WIND OR SMALL FUNNEL: A gust of wind or small funnel moved across the center of Wheeler Saturday evening about 8:30. The narrow path cut across town at an easterly direction knocking down fences, splitting and uprooting trees and breaking highline poles. Shown here is the root system of a large elm tree located in the 500 block of Mobeetie Street (behind the funeral home). The root system as you can see is over 6' in diameter, as William Thomas, shown here is 5'9". Other large trees in the same area were uprooted or nearly uprooted. A highline pole behind SPS office in the 100 block of West Texas was splintered, falling across the Antique Cupboard and Pete Burton's office (Old Bank Building). A fence at the Nita Evans residence at 514 S. Osage. Trees were damaged at 504 S. Canadian; a tree was destroyed in a similar incident several years ago.

The Mustangs began their district season by traveling to Vega to play the Longhorns. This game had a much more pleasing outcome than the last game played. After playing five pre-season games against 2A schools the Mustangs were glad to begin their district season against the 0-4 Vega Longhorns.

The Mustangs opened the game by kicking to the Longhorns. The Mustang defense held the Longhorns to a three-and-out and forced the Longhorns to punt. The Mustangs took the Longhorn's punt and drove the ball down for a touchdown.

The drive was capped off by a 12 yard touchdown run by Bryan Judd. Ben Dollar's extra point attempt was good and with 6:36 left in the first quarter the Mustangs took a 7-0 lead.

Halfway through the second quarter the Mustangs reached pay dirt again as Aaron Dunnam lunged over the goal-line from one yard out. Ben Dollar again made the extra point to bring the Mustang lead to 14-0.

Bryan Judd provided the Mustangs with their third touchdown with a 21 yard run with 1:27 left in the half. Dollar's kick was not good and the Mustangs boasted a 20-0 lead.

Just as people were getting ready to go to the concession stand at half-time Aaron Dunnam gave everyone a little excitement by running 65 yards down the right side for a touchdown as time ran out in the half. The Mustangs attempted a two point conversion but the run failed and the Mustangs went into half-time with a 26-0 lead.

In the third quarter, Jeremy Davis decided to add his name to the list of players who reached the end zone. He did this by way of a 12 yards touchdown run. The extra point failed and the Mustangs increased their lead to 32-0.

In the fourth quarter the Longhorns finally found their way to the end zone as they completed a 13 yard pass for a touchdown. The kick was good and the Mustangs lead 32-7. On their very next possession the Mustangs reached the end zone by means of a

Jeremy Davis' 11 yard touchdown run. The kick was once again unsuccessful and the Mustangs lead 38-7.

In the game the Mustangs racked up 28 first downs, 450 yards rushing, and 27 yards passing for a total of 477 total yards.

Aaron Dunnam was two of three passing for 27 yards. The Mustangs fumbled the ball six times and lost two. They had 10 penalties for 85 yards.

Jeremy Davis led the Mustangs with 24 carries for 207 yards, Dunnam had 19 carries for 120 yards, and Bryan Judd carried the ball 17 times for 114 yards.

Kyle Masters had two receptions for 27 yards.

The Mustangs were lead defensively by Aaron Dunnam who had six tackles, four assists, and one batted pass.

Jeremy Davis had six tackles, one assist, and one sack.

Kyle Masters had five tackles and one assist.

Ben Britt also contributed four tackles and one assist.

Vega compiled 11 first downs, 166 yards rushing, and 13 yards passing for a total of 179 total yards. Vega fumbled the ball once, but did not lose possession. They were flagged 14 times for 94 yards.

After a tough three game road trip the Mustangs will return home to host the Claude Mustangs. Claude and Wheeler both come into this game boasting a 1-0 district record.

