People in and around Wheeler County are reminded that today, March 27 is the date that meal reservations are due for the Forage Production Symposium, according to Don King, Wheeler County Extension Agent. Those planning to attend can make reservations by calling the county Extension office at 826-5243.

The Symposium is scheduled for Tuesday, April 1 at 6:00 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the United Methodist Church in Wheeler.

Speakers for the program are Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, Dr. Don Dorsett, Extension Forage Specialist and J. F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist.

This year's symposium will focus on planning a year-round forage program and will compare the nutritive value of native and introduced grasses.

Former Coach J. Newland 3-A Girls Coach of Year

Jan Newland, coach of the Dimmitt Bobbies, has been selected as the Lubbock Avalanche Journal's All-South Plains Class 3-A Girls Coach of the Year. Jan coached the Wheeler Mustangettes for a number of years before moving to Dimmitt in 1995.

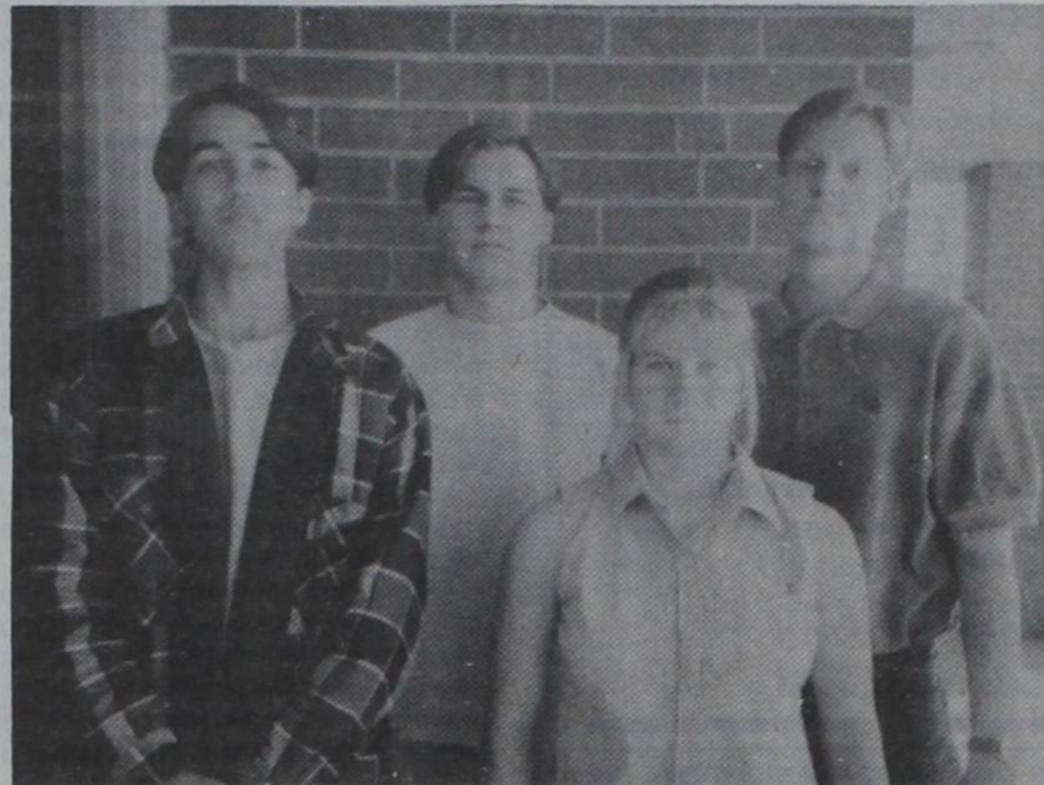

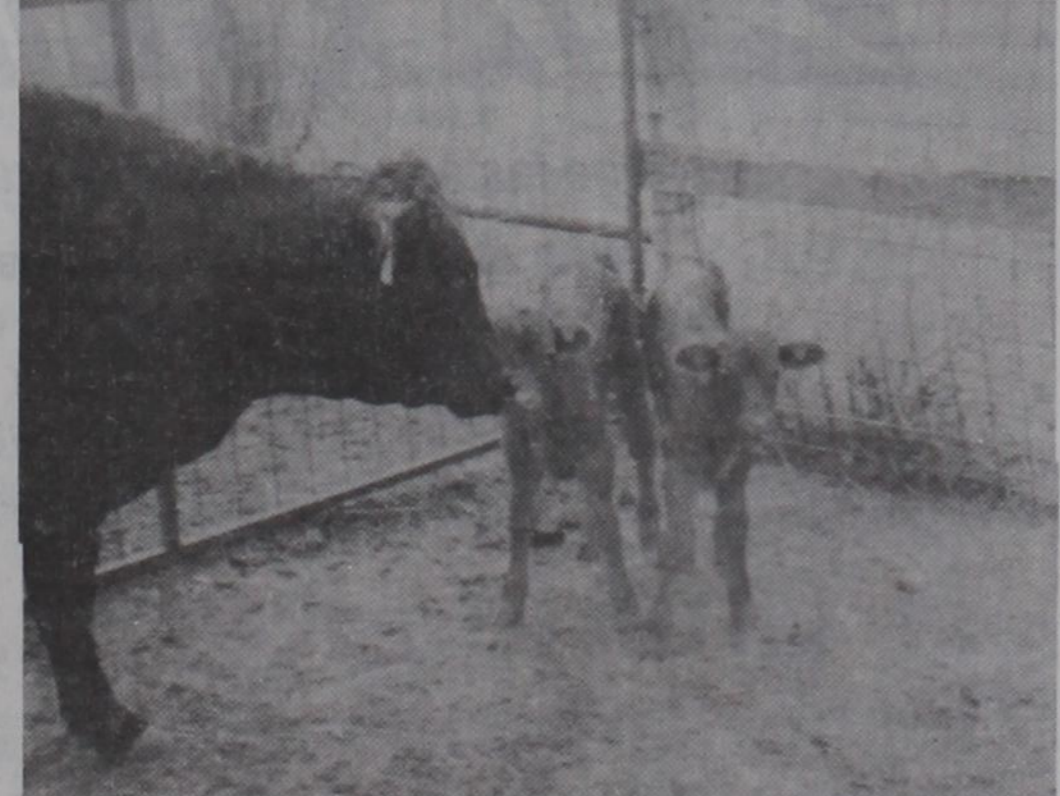

HOSPICE AWARENESS

WHY A HOSPICE NURSE?

I am a home hospice nurse. This means that I go from home to home helping people care for their dying loved ones. I help take care of people dying from cancer, AIDS, and emphysema. I teach the people who love them when to give pain medicine, how to change the sheets of someone too weak to get out of bed, and when the breathing pattern means death is near. Sometimes I just sit. After the bad news has been given, after a person's story has been told, there is a sharing that requires stillness. So we sit and listen.

Regularly, when people I have met find out what I do, they ask, "Don't you get depressed? All that suffering." No, I tell them. I get sad. I cry sometimes, but I don't get depressed. Actually, I love my work. I think of it as a calling. What makes it possible for me to do this day in and day out is that I am not afraid of the pain. I am not afraid to feel it, I am not afraid to be with someone who is hurting. And my being there, and not being afraid makes their hurting a little less. We help each other, I think.

They value my expertise, my nursing advice, my feeling for them and I consider myself immeasurably privileged to work with such noble souls. Being a caregiver to an ill and dying person demands generosity and sacrifice. I am repeatedly amazed how willingly people embrace this difficult task out of love. Even people who

don't think they are capable of it, but want to try because they love, then find they are indeed capable.

So when others talk about easing the suffering of dying people by shortening their life, I can't agree.

It is true that pain is inextricably linked to life in this world, that they are inseparable. What defines us as individuals is the meaning we assign to the joyful and desperate moments of our lives. To try and separate the two is to pull apart the twin strands of the DNA molecule—the defining structure is unraveled. So the strategy of shortening life to end suffering is myopic. People who are dying and their families who are in crisis are still capable of tremendous emotional and spiritual growth. I will not rob them of the chance.

