One of our pictures did not get marked for last week's front page. Therefore the small picture in a large space.

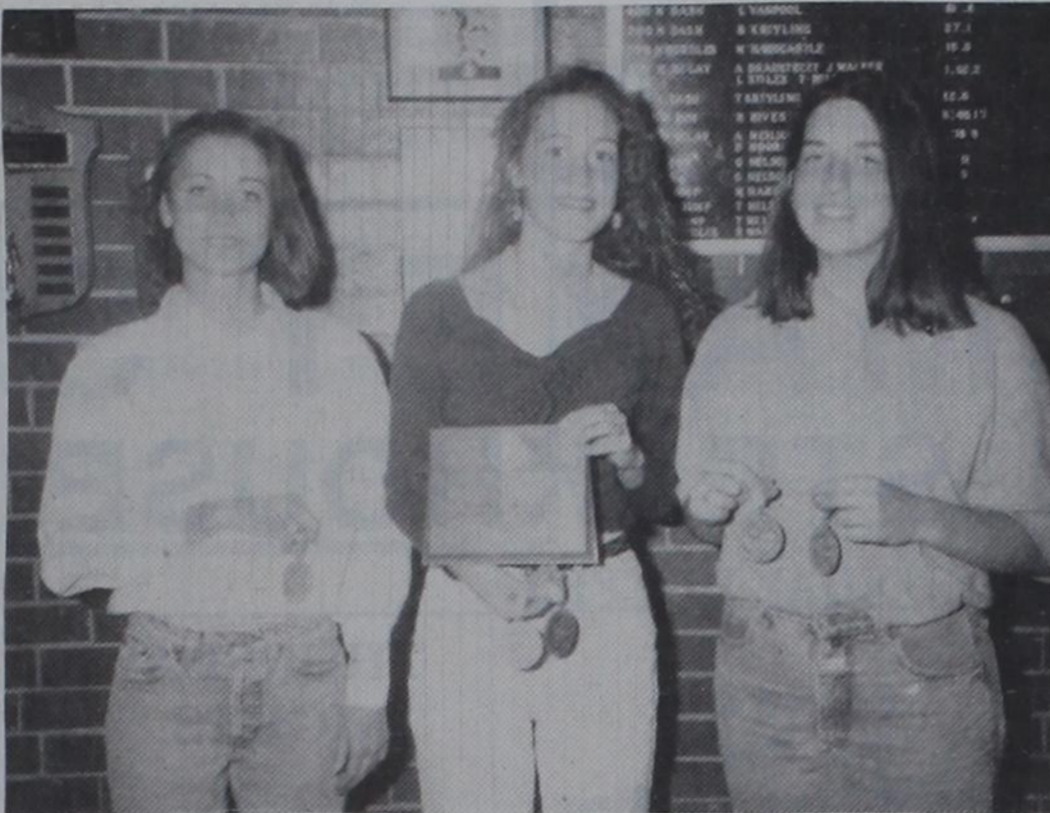

U.I.L. LITERARY CRITICISM TEAM WINS FIRST; INDIVIDUALS WIN SECOND & THIRD PLACE

Wheeler High School's Literary Criticism Team placed 1st at the Regional Meet held on Saturday, April 24, on the Abilene Christian University campus. Rochelle Rives, a senior, led the way with a second place finish scoring 86 points. Kristin Smith, a junior, placed third with 82 points. Amanda Rives, a sophomore, tied for sixth place with a score of 73. Together they scored 241 points out-distancing the second place team from Iran by 50 points. The first place individual from Panhandle scored 87 points. These Wheeler High girls brought home medals as well as a team champion plaque to present to the school.

Also competing at regional was Jennifer Stas, a junior, in Calculator Applications. She did very well. Rochelle Rives competed in a second event, Prose Interpretation. Making it to the finals, she placed sixth.

Eight districts gathered in Abilene for this regional academic competition. The competition was extremely tough. The above students are to be commended for their academic excellence. Advancing to regional is quite an honor. Going to state ranks you among the best. State competition will be on Saturday, May 8, in Austin on the campus of the University of Texas. Mustang Band Earns Superior At U.I.L. Contest

The Wheeler Mustang Band attended the annual U.I.L. Concert Band Contest on Tuesday, April 20th. This year's contest was held at Boys Ranch. The competition is divided into two parts. Each band is required to perform a March and two additional selections from a prescribed list of music. After performing the three prepared selections the band is required to perform a selection that has been chosen by a U.I.L. committee for sight-reading. Both performances of the prepared material and the sight-reading material are judged by three judges.

