds baby. He gave Reynolds gas and the latter drove on.

The storm developed the temperature dropping rapidly as snow whipped before a sharp wind. The truck stalled in a snowbank, again slipping off the road. The engine died and could not be restarted.

Snow Jams Door.

Reynolds said he wanted to get out and go for help again, but his mother-in-law said she was afraid for him to leave them in the truck. Later he said snow had piled up so heavily against the doors that he could not get out of the truck.

One window of the truck was broken. There was no heater and the party had only a few blankets to keep them warm.

Many hours later, well into Wednesday morning, the wind shifted and moved the snow away from one door. He got out and made his way to the home of Wilbur Wilson, on the Wolford farm, some three-fourths of a mile from where the truck stalled.

He learned that Wilson was bedridden with a sprained back and could not help him, but he was warmed and given some clothing.

He left the Wilson house at noon and walked four miles back to the Wolford home arriving there about 4 p. m.

Wolford said that after Reynolds had told him of the new plight of his family, he improvised a platform on his tractor and started with the ranch employee for the truck.

Panhandle Residents Subscribe Funds To Aid Tragedy Survivors

The blizzard which last week claimed the lives of three Wheeler County residents has given the people of the Panhandle an opportunity to again prove they are the kindest, most generous folk on earth.

Since the tragic death last Thursday of Mrs. Booker Toon of Wheeler and her two small grandchildren, John Wayne and Juanita Reynolds who live on a ranch near Stratford, the warm-hearted people of this area have contributed more than \$2,000.00 to the family whose "luck ran out on them."

A delegation from Dalhart called on Robert O. Reynolds in Wheeler Tuesday and presented him with \$1,000.00, contributed by the residents of that North Plains city. The drive was launched by Joe L. Smith, a Dallam County rancher.

Residents of Mobettie, home of the Reynolds family for the past eight years, have contributed \$300.00 to the fund and Gageby, a nearby community, has turned in \$47.00.

Residents of Wheeler raised approximately \$450.00 which was presented to the Reynolds family and Booker Toon jointly to help span the financial gap caused by the tragedy.

Roy Burcham and George Robinson, employees of the Tower Service Station at Shamrock, where two of Reynolds' brothers, Allen and James, also work, conducted a fund-raising campaign in Shamrock which netted \$225.00.

Mrs. Reynolds and two surviving sons, Kenneth Wayne, 15 months old, and a two-week-old baby, came Saturday to her father's home in Wheeler from the Cactus Ordnance Works near Dumas. She was able to attend the services for her mother and two sons.

Mr. Reynolds who was still in St. Anthony's Hospital at Amarillo at that time, was brought to Wheeler Tuesday. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Reynolds of Mobettie, where they have resided the past eight years.

After one year in the Army, young Reynolds was discharged in 1945. He and his family resided in Mobettie since that time until six months ago when he accepted employment on a railroad at Dumas. Four months ago he went to work on a ranch near Stratford.

SERVICES HELD FOR VICTIMS OF STORM, SUNDAY

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist Church here for Mrs. Booker Toon and her two grandchildren, Juanita Louise and Robert Wayne Reynolds, who died Wednesday night February 11 of exposure in the worst blizzard of the year to date in the Panhandle.

Rev. M. B. Smith, pastor of the local church, was in charge of the triple rites and was assisted by Rev. G. W. Simmons, retired Baptist minister who resides here.

It is estimated a throng twice as large as could possibly get inside the church at one time gathered at the funeral services to pay loving tribute to the three victims of a terrible tragedy.

Mrs. Maggie Jessie Toon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Woodruff, was born January 11, 1901 in Lamar County, Texas and passed away February 11, 1948 at the age of 47 years and one month. She was married April 8, 1917 to Booker James Toon in Cove, Arkansas and to this union were born five children, Codine, who died in infancy, Mrs. Eudine Shew, Mrs. Allie Juanita Reynolds, Sybil Wandalle Toon and Emmitt Duke (Buddy) Toon.

The Toons moved to Wheeler in 1942 coming here from Atlanta, Texas where they had resided previously.

Mrs. Toon was a faithful member of the local Baptist Church having affiliated herself with that organization soon after coming here in 1942. She first joined the Baptist Church at Watson, Oklahoma in 1917.

Mrs. Toon was preceded in death by her mother, Mrs. E. B. Woodruff, a brother, Johnnie, and a daughter, Codine.

Mrs. Toon is survived by her husband, Booker, three daughters, Mrs. Eudine Shew of Linden, Mrs. Juanita Reynolds of Stratford, Sybil Wandalle of Wheeler and one son, Buddy, of Wheeler; four grandchildren; four sisters, Mrs. Willie Poole, Mrs. Ethel Threatt, Mrs. Carrie Cowden of Wheeler and Mrs. Ola Johnson of San Bernardino, Calif.; five brothers, Roy, Henry D., Coleman and Glenn Woodruff all of Wheeler and Marvin Woodruff of Pampa, her father, E. B. Woodruff of Wheeler, and a number of nieces, nephews and other relatives.

