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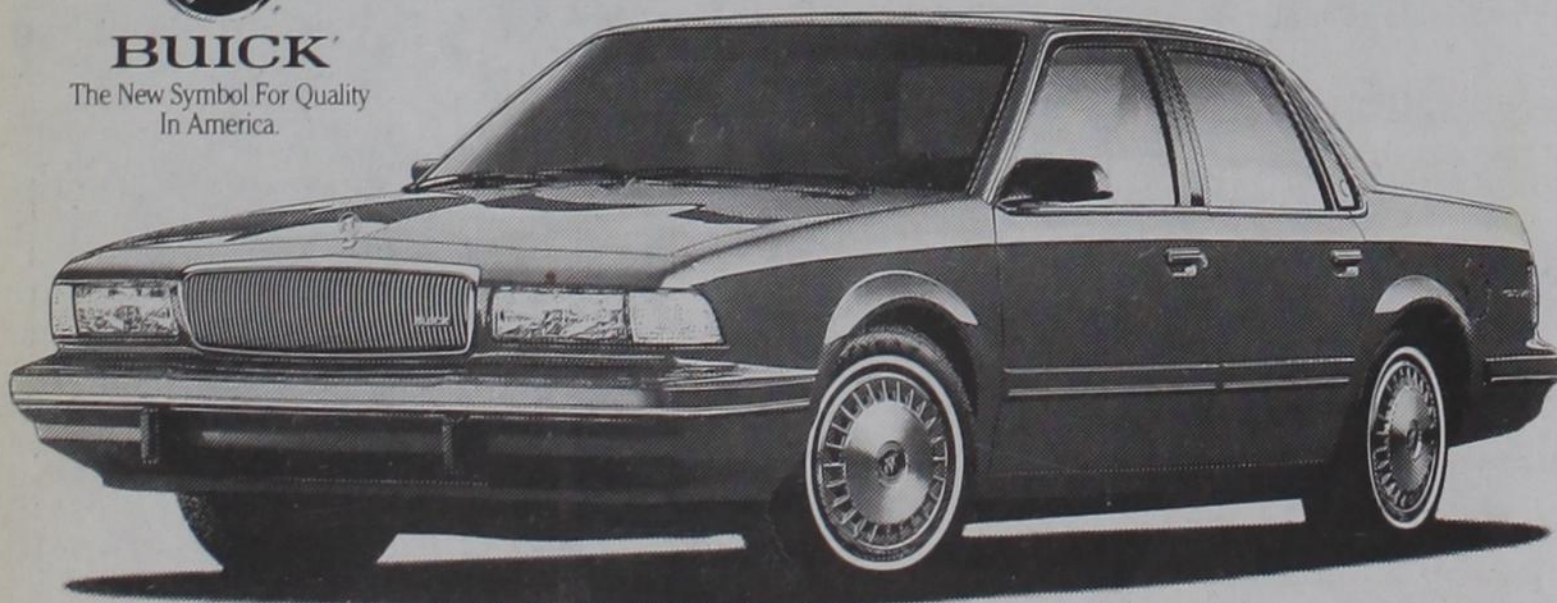

PACKAGING IN THE WASTE STREAM

Each year the average U.S. household discards 1800 plastic items, 850 bi-metal cans, 500 all-aluminum cans, 500 glass bottles, and more than 13,000 individual items of paper. Most of this packaging. Packaging serves many different purposes. It protects the product from light, heat, oxygen, natural contaminations, and tampering. Further, packaging protects consumer goods from crushing, soiling and shoplifting. And often the package provides information for the consumer on the proper use and storage, and about features and warranty of the item. In addition, some packages are designed to provide an extra measure of convenience to the consumer. The squeezable tube, for example toothpaste, is a convenient package for what would otherwise be a messy product.

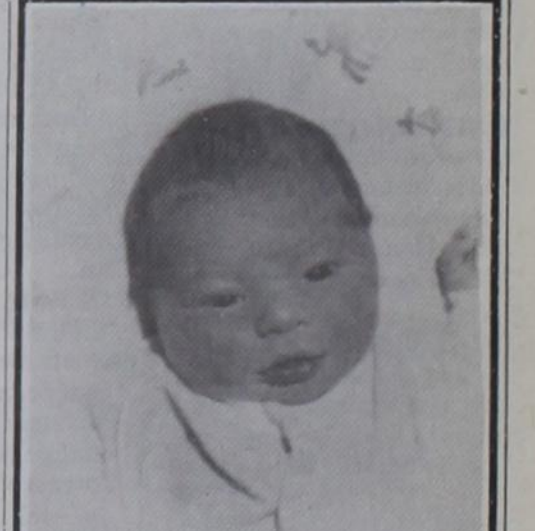

These permanent records help members select and mate the best animals in their herds to produce high quality, efficient breeding cattle which are then recorded with the American Angus Association. Most of these registered Angus are used by the U.S. farmers and ranchers who raised high quality beef for U.S. consumption.

