Wheeler Co. Pct. 1 & 2 Accepted Into Panhandle Water Dist.

At their meeting on May 14th, the board of directors of Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 accepted a petition from landowners in Commissioner Precincts 1 & 2 of Wheeler County requesting to be annexed into the District. The petition was signed by 81 landowners. The petition was accepted by the board and they called for a hearing on the petition. The hearing will be Thursday, June 12, 1997, at 7:30 p.m. in the Wheeler County Courthouse.

The purpose of the hearing is to allow persons whose land or property would be affected by the annexation to offer testimony as to whether it is,

or is not, to their advantage to be annexed into the groundwater district.

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3, whose office is in White Deer, was created by the Texas State Legislature in 1954 and is governed by a locally elected board of directors. The District is charged with the conservation, preservation, protection, recharging, and prevention of waste of the underground water in the Ogallala Aquifer. It encompasses all of Carson, Donley, Gray and Roberts counties and portions of Armstrong, Potter, Hutchinson and Hemphill counties.

Spirit Wind, the United Methodist Senior Youth Choir will be making an appearance at the First United Methodist Church of Wheeler on Friday, June 6, 1997. Wheeler is represented by four young ladies.

Spirit Wind is made up of senior high youth from across the Northwest Texas United Methodist Conference. It was first organized in 1978 by the Northwest Texas Council on Youth Ministries. Twelve to twenty youth auditioned and participated in the two week summer program and the number participating for the past five years has exceeded 135.

Auditions are held in Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland and Abilene and is made up of youth with little or no musical background. They have to be committed to a weekend rehearsal in the middle of March and the first two full weeks of June.

SPIRIT WIND TO PERFORM

The group performs a concert of sacred music representative of all styles and periods. They include anthems which are standard repertoire in most churches and selections from the great masterworks.

Spirit Wind extends their travel outside the local conference area. In 1992 Spirit Wind was selected to be one of the twelve choirs for the Quadrennial General Conference of the United Methodist Church in Louisville, Kentucky. In 1995 the choir made its first international tour. July of 1997 will take the group on a tour of the East Coast. The choir has been invited to sing at the National Cathedral in Washington DC, Atlanta, Georgia; Jamestown and Williamsburg, Virginia, and Charleston, West Virginia.

From The Minister's Desk:
In his play, *Murder In The Cathedral*, T. S. Eliot warned about hypocrisy, saying: "The last temptation is the greatest treason—to do the right deed for the very wrong reason."
Mr. Eliot is not the first person to warn about hypocrisy. Throughout His ministry, Jesus warned about hypocrisy and severely condemned those people who were hypocritical. (Matthew 23)

But what exactly is hypocrisy? The dictionary defines hypocrisy as "a semblance of having desirable or publicly approved attitudes, beliefs, and principles that one does not actually possess." From this definition, two important observations can be made. These two important observations are: ---
1. There is a difference between Christians who sin and Christians who are hypocritical. This difference is sincerity not sinless perfection.
Jesus did say: "--You are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48) But the Greek word for perfect is *teleios* which means means, "Of full stature, of full age, of full growth, or of full development." It is maturity that Christians are sincerely striving to achieve.
As they strive to achieve this maturity, their progress will be characterized by mistakes, errors, and sins. Such Christians are not hypocrites

because as long as Christians are in the flesh there will be a difference between the "is" and the "should" of their lives. (1 John 1:8-10)
The evidence of hypocrisy is insincerity not imperfection.
2. Hypocrisy is rapidly becoming extinct. With such attitudes as, "Tell it like it is," and "Do your own thing," hypocrisy is harder and harder to find. But this extinction should provoke regret and not pride.
Hypocrisy is said to be the homage that vice pays to virtue. Where there is no hypocrisy, where vice ceases to shroud or veil itself, a serious condition of wickedness exists. And there is much evidence that shows such a condition presently exists.
For example, women confess their abortions and urge other women to have one. Homosexuals boast of their lifestyle on television talk shows. Marriage is considered old fashioned and "living in a relationship" is acceptable. Pornography is openly available to children. Profanity is used by men and women in every aspect of a bluish society.
The extinction of hypocrisy is tragic. With its extinction, sin is openly advocated and practiced. For these reasons, hypocrisy is wrong. Christians sincerely do the right thing. And they do it for the right reason.

Five food service managers in Wheeler, Hemphill, and Lipscomb Counties recently completed the Food Protection Management Training Program to stay up-to-date on food safety and sanitation.

The program, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the National Restaurant Association, the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association and the Texas Department of Health, seeks to help reduce the incidents of foodborne illness by providing the latest information on food safety to food service establishments.

Those who participated in the program were Susan Coate of Mel's Diner in Wheeler, Ruby Craig of Allison School Cafeteria in Allison, Tim Alexander and Barbara Long of Alexander's Grocery & Deli in Canadian, and Valerie Pierce of Higgins School Cafeteria in Higgins.

"Each food establishment which had an employee to complete this 15-hour food safety course received certification from the National Restaurant Association," said Joan Gray, Wheeler County Extension agent. "They also are now eligible to join the Industry Council on Food Safety. Those who choose to do so will receive a decal to display in their window to let customers know they are certified in food safety."

The Industry Council on Food Safety is a coalition of food service industry operators, suppliers and associations committed to addressing food safety. It was formed to encourage industry-wide training in safe food

handling and preparation procedures and to focus attention on prevention of foodborne illness.