Juanita Louise Reynolds, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Reynolds of Stratford was born November 2, 1943 and passed away February 11, 1948 at the age of 4 years, 3 months and nine days.

Robert Wayne Reynolds, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Reynolds was born September 7, 1945 and died February 11, 1948 at the age of 2 years, 5 months and 4 days.

GRASS MEETING BE HELD HERE FEBRUARY 26

County Agent W. K. Frey announced this week there will be a meeting at the Wheeler Courthouse Thursday, February 26 for all farmers and ranchers of Wheeler County who are interested in seeding worn-out cropland to grasses and pasture legumes or in improving the grazing capacity of range land.

The program for the day begins at 10:00 A. M. and will last until about 2:30 P. M. Frey stated this should be a program of vital interest to Wheeler County farmers and ranchers, and a large turnout is expected.

Mr. Elder of the Soil Conservation project at Reynold, Oklahoma will be present to discuss seeding methods and grasses adapted here for use on sandy land and tight land. Various grasses adapted here will be on display, as well as seed samples.

County Agent Frey hopes to have on hand several different kinds of equipment that can be and are being used successfully for planting various kinds of grass seed.

Quentin Williams, conservationist at Pampa, will be present and will discuss results of various seedings of grasses already done in Wheeler County.

Gene Shaffer, chairman of the Wheeler County ACA, will discuss payments under the 1948 program for planting adapted grasses and legumes, and for application of phosphate fertilizers.

County Agent Frey will discuss kinds of fertilizers needed in Wheeler County, and the uses and benefits of legumes for forage and a soil-building crops in rotation with field crops. Sources of seed, availability and cost will be covered.

LIONS CLUB TO SPONSOR SHOW

The Mobettie Lions Club is staging its first annual 4-H Club Livestock Show Saturday, February 21. The calves are to be judged in the auction ring of the Mobettie Sales Co. Walter Grist, county agent of Hemphill County, is to do the judging.

The Mobettie Lions Club and interested citizens are subscribing liberally to encourage this type of work in the Mobettie community.

Tom Beck, L. D. McCauley and J. A. Nece, members of the Lions Club committee in charge of the show, point out that work in livestock feeding has not been developed in the Mobettie community and only five boys are feeding calves this year.

Members of the Lions Club committee stated the club felt that the number of calves fed in the Mobettie territory another year could easily be twenty since livestock feeding and raising is an industry that is well adapted to this area.

The Lions Club is in hopes that the annual show and the premiums offered will arouse the interest of dads and mothers in their boys to see that they enroll in this work another year.