In the prepared Concert the Band performed Norland March, Modal Song and Dance, and Blue Ridge Saga. The Band was awarded ratings of Superior, Excellent, and Excellent for their performance of the prepared music. In the sight-reading portion of the contest the Band earned ratings of Superior, Superior and Superior.

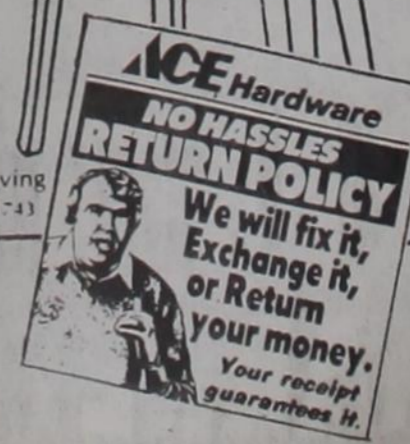

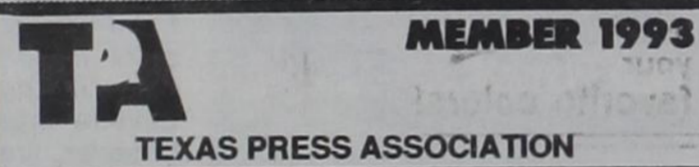

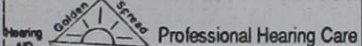

GOD'S PROTECTION

Isaiah 25:4 says, "For thou hast been a strength to the poor, a strength to the needy in his distress, **A REFUGE FROM THE STORM** . . ." During the last 2 or 3 years, there have been a number of major storms in the country. It looks like 1993 may be another year of calamity. It is still relatively early in the year, and we have seen a tremendous snow storm on the East Coast that took many lives. Then, the tornado struck quickly in the Tulsa area last weekend.

It is good to know that we can trust in the Lord's protection and not have to worry about being destroyed in a storm. I am not suggesting that we become careless and ignore common sense, but if you really trust God, you can enjoy His divine protection of your life. Psalm 91 says that we can dwell in the secret place of the most High and that, if we do, we will remain under the shadow (or protection) of the Almighty. The same Psalm instructs us to **SAY** of the Lord, "He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust." You may believe that mentally, but do you **SAY** it? If not, why not? We might be amazed at how well the promises of God would work for us if we would actually obey what the Bible says for us to do.

The Word of God says that the Lord is your keeper. It says that He will not sleep or slumber. It declares, "The Lord shall preserve thee from all evil." (See Psalm 121) Because God said that He would bless me with long life and show me His salvation (which includes protection and preservation), I have no fear of being destroyed by a storm. Jesus was asleep in a boat when a storm arose. The disciples were afraid and woke Him up. He made the storm still, but He also made it very clear to them that they should have done it themselves with their own faith. What that tells me is that we have reason to believe that God will preserve us during storms. If their faith would have saved them had they used it, our faith in the same God and the Word of God will enable us to come safely through any storm.

Do whatever you believe you need to do to take precaution, but don't let yourself become fearful. If God doesn't help you, you're in trouble anyway whether you are out in the open or 10 feet underground in a concrete shelter. Trust Him. He means what He says, and we don't have to live with fear of storms taking our lives if we walk with Him. Psalm 34:4, "I sought the Lord, and he heard me, and delivered me from all my fears."

