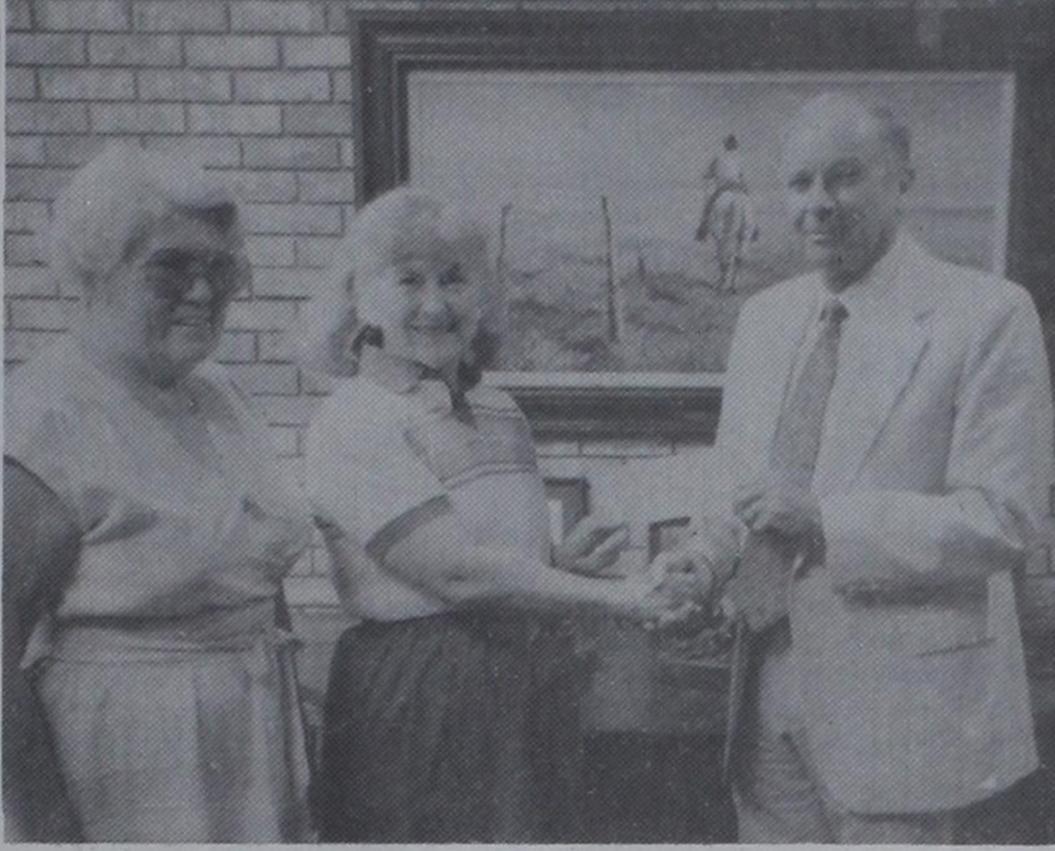

Wheeler Public Library to Receive New Shelving

First National Bank in Wheeler agreed to underwrite the entire cost of the new shelving for the library. Older wooden shelves will be replaced with adjustable, metal ones exactly like the original shelving purchased when the library moved in 1977.

On the adult side of the library, the new shelves will contain all the library's reference books and periodicals. Children's picture books and beginner reading books will be placed on the

extra shelving on the children's side. Wheeler First National has been a longtime supporter of the Wheeler Public Library. They made a large donation in its initial fund drive to remodel a wing in the old hospital building.

The new shelving should arrive within the next few weeks.

Those "long" hot days of summer are quickly beginning to dwindle as dreaded thoughts of books, pencils, teachers, and division problems enter the minds of the younger set. Care-free days of swimming and basking in the summer sun fade from view as the open doors of Wheeler I.S.D. beckon students to enter their territory. Yes, summer really does seem shorter this year, and the arrival of the month of August means one thing—school is just around the corner, forcing us out of our summer slump, grinning mischievously at its awesome power to put everyone on a strict schedule.