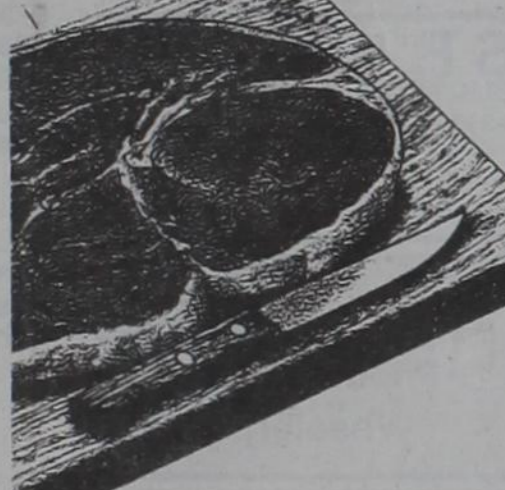

Extension Update

CHECK THE FINE PRINT

Take a look at the fine print on your credit card agreement or any other credit contract you might have signed. Look for these key clauses and be sure you know the agreements you have made.

An acceleration clause describes the lender's power to demand total payment of the loan if the borrower misses one payment. This is why it pays to plan to pay bills on time. Missing a payment on one account can make it due in full and put your ability to meet other credit and living cost commitments in jeopardy.

A security agreement itemizes property you have that the creditor may claim if you default on the loan. The property being bought with credit may be the collateral, but you may have pledged other property you own as collateral for the loan, such as land, a car or other items that you own.

A right of setoff clause allows the creditor to apply your assets toward payment of a loan if you default. If you borrowed the money from a bank or savings institution and have a savings account there also, the creditor may transfer funds from the savings account to pay for the loan, if you fail to repay the loan.

Some loans carry a balloon clause. This clause must be included if any loan payment is more than double other payments. It is usually the last payment that is due. When signing a contract with a balloon clause, be sure you can make the large payment or have a sound financial situation that will enable you to refinance the loan for the balance due. Otherwise, you will not be able to keep the item or property bought.

Loans often note that the Rule of 78's or Sum of Digits will be used to determine how much interest you will need to pay if you want to prepay an installment loan. It is also used to determine how much of a monthly payment on installment loans goes toward the principal borrowed and how much goes toward the interest. During the early part of the loan almost all of the monthly payment goes to repay interest and little repays the principal.

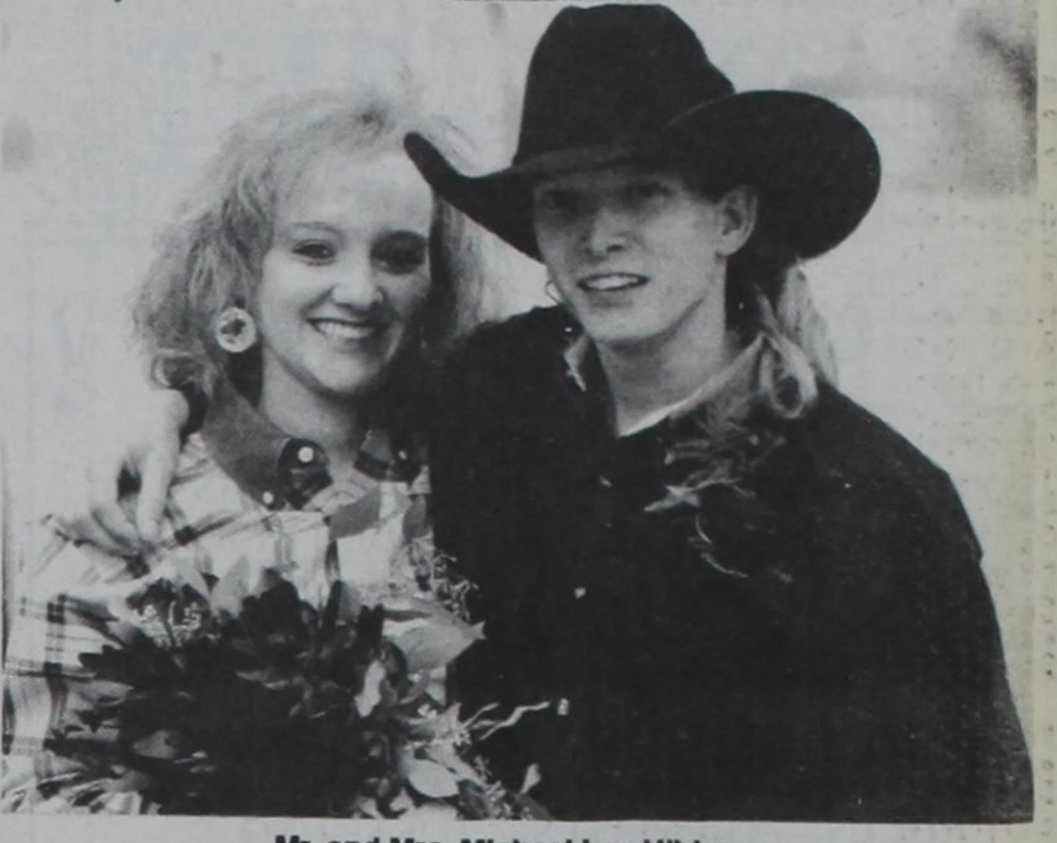
For example, if you have a 12-month \$1,000 loan and pay it off in four months, you pay almost 54 percent of the interest during the first one-third of the loan. Not all lenders use the Rule of 78's. If the formula is used, it must be stated on the contract. Use a creditor that does not use the Rule of 78's if possible.

