WAR FUND OVER THE TOP BUT SOME HAVE NOT YET MADE CONTRIBUTION

A report from the local bank this morning shows that slightly over \$1200, north Wheeler county's goal, has been placed on deposit in interest of the National War Fund.

In addition to the list of contributors going over the top reported in last week's issue of The Times, the Kelton and Jowett communities have reported contributions totaling more than their quotas. \$107 had been turned in by the Jowett group and Kelton had raised \$176. Mobeetie reports that \$209 of their quota is raised and that their quota will be oversubscribed within a few days. Briscoe reports that several dollars have been received for the fund and that the drive will be completed when school is resumed as it is now recessed for cotton picking.

The local post of the American Legion conducted a canvas of the Saturday afternoon crowd last Saturday and expect to do. the same thing next Saturday afternoon.

Dr. H. E. Nicholson, chairman of the local drive, this week complimented donors on their liberal contributions to the War Fund and urges everyone who has not already done so to make their contribution and to make it liberal since the true goal of the drive is not merely the quota, but an all-out contribution by every true American and that the goal is the 'floor' of giving, not the 'ceiling.'

The principal job of the National War Fund is to support our own men in uniform. True, the war fund also gives aid to our allies and to suffering humanity throughout the world night at 8 o'clock in a conference but its first and foremost task is in behalf of our own.

Today, tens of thousands of American fighting men . . . and among them are many thousands of Texans . . . are in enemy prisoner-of-war camps. There, they receive barely enough food to keep them alive, and practically nothing else. For all the many small things that bring comfort and hope, they took to War Prisoners Aid, the great National War Fund agency through which we at home can send help even into enemy prison camps.

War Prisoners Aid sends books, sports and athletic equipment, study courses, musical instruments and scores of other items designed to defeat the dread "barbed wire sickfighting men who have been captured by the enemy.

The war fund serves all fighting men, those in the hands of the enemy, those in training camps, and those in the thick of the fight. USO serves all sailors, soldiers and Marines everywhere, and sends USO-Camp Show units to every fighting front, so that the boys may see "a little bit of home" even in France or the South Pacific.

Postal Changes Are Effective Nov. 1st

The cost of special delivery letters and registered mail went up, effective Nov. 1, while postal money orders, insurance and COD fees, which were boosted last March, will be cut back, it has been announced by the U. S. Postal Department.

The fee for sending a special delivery letter will go from 10c to 13c, and registry fees will be increased about one-third, the department said.

HEAVY BALLOTING IS EXPECTED IN **NOV. 7 ELECTION**

Comparatively heavy balloting is expected in the general election next Tuesday when it will be determined whether or not the present chief executive will be named for another four years of office or the reins turned over to some one else.

Controversal issues are reaching a new high and arguments, from the side walk type to main radio addresses, continue to grow more heated between the major parties.

Yesterday, county clerk Harry Wofford reported that his office had received 235 requests for absentee balloting which closes Friday.

Amendments Up For Vote

Two little-known proposals will go before the voters of Texas at the General Election on Nov. 7, when citizens will be asked to accept or reject two constitutional amendments submitted by the legislature.

One of these amendments would empower the commissioners court of lar valuation, but would permit counties to change the distribution of the tax dollar so as to provide more funds for certain purposes.

The other amendment would empower municipalities and, presumably, other political subdivisions to establish an insurance and retirement fund for their employees. The amendment does not provide for the establishment of any civil service system in these municipalities.

Protection Of Peach Trees Is Urged

J. F. Rosborough, Horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, recommends paradichlorebenzene, commonly called PDB, as most effective against peach tree borers when used from the middle of October to mid-November.

No soil preparation is necessary in ian. administering this treatment except to break the crust for 15 to 18 inches Lamon, Billie Lou Trimble, Juanita around the tree and remove any grass or weeds. Place the PDB cry stals in a circle about three inches from the trunk on top of the soil. For mature trees one ounce is used, and for young trees one-half ounce is enough. The crystals should be covered with dirt immediately after being applied, and firmly packed with the back of a shovel to make a coneshaped mound. The dirt should be fairly dry. The cone should be torn down after four or five weeks and the remaining crystals removed.

This treatment is recommended only for the true peach tree borer which works near the surface of the

DON'T DOUBLE DECK JARS

Don't double-deck glass jars of home canned food in your pantry even though that procedure is o. k for tin cans. This warning comes from Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Aside from the danger of a jar toppling off and breaking, there is the greater danger that seals may be broken, authorities say.