Those who choose an earlier death, to be in control, paradoxically, have surrendered. In my seven years as a hospice nurse, I have learned that death comes, relentlessly comes. But to live each moment, despite the limits that an illness brings, with the hope of a transformation and the company of those that love us is more than to shake a fist at death, it gives meaning to life itself.

John 15: 10-11: If ye keep my commandments, Ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his love.

These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full.

WAYS TO PREVENT CHILDHOOD POISONINGS
Joan Gray
Parents are constantly on the lookout for potential dangers to their children. However, many parents may not realize the danger associated with common household items such as cleaners and medicines. These tips from Scott & White Clinic can help prevent accidents poisonings:
**Request "safety-lock" tops on all prescription drugs.
**Keep household cleaners, bug sprays, medicines and garage products out of reach and out of sight of children. Lock up these products whenever possible.
**Never store food and household cleaners together.
**When throwing away a household product, rinse the container and dispose of it in a covered trash can.
**Always store medicines in their original containers and throw out medicines no longer in use. Rinse empty containers.
**Do not take medicines in front of your child because children love to copy their parents.
**Never call medicine "candy."
**Read the label before taking medicine. Never take medicine which is not labeled for you or is not labeled at all. Never take medicine in the dark.
**If you are interrupted while using medicine or a household product, take it or the child with you. It only takes a few seconds for your child to get into it.
**Anticipate your child's curiosity and abilities according to his or her age and developmental skills. If you have a crawling infant, keep household products stored above the floor level—not under the kitchen sink.
**Be alert for repeat poisonings. A child who has swallowed a poison is more likely to be poisoned again within a year.
**Never transfer products like kerosene, gasoline, insecticides or household cleaning agents to another container such as a soft drink bottle, cup or bowl that would attract a child or pet.
**Buy potentially poisonous products only when needed and in the amount required for the job.
**Always prepare and use products according to label directions.
**Many labels and antidote charts give incorrect information. Call (800) POISON-1 for the latest information.

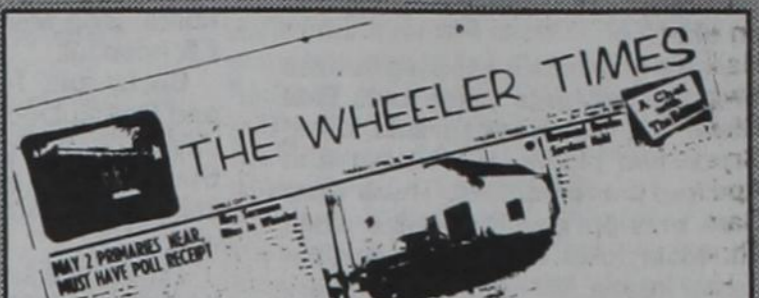

It's wonderful that all of our communities work so closely together and give each other back up on these crisis situations. Great team work.

In February and March eleven of our firefighters attended a class classified as Basic Intermediate Wild Fire Suppression. It was taught by Ken Daughtry, the Wheeler County Fire

Marshall. All the information came from the Texas Wildlife Department.

The Classes were held for 3 hours a night for 4 nights. These sessions were split up with 2 nights at the Fort Elliott School Cafeteria at the Mobeetie Campus and 2 nights at the Fort Elliott Cafeteria at the Briscoe Campus.

March 6th and 20th six of our volunteers participated in the Advanced Wild Fire Suppression classes. This program and training will be completed April the 3rd.

On February 21st three volunteers went to Pampa to participate in an intense four hour class. It was titled— Incident Command School for Wild

Fire Suppression.

March 8th the Sweetwater Creek Fire Firefighters Association sponsored an 8 hour intense training session for area firefighters. The classes were taught by Wheeler trainers and a trainer from Canadian. Volunteers from Briscoe, Allison, Mobeetie, Sweetwater, Miami, Canadian and Wheeler were present.