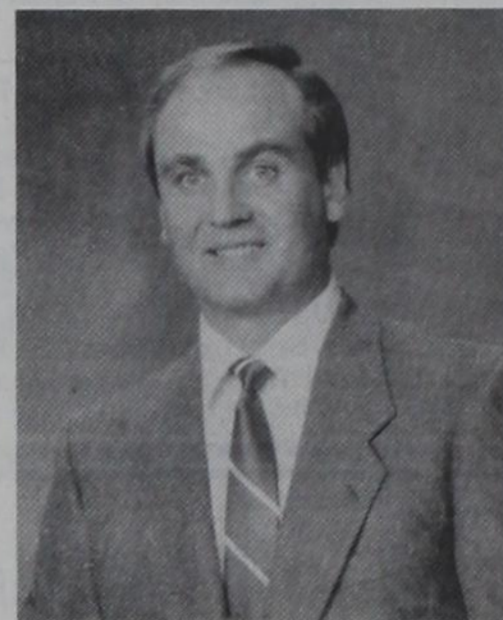

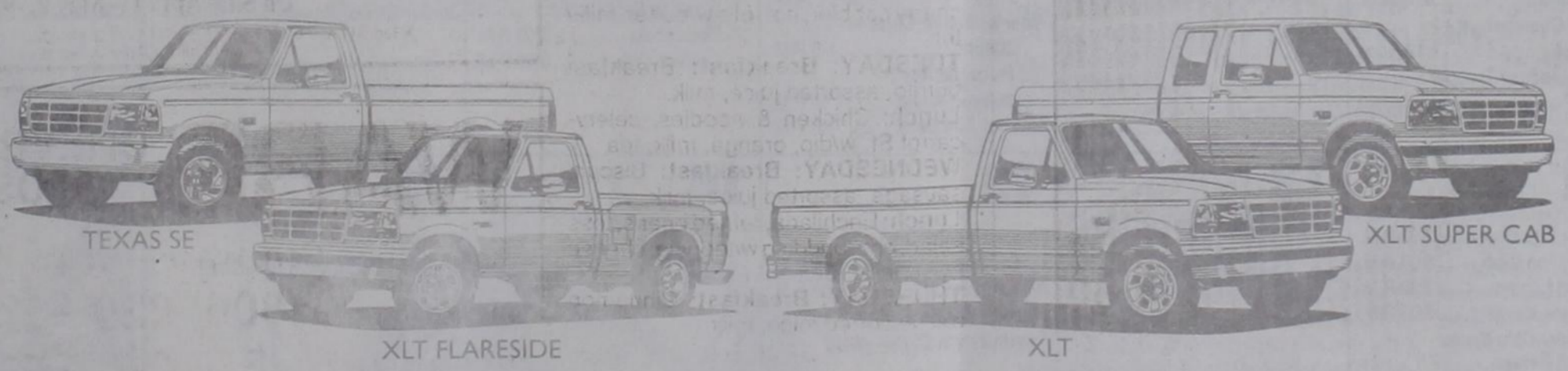

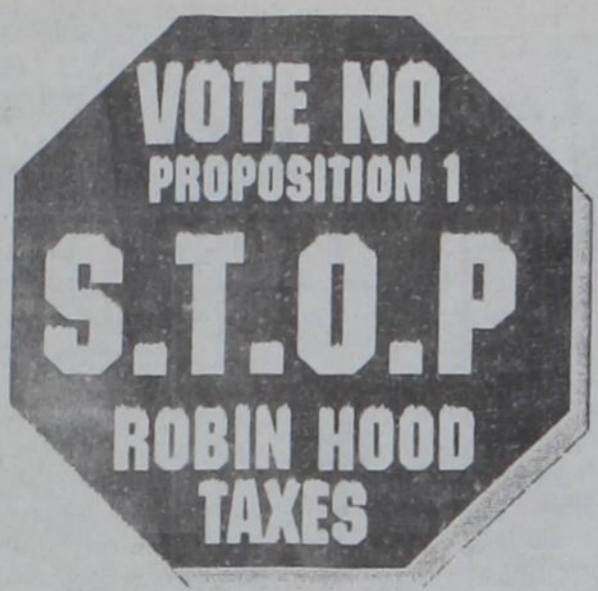

From The Minister's Desk:
Theodore Roosevelt was the twenty-sixth President of the United States, serving from September of 1901 to March of 1909. Because of his warm personality, he was deeply admired by thousands of Americans who affectionately referred to him as "Teddy".
President Roosevelt was a man who held some strong opinions. He did not hesitate to clearly and forcefully state those opinions. For example, he once stated his opinion on foreign policy by saying: "Speak softly and carry a big stick." But perhaps his most astute opinion was the one that he expressed about critics, saying: "It is not the critics who counts, not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled or where the doer of deeds could have done better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs and comes short again and again, who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions, and spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievements; and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly; so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither defeat nor victory." With this opinion, President Roosevelt made an important observation about critics
are usually spectators not participants. And as spectators they do not contribute to the solution of any problem or to the improvement of any circumstance. Regardless of how imperfect the efforts of participants may be, they still seek to improve and to help.
Although I am probably not as astute as President Roosevelt, I think that there are two other observations that can be made about these critics. These two observations are: ---
1. Critics are people who usually have an authoritarian attitude. Because of this attitude, such people believe that their ideas, opinions, and suggestions are absolutely correct. If their ideas, opinions, and suggestions are not followed or accepted, these people then become bitter and angry.
2. Critics are people who cannot be satisfied or pleased. Their reaction to the solution of any problem is very predictable. They will either find a flaw in the solution or they will uncover another problem.
I think that critics can be described like Jesus described the poor. He said: "--The poor you always have with you--." Like the poor, poor, I guess that critics will always be with us. I just wish that they were quieter.