Credit contracts are legally binding, so it's important to know what the terms of your contract mean and the costs you may bear for not knowing their meaning before signing the contract.

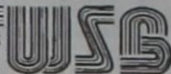

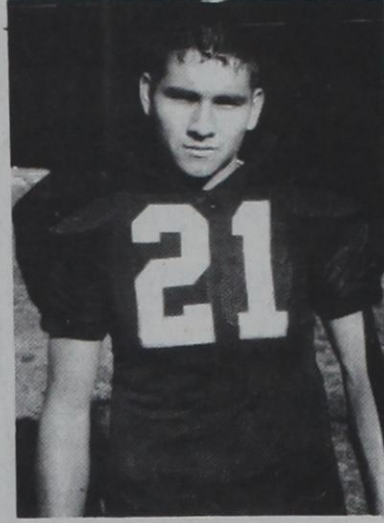
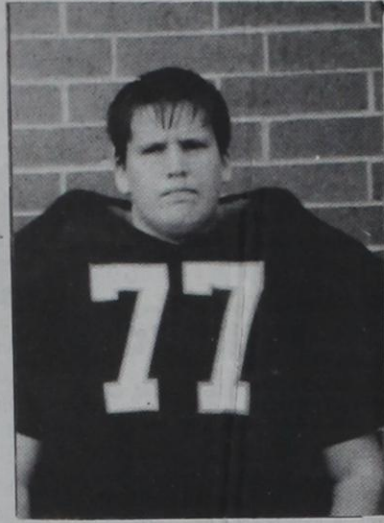

Time for Farmers to Sign-Up for CRP

Sign-up for the 16th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) begins October 14, 1997, and ends on November 14, 1997. According to Fred Allison district conservationist with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Wheeler, Tx., CRP provides an excellent opportunity for a landowner to improve his or her land, water, and wildlife resources. "CRP is a voluntary program," Allison explained. "It places environmentally-sensitive land in a 10- to 15-year contract and offers landowners free technical assistance to improve their natural resource base, rental payments for the length of the contract, and will help pay for up to 50 percent of the cost of installing approved environmental improvements," Allison added.

When asked about eligibility requirements, Allison said, "The land must have been owned or operated for at least 12 months prior to close of the sign-up period unless

(1) the new owner acquired the land as a result of the previous owner's death, (2) a foreclosure caused the change of ownership, or (3) the circumstances of the acquisition assure the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) that the new owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in CRP. If a tenant applies for CRP, the tenant must be a participant with an eligible owner or operator.