GTE Now Offers Extended Calling To Area Towns

GTE Telephone Operations will extend local calling for all customers in the Allison/Briscoe, Canadian, Mobeetie, Pampa, and Shamrock telephone service area, beginning May 20, 1997.

Under the plan, all calls to and from Wheeler will be local calls.

"Prior to the start of the Extended Local Calling, each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call, and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said Danny Ferguson, Area Manager - Customer Operations, Plains district.

"Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls, and all customers in the towns having the new Expanded Local Calling (ELC) must now dial all seven digits, both for local calls and ELC calls," explained Mr. Danny Ferguson.

The implementation of this seven-digit service may require modification to some telecommunications equipment such as fax machines, speed calling, PABXs, key system, automatic dialers and other equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance numbers.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended calling is operational, it will no longer be necessary for customers to dial "1+" before the number when placing calls between these communities, but you must dial all seven digits for local and ELC calls.

This is a result of balloting which took place in the Wheeler telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49 (c). Under those guidelines, certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free calling to nearby communities.

A per-line increase in the total monthly bill of \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7.00 for business customers will be assessed to customers in Wheeler for the added service. The charges will be listed as "EXPANDED LOCAL CALLING" in the tax portion of the telephone bill. More information will be provided to affected customers in their monthly telephone bill as the service becomes operational.

Residential customers with questions about the ELC service should call toll-free 1-800-484-4400, and business customers should call 1-800-0483-5400.

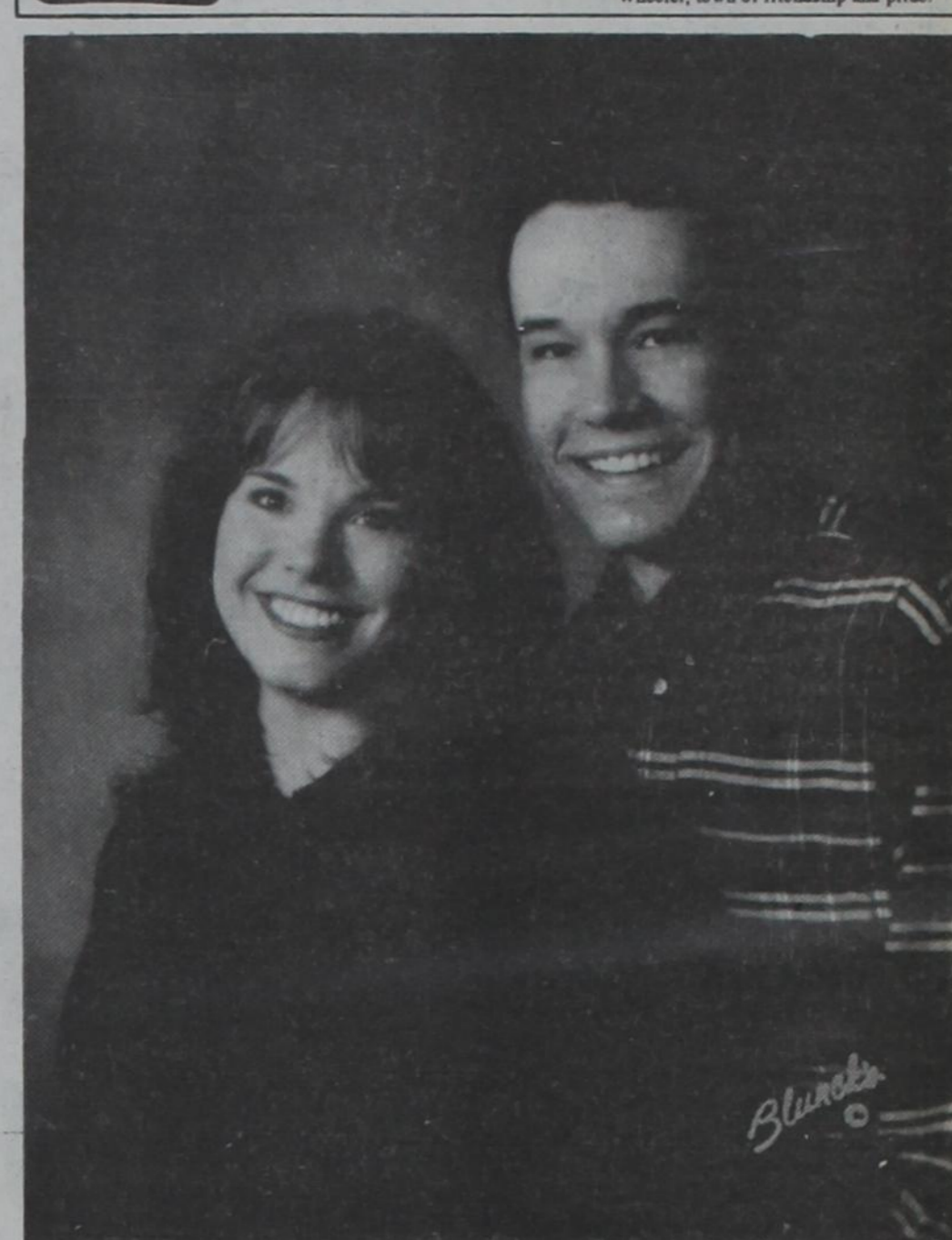

Any attending physician charges would continue to be reimbursed in part through Medicare Part B-coverage. However, the standard Medicare benefit program still helps pay covered costs necessary to treat an unrelated condition.