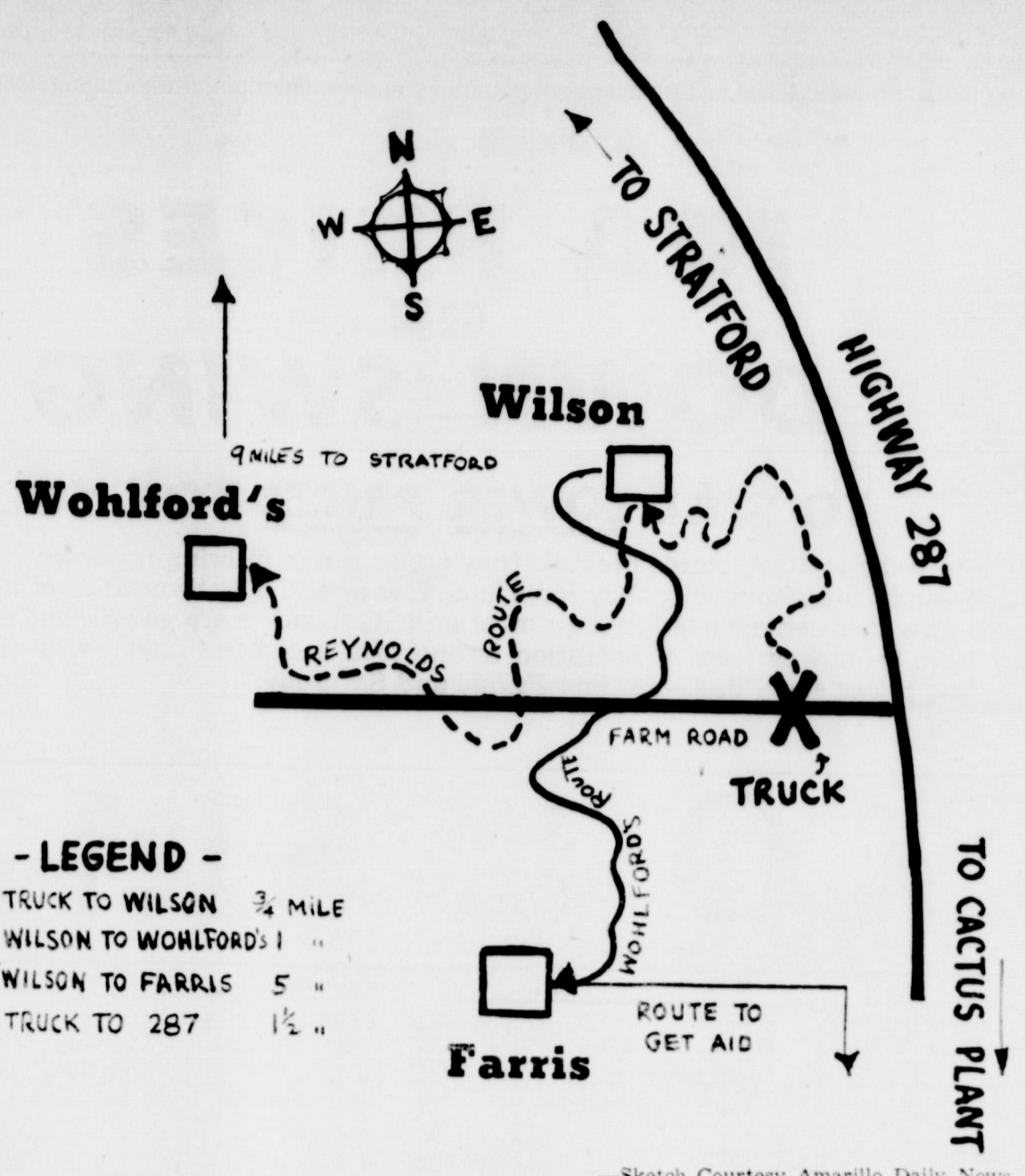

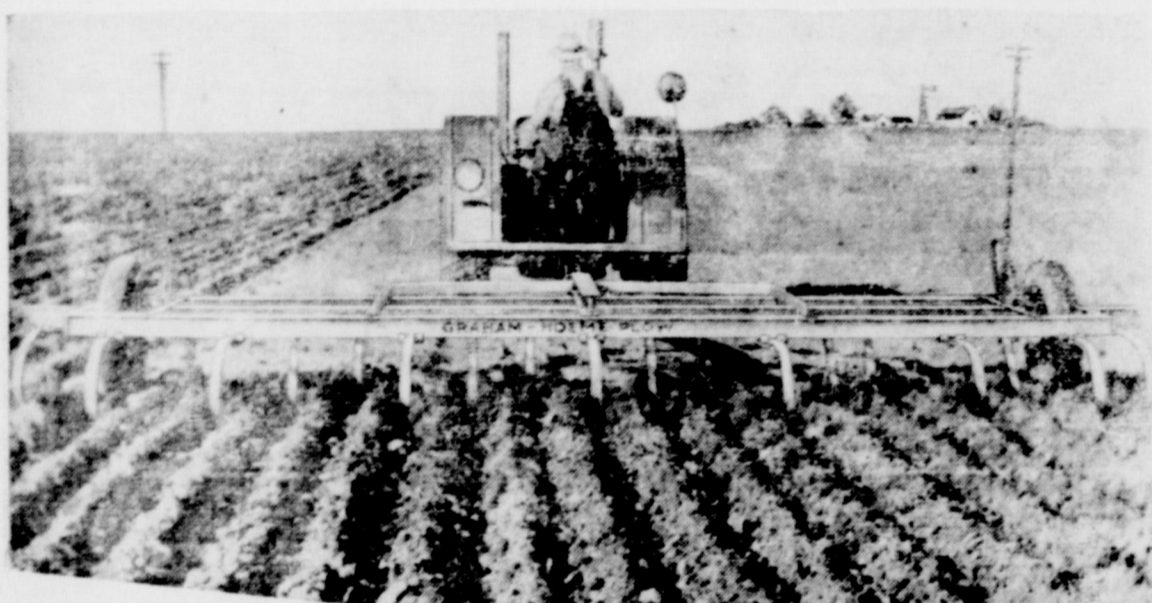

Winding and it seemed to Wohlford an hour and a half or longer before they found the truck, practically covered by drifted snow.

Placed On Tractor

When he and Reynolds arrived, the boy, Robert Wayne, was dead. Mrs. Toon and the other two children and the body were placed on the tractor. Reynolds got on the platform with them and Wohlford covered them with a tarpaulin.

He started the tractor, but had gone only a short distance when it stalled. Wohlford said. He tried to crank it, but became exhausted, roused Reynolds and told him to come help. The younger man, weak from exposure, fell as he reached the front of the tractor, but fell against the crank and the engine started.

When they arrived at the Wilson home, Wohlford said he lost all track of time, but thinks it was near midnight when he decided that it was imperative to get a doctor and an ambulance.

Sam Wohlford, 57 year old former Sherman county commissioner who came to the Panhandle 45 years ago for his health's sake, spent the remainder of Wednesday night out in sub-zero weather trying to reach aid for the victims of the storm. Wohlford's efforts were finally rewarded Thursday morning when he in company with a neighbor, Dick Farms, reached the Cactus Ordinance Plant north of Dumas where a rescue party was organized.

By the time the rescue party reached the Wilson home Thursday morning, Mrs. Toon and Justina Louise had passed away.

Mr. Wohlford has been recommended by the Stratford Star, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, the Stratford Lions Club and the Amarillo News Globe for the Carnegie Hero Award for his efforts to save these people.