In addition, Allison continued, "cropland is eligible if it has been planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity two of the five most recent crop years. It must also be physically and legally capable of being planted to an agricultural commodity. Existing CRR contracts may not be extended. However, the acreage may be re-offered if it is otherwise eligible for enrollment.

Eligible cropland must also meet one of the following criteria to be considered highly erodible land according to the conservation compliance provisions, with portions of field having a weighted average Erosion Index of eight or higher; (2) be considered a cropland wetland; (3) be subject to scour erosion; (4) be located in a national or state CRP conservation priority area; or (5) be cropland associated with non-cropland wetlands.

This CRP sign-up is different from those in the past," continued Allison. "Rather than just reducing soil erosion, the focus is now on improving

all elements of the environment with the least cost to the taxpayer. An Environmental-Benefits Index (EBI), compiled by NRCS, awards points to a CRP application for every benefit to the environment on the land being offered. The points are then totaled and offers for CRP contracts are ranked in comparison to all other offers. Contract offers with the most environmental benefit points then proceed to the next phase, which ranks CRP offers according to the least cost to the taxpayer. This process makes applications for the 16th CRP much more competitive with each other than they have been in the past, Allison stressed.

Allison went on to explain that the EBI factors include: (1) wildlife habitat benefits which awards extra points for planting vegetative covers most beneficial to wildlife on contract acreage; (2) water quality benefits resulting from reduced erosion, runoff, and leaching; (3) on-farm benefits of reduced erosion; (4) enduring benefits to the environment which recognizes that certain practices, such as tree planting, provide environmental benefits far beyond the contract period; (5) air quality benefits as a result of reduced wind erosion; (6) benefits of enrolling in a conservation priority area where enrollment would contribute to the improvement of identified and adverse natural resource issues such as water quality, wildlife habitat, or air quality; and (7) cost.

Allison added that land rejected under previous CRP sign-ups may enroll in the 16th CRP sign-up as long as it meets the basic eligibility criteria. "A person can increase their chance of acceptance into CRP by enhancing the environmental benefits of the offer and by submitting less than the maximum rate for rental payment," Allison said.

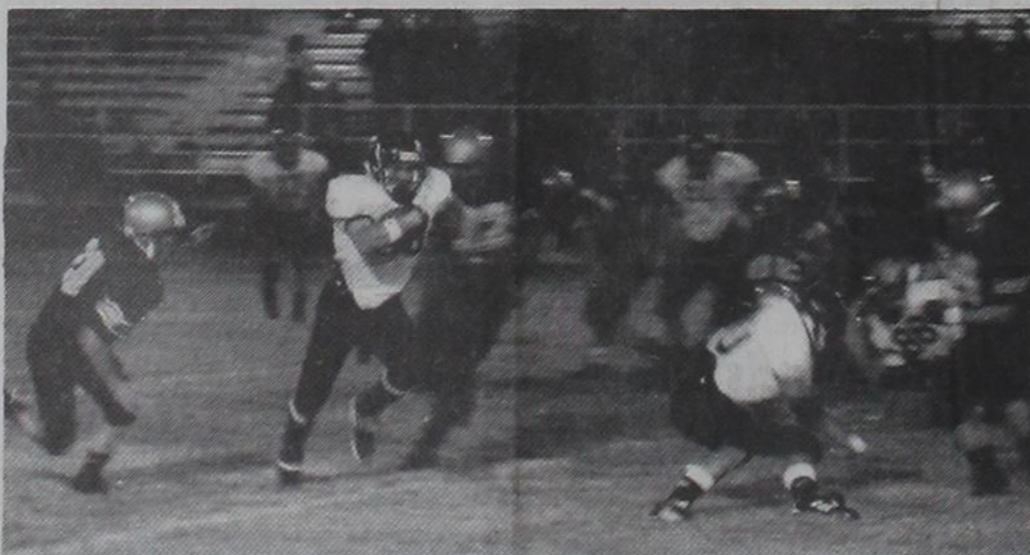
