

#### **Extension Update** By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

CHECK THE FINE PRINT Take a look at the fine print on your

credit card agreement or any other credit contract you might have signed. Look for these key clauses and be sure you know the agreements you have made.

An acceleration clause describes the lender's power to demand total payment of the loan if the borrower misses one payment. This is why it pays to plan to pay bills on time. Missing a payment on one account can make it due in full and put your ability to meet other credit and living cost commitments in jeopardy. A security agreement itemizes

property you have that the creditor may claim if you default on the loan. The property being bought with credit may be the collateral, but you may have pledged other property you own as collateral for the loan, such as land, a car or other items that you

A right of setoff clause allows the creditor to apply your assets toward payment of a loan if you default. If you borrowed the money from a bank or savings institution and have a savings account there also, the creditor may transfer funds from the savings account to pay for the loan, if you fail to repay the loan.

Some loans carry a balloon clause. This clause must be included if any loan payment is more than double other payments. It is usually the last payment that is due. When signing a contract with a balloon clause, be sure you can make the large payment or have a sound financial situation that will enable you to refinance the loan for the balance due. Otherwise, you will not be able to keep the item or property bought.

Loans often note that the Rule of 781's or Sum of Digits will be used to determine how much interest you will need to pay if you want to prepay an installment loan. It is also used to determine how much of a monthly payment on installment loans goes toward the principal borrowed and how much goes toward the interest. During the early part of the loan al-most all of the monthly payment goes to repay interest and little repays the principal.

For example, if you have a 12-month \$1,000 loan and pay it off in four months, you pay almost 54 per-cent of the interest during the first one-third of the loan. Not all lenders use the Rule of 78's. If the formula is used, it must be stated on the contract. Use a creditor that does not use the Rule of 78's if possible.

Credit contracts are legally binding, so it's important to know what the terms of your contract mean and the costs you may bear for not knowing their meaning before signing the con-

From The Minister's Desk: The first ten amendments of

the United States Constitution are known as the Bill of Rights. With these amendments, American citizens are quaranteed that they have certain freedoms and liberties which the government cannot revoke.

For example, the first amendment says: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances. "Notice that the first statement of this amendment says: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof-

-. "This statement consists of two phrases which contain two cherished constitutional rights. These two phrases are: ---

1. "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion --. "This phrase has been interpreted by this nation's judicial system to mean that a wall of separation exists between church and state. For this reason, the government cannot impose religion upon the citizens of this nation.

2. "--Or prohibiting the free exercise thereof --. "This phrase states that the government cannot prohibit "--the free exercise--" of religion. The citizens of this nation have the constitutional right of "--free exercise--" of religion without governmental inter-

Since the founding of this nation, the judicial system has struggled to maintain a balance between these two cherished constitutional rights. But for the last few years, this balance has been disturbed by several judicial rulings. These rulings have given precedent to the constitutional right of separation of church and state over the constitutional right of "--free exercise-of religion.

As a result of this imbalance, some terrible inequalities now exist in this nation. Perhaps the best example of these inequalities is that is legal to utter virtually any conceivable blasphemy in a public place. But it is illegal to pray at school, before a football game, or at a commencement ceremony. To correct inequalities like this one, it is imperative that the two constitutional rights in the first

statement of the first amendment be carefully balanced.

The importance of such balance is not limited to a proper understanding of constitutional rights. It is also needed in a proper understanding of the meaning of certain Biblical texts. One of these texts is Ephesians 2:8 which says: "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God--. "Like the first statement in the first amendment, there are two phrases in this text that must be carefully balanced. These two parts are: ---

1. "--By grace--." Salvation is by the grace of God which means that people cannot earn their salvation. The Apostle Paul wrote: "--Join with me in suffering for the gospel according to the power of God, who has saved us, and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace which was granted us in Christ Jesus --. " (II Timothy 1:9) Salvation is not by works. It is by "--grace--."

2. "--Through faith --. " Since this text plainly states that salvation is "--through faith--", the critical issue is not whether faith saves. Rather the critical issue is the type of faith that saves. According to several New Testament texts, the type of faith that saves is a faith that consists of obedience not mere mental assent. (John 3:31-39, Romans 1:1-7, James 2:14-26)

When this critical issue is prop-

erly understood, it will correct the erroneous belief that baptism is a work of human merit which nullifies the grace of God. But baptism is not a work of human merit. The Apostle Paul gave the perfect description of baptism in his letter to the church at Colossae, saying: "--Having been buried with Him in baptism, in which you were also raised up with Him through faith in the working of God, who raised Him from the dead." (Colossians 2:12) Baptism then is an act of faith which symbolizes the death, the burial, and the resurrection of Jesus Christ. (Romans 6:1-11) Rather than nullifying the grace of God, this act of faith appropriates

Ephesians 2:8 is like the first statement in the first amendment. It contains two phrases that must be carefully balanced if it is to be properly understood and correctly



#### Time for Farmers to Sign-Up for CRP Sign-up for the 16th Conservation all elements of the environment with

Reserve Program (CRP) begins Oc- the least cost to the taxpayer. An tober 14, 1997, and ends on November 14, 1997. According to Fred Allison district conservationalist with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Wheeler, Tx., CRP provides an excellent opportunity for a landowner to improve his or her land, water, and wildlife resources "CRP is a voluntary program," Allison explained. "It places environmentaly-sensitive land in a 10- to 15-year contract and offers landowners free technical assistance to improve their natural resource base, rental payments for the length of the contract, and will help pay for up to 50 percent of the cost of installing approved environmental

improvements," Allison added. When asked about eligibility requirements, Allison

said,"The land must have been owned or operated for at least12 months prior to close of the sign-up period unless

(1) the new owner acquired the land

as a result of the previous owner's death, (2) a foreclosure caused the change of ownership, or (3) the circumstances of the acquisition assure the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) that the new owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in CRP. If a tenant applies for CRP, the ten-

ant must be a participant with an eli-

gible owner or operator. In addition," Allison continued, "cropland is eligible if it has been planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity two of the five most recent crop years. It must also be physically and legally capable of being planted to an agricultural commodity. Existing CRR contracts may not be extended. However, the acreage may be re-offered if it is other-

wise eligible for enrollment. Eligible cropland must also meet one of the following criteria to offered for enrollment in 16th CRP," Allison remarked. "Cropland must (1) be considered highly erodible land according to the conservation compliance provisions, with portions of field having a weighted average Erosion Index of eight or higher; (2) be considered a cropped wetland; (3) be subject to scour erosion; (4) be located in a national or state CRP conservation priority area; or (5) be cropland associated with non-cropped wet-

This CRP sign-up is different from those in the past," continued Allison "Rather than just reducing soil erosion, the focus is now on improving