April 19th Higgins will sponsor intense training in several areas. It will be another 8 hour session. Haz Mat (Hazardous Materials) is one of the many classes offered.

April 1st Mobeetie Volunteers will sponsor a Severe Storm Seminar. It will be from 7:00-10:00 P.M. It's a continuing education type training taught by Doug Crawley of NOAA from Amarillo. He is an interesting teacher and does a great job with this class.

28 different area entities have been invited.
April 12th some of our volunteers will travel to Amarillo to spend the day getting more training on Severe Storms.

The regular monthly meeting for the Mobeetie Volunteer Fire Department will be April 8th at 7:00 P.M. at the fire station. They will be a very important business meeting and training afterwards. They'll also be working on the trucks some more.

They can always use extra containers of individual bottled water.

They just had all the truck radios worked on Monday. Every fire is approached as a life or death situation. These radios are essential in protecting our firefighters and getting the fire under control as soon as possible.

Please be very careful and cautious during this dry spell and these terrible winds. Stop and think!!!

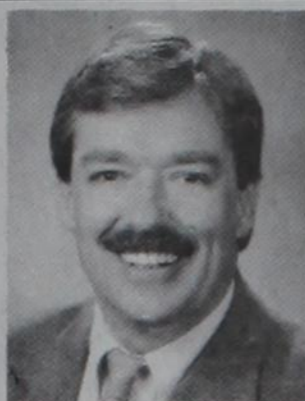

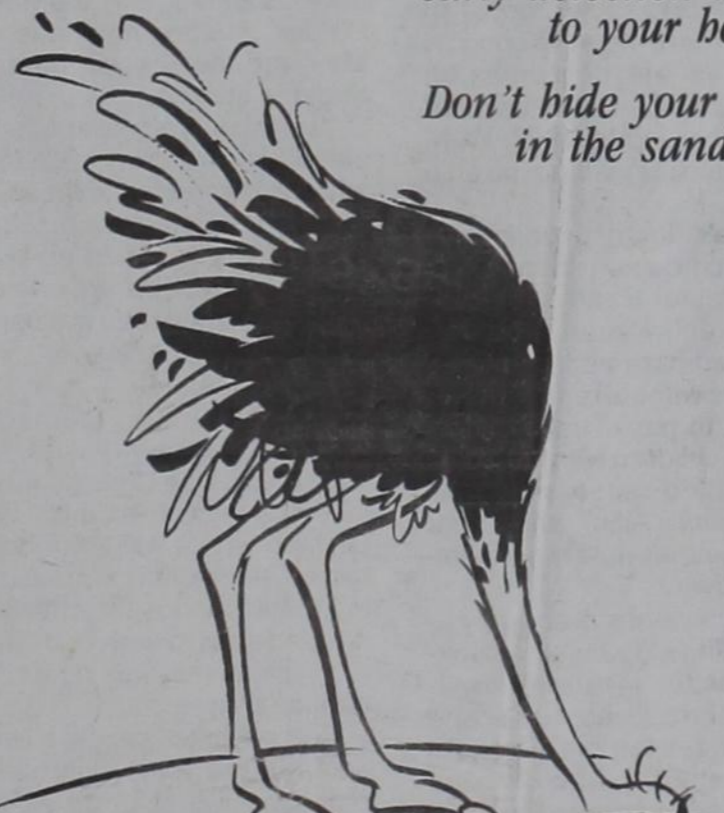

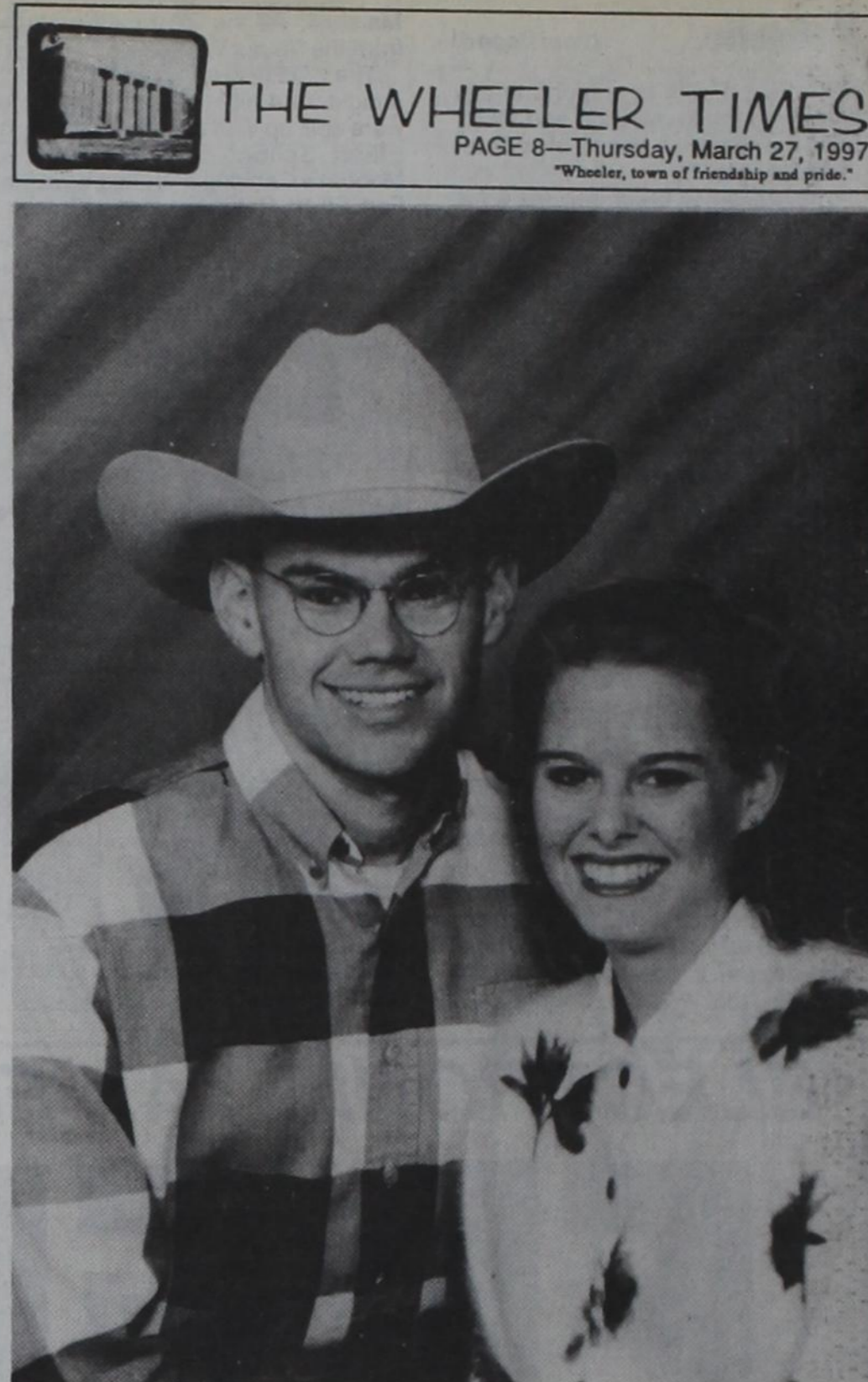

 On Monday night in Miami the program topics and speakers will include Grazing CRP by Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, Services of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory by Dr. Don Montgomery, Head of Diagnostic Pathology and Packer Trends by a packer representative.
 Topics and speakers for Tuesday night in McLean include Brush Control by J. F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist, Predator Control by Ronnie Smith of the Texas Animal Damage Control Service and Cow Nutrition by Dr. Ted McCollum.
 Rolling Plains Production Credit Association will sponsor a meal each night. Those planning to attend the Clinic should make meal reservations by calling the county Extension office in one of the sponsoring counties by 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, April 1.