The first taste of the new school year for elementary and junior high students will occur when they register on Friday, August 13, from 9:00-10:00 a.m. During this time, new students must bring a certified copy of their birth certificate and an immunization record. The first official day of school makes its grand entrance on Tuesday, August 17. Like last year, the first bell will ring at 8:10 a.m. followed by the tardy bell at 8:15 a.m. School will then be dismissed at 3:23 p.m. In addition, there will be a tutorial period during the day which will allow students to ask for help from their teachers or work on homework.

One new addition to Wheeler I.S.D. will be the REACH program. REACH, which stands for Realizing Expectations and Changing Habits is designed

Elementary and Jr. High Registration on Aug. 13

Registration for elementary and junior high students will be from 9:00-10:00 A.M. August 13th. New students must bring a certified copy of birth certificate and immunization record.

Wheeler Kindergarten Registration on Aug. 13

Registration for Wheeler ISD Kindergarten students will be in the school cafeteria on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 A.M. until 10:00 A.M. students must provide copies of their birth certificate (must be official state document, not hospital copy) and immunization records, as well as, these completed forms: Registration/Emergency card (your child's social security number must be written on this), student health information, and home language survey.

Classes will begin on Tuesday, August 17, at 8:10 A.M.

Registration Packets For Kindergarten Available

Registration packets for children who will be attending Wheeler ISD Kindergarten during the 1993-94 school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (A two page questionnaire); 3. Home Language survey. The Parent/Guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy—not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

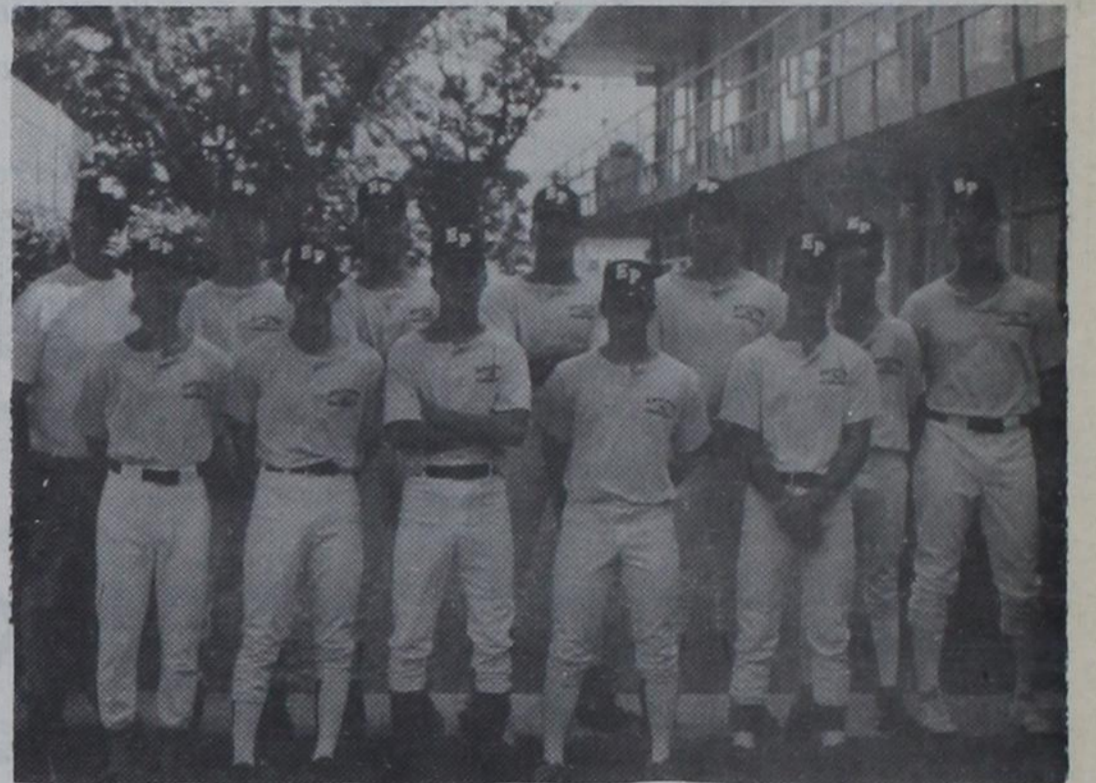
Kindergarten registration will be in the school cafeteria on Friday, August 13, from 9:00 until 10:00 a.m.
