4TH ANNUAL Panhandle Blue Grass Festival Set For July 22-25 In Old Mobeetie

The Panhandle Bluegrass and Old Tyme Music Association presents the 14th Annual Bluegrass Music Festival, July 22, 23, and 24 at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum in Mobeetie, Texas.

Come rain or shine, the toe-tapping sounds of Bluegrass music will fill the air in Old Mobeetie. In addition to many local and area favorites, this year's festival will feature a number of guests who carry some clout in Bluegrass circles. From Hampton, Tennessee comes The Stevens Family. Hampton is only about 20 miles south of Bristol which has been described as "a hotbed of Bluegrass Music." A recent review published in "Bluegrass Music News," had this to say about this dynamic group: "When you see the Stevens Family perform and observe their musical talents at work, see the gleam in their eyes as they do what they love, you can rest assured that bluegrass and Stevens will be around for some time to come."

Also joining the 14th Annual Bluegrass Music Festival will be the Chapman Family from Aurora, Colorado. The Chapman Family has performed at such prestigious events as the Rocky Mountain Bluegrass Festival, Fiesta Del Rio in Pueblo, Fiddler's Green, and many other festivals, fairs, and special events. In addition, the group has toured more than 13 states.

The festivities will start at 6 p.m. on Friday, July 22 and go till midnight. The action will resume on Saturday at noon and go till midnight and Sunday's activities will be from 9 - noon. The price of a two-day ticket is \$11. Friday is \$6, Saturday \$7 and Sunday is free. Children under 13 are admitted free. Call 806-267-2142 for more information. LINDSEY FILLINGIM GETS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Both the United States Achievement Academy and Who's Who Among American High School Students has announced that Lindsey Fillingim of Ft. Elliott High School at Briscoe, Texas has been nominated for award recognition for both her academic and athletic achievements.

Services Held For Louis Boynton, 66, In Vernon

Mr. Louis Boynton, age 66, died Tuesday, July 5, 1994 in a Vernon hospital after a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were scheduled for 1:00 P.M. Friday, July 8, 1994 in First United Methodist Church with Rev. Archie Echols of Borger officiating assisted by Rev. Irl Holt of Vernon. Burial under the direction of Sullivan Funeral Home of Vernon, Texas.

He was born February 27, 1928 in Quanah, Texas, a son of Mrs. Irene Boynton and the late Charles Boynton. He was married to Dorothy Vickery April 8, 1955 in Frederick, Oklahoma.

Mr. Boynton had lived in Vernon most of his life and was a member of the First United Methodist Church. He spent much of his professional career as an educator in Wilbarger County. Following outstanding athletic success in High School, he pursued this love of athletics. While attending Ranger Junior College (A.B.), MSU (B.S.) and EISU (M's) before entering the coaching ranks, he coached at Seymour and Wheeler before coming to Lockett in 1961. At Lockett, he entered the administrative level and first served as high school principal. He coached girls and boys basketball and was a head football coach but is best known for Texas high school track coach having produced two Texas State Champion teams. Coach Boynton came to Vernon in 1968 and continued to produce winners. In 1978 he produced a Nationally ranked high school sprinter who had just been crowned Texas AAAA State Champion of the Golden West Track Meet in San Francisco, Cal. He also served as vice-principal at Vernon High School 12 years. After a heart attack, 1982, he retired from coaching and became the first principal of the new McCord Elementary School.

He was a member of Vernon Lions Club, American Trap Association, High School Association, Texas Elementary Principals Association, and Mid-western Alumnus.

Surviving are his wife, Dorothy Boynton of Vernon; one daughter, Kim Sosolik of Hurst, his mother, Irene Boynton of Vernon, one brother, Bob Boynton of Lubbock; one sister, Marquita Wright of Ft. Worth; one grandson, Seth Sosolik of Hurst; one niece and three nephews.

From the Minister's Desk:
An important film technique that is used by the movie industry is Cinema. With this technique, every scene of a movie is photographed from three directions which allows all the dimensions of a scene to be seen.
Perhaps the disciples of Jesus can learn an important lesson from this film technique. This lesson would be that all the dimensions of Christianity must be practiced. In my opinion, there are too many disciples of Jesus who believe that Christianity is one dimensional. These disciples apparently believe that Christianity consists merely of an absence of sins of immorality.
This one dimensional Christianity was not taught by Jesus Christ in His ministry. He constantly taught that sins of the attitude are as sinful as sins of immorality. For example, the eighth chapter of John records an event in the ministry of Jesus where He clearly condemned the sins of the attitude. According to this text, Jesus was teaching in the Temple when He was interrupted by the Pharisees. These pious religious leaders had with them a woman that they had caught "—in the very act—" of adultery. After they had placed this woman "—in the midst—" of the Temple, the Pharisees said to Jesus, "Teacher, this woman has been caught in adultery, in the very act. Now in the Law Moses commanded us to stone such women; what then do you say?" (verses 4-5)
The text then says: "And they were saying this, testing Him, in order that they might have grounds for accusing Him. But Jesus stooped down, and with His finger wrote on the ground. But when they persisted in asking Him, He straightened up, and said to them, 'He who is without sin among you, let him be the first to throw a stone at her.' And again He stooped down, and wrote on the ground. And when they heard it, they began to go out one by one, beginning with the older ones, and He was left alone, and the woman, where she had been, in the midst. And straightening up, Jesus said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Did no one condemn you?' And she said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you; go your way. From now on sin no more.'"
Notice that Jesus did not argue with the Pharisees about the sin of this woman. He recognized that she was guilty of a terrible sexual sin. But He also recognized that the Pharisees were guilty of at least three terrible sins of the attitude. These three sins of the attitude were:
1. Dishonesty. These pious religious leaders were not honestly concerned about the teaching of the Law. If they had been, they would have brought with them the man who had committed adultery with the woman. They did not even mention this man.
2. Inscrupibility. The Pharisees were not sincerely interested in morality or purity. They were simply seeking a reason to accuse Jesus. (verse 6) These pious religious leaders were hypocritical.
3. Indifferent. The Pharisees were indifferent to the embarrassment and humiliation of the woman. To them, she was simply an exhibit that they could use in their plot against Jesus. They did not care that this woman was embarrassed and humiliated.
I am afraid that there are some twentieth century disciples of Jesus who are like these Pharisees. These disciples eloquently sermonize about the importance of morality, condemning such things as premarital sex, vulgar bumperstickers, drunkenness, and profanity. But when the lives of these disciples are closely scrutinized, some terrible sins of the attitude became very obvious. Some of these sins are pride, arrogance, dishonesty, self righteousness, and conceit.
Genuine disciples of Jesus will know that the Bible teaches that people who practice "—the deeds of the flesh—" will "—not inherit the kingdom of God." They will also know that "—enmities, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, disputes, dissensions, factions—" are listed among "—the deeds of the flesh—" (Galatians 5:19-21) For this reason, genuine disciples of Jesus will recognize that Christianity is not one dimensional.

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
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