Cattlewomen Are Taking Beef Cook-Off Entries

Texas amateur cooks have until June 1 to enter the National Beef Cook-Off and be selected as one of 15 finalists who will compete for \$45,000 in cash prizes and the title of the nation's top beef cook. Each of the 15 finalists also will receive an all-expense paid trip to the 1995 national competition Sept. 22-23 at Little Rock, Ark.

Entries must be postmarked by June 1, 1994, and received by June 7, 1994. Anyone except food professionals is eligible to enter. For more specific rules, contact the National Beef Cook-Off at P.O. Box 3240, Chicago, IL 60654.

No one from Texas has ever won the National Beef Cook-Off even though it is the nation's largest beef producing state. It's time for that to change, says the Texas CattleWomen, one of the contest's sponsoring organizations.

"We came close to winning all with a third place finish in the indoor competition at the 1993 national competition," says CattleWomen President Anita Brown of Wheeler. "As thrilling as that was, it now is time to go for the top award. The home kitchens of this state have more original beef recipes than any other state in the nation. Let's get those recipes out and compare them to the best of the other states."

The rules for entries must be followed exactly. A recipe must be original. It must use no more than eight ingredients (excluding salt, black pepper and water). Garnishes must be made from those ingredients. Preparation and cooking times, including marinating time, must be less than 60 minutes. The beef cut selected must be appropriate for the recipe. It must use at least 1 pound and no more than 2 pounds of beef.

Robin Bonifay Hill or Arlington met all those qualifications in 1993 with a sirloin recipe called Calypso Steak. her recipe received high marks from the judges for its simple preparation, appealing ingredients and convenient cooking method. As a result, Hill won third place—the highest finish for a Texan in the history of the national indoor cook-off competition.

Texas CattleWomen hope that among this year's entries are a few recipes that add enough judge-pleasing qualities to take Texas to the championship. Brown says judges choose recipes that are adapted for contemporary lifestyles. Other characteristics that judges appreciate are healthful ingredients, convenient preparations times, and balanced flavors.

"As one judge says, the key to success is to test the recipe over and over," Brown says. "Get other persons' opinions too, and then send the recipe to BIC. While you're waiting on the national competition, work on the food's presentation. Judges see the

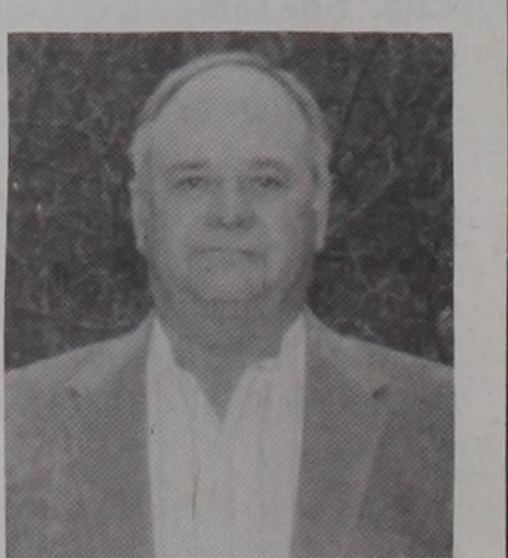

The groom was dressed in black tuxedo with tails, a red Tuxedo shirt,

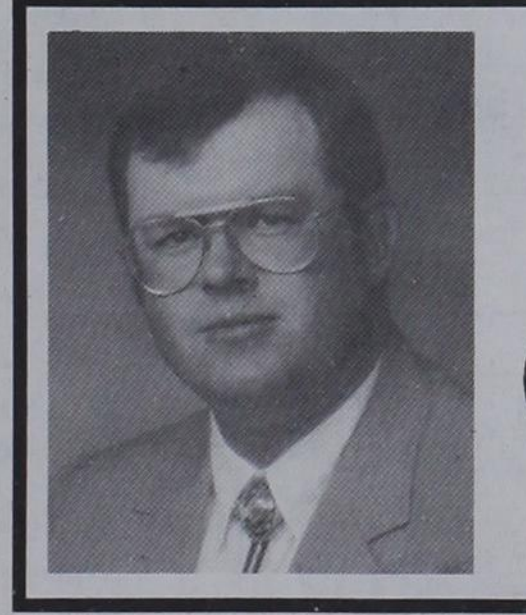