Producers Should Check Fields For Russian Wheat Aphid

The Russian wheat aphid, dreaded by farmers because it menaces crop-lands, is showing up in a few area wheat fields now, says Dr. Carl Patrick, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
 "This is the time to look for spots of obvious damage in the fields," said Patrick. Starting now, and until mid-May, the insects will be active and begin to spread.
 "If aphids are present, farmers will see tillers with obvious purpling and white lines, also known as chlorotic streaking," Patrick said. Often times, the leaf will be rolled up like a soda straw. The insects are one-sixteenth inch long, lime green in color, spindle-shaped, and can be seen by unrolling the plant's leaves.
 "Aphids prefer feeding on the younger leaves in wheat," the specialist said. Damage occurs when the insects inject a toxin as they feed. Dryland wheat will likely be most affected. Additional information on how to identify the insect, check for damage and appropriate control measures is available through local county Extension offices.
 According to Patrick, beneficial insects in the form of predators and parasites will feed on aphid. However, once the aphid is protected inside the rolled plant leaves, beneficial predators are less effective. In most cases, an insecticide application will likely be required to prevent significant yield losses when the economic threshold is reached.
 Decisions on control are calculated using the cost of chemical application versus the value of the wheat. For example, if insecticide control will cost \$8.00 an acre and a value of the wheat is estimated at \$100 an acre, then the producer may want to consider treatment when 16 percent of the plant tillers show damage and feeding aphids are present.

Several insecticides have been shown to be effective for controlling aphids in wheat, Lorsban 4E-SG, Dimethoate, and Di-Syston.
 "Producers should check the label restrictions before any chemical application," said Patrick. There is 14-day non-grazing interval when using Lorsban or Dimethoate. There should be no grazing whatsoever if Di-Syston has been used.

Congregational Concerns:
 The Wednesday night Ladies Bible class has begun a new ministry that is known as the "Helping Hands." This ministry is designed to help families who need food due to illness or hospitalization. Some sheets of information about this ministry are on the table in the lobby.
 Ardie Martin has not been feeling well for the last several days.
From The Minister's Desk:
 One of the most interesting stories in the Old Testament is the story on Naaman. This story is located in the fifth chapter of II Kings.
 According to this text, Naaman was the "commander of the army of the King of Syria." (II Kings 5:1) Since Naaman had waged successful military campaigns against the enemies of Syria, he was a man of influence and prestige. He was also a man who was afflicted with a terrible disease. Naaman "was a leper." (II Kings 5:1)
 Naaman's diseased condition aroused the sympathy of his wife's maid, a young Israelite girl who had been captured by the Syrians on one of their raids into Israel. (II Kings 5:2) This young girl believed that Naaman could be healed by Elisha, the prophet of God who lived in Samaria. She said: "Would that my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria. He would cure him of his leprosy." (II Kings 5:3)
 When the king of Syria was informed about the prophet in Samaria who could heal Naaman, he arranged for Naaman to go Samaria. The text says: "Naaman came with his horses and his chariots, and halted at the door of Elisha's house. And Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean. But Naaman was angry and went away, saying, Behold, I thought that he would surely come out to me, and stand, and call on the name of the Lord His God, and wave his hand over the place, and cure the leper." (II Kings 5:9-11)
 Notice that Naaman said: "Behold I thought." This phrase could easily illustrate a mistake that many of us make when we study the Bible. This mistake is that we allow our preconceived opinions and prejudices to overshadow the revealed will of God. Too many of us are more concerned about what we think than what the Bible says.
 The Bible is not a book of abstract philosophy. Rather it is an infallible record of the will of God which was written by men who were "moved by the Holy Spirit." (II Peter 1:20-21) For this reason, the will of God is not determined by personal preference, opinion, or judgment. It is determined by the teachings that are plainly recorded on the pages of the Bible.
 Naaman's wife maid was correct. The prophet of God could and did heal Naaman. But Naaman had to do what the prophet of God said not what he thought. (II Kings 5:13-14) What about you and I? We are not lepers, but we are sinners. To be forgiven, we must learn the will of God by carefully studying the Bible, obeying what God says not what we think.
