Graveside Services For James Ray Nicholson, 76





A beautiful Monday morning in Allison, we were thankful for the nice rain we got on Sunday morning. We were needing that.





From The Minister's Desk:

Have you heard about the preacher who was in his office preparing a sermon on the book of Revelation ? As he was preparing this sermon, the janitor came into his office to empty the trash can.

The janitor said: "Are you work-ing hard, preacher?" With some irritation, the preacher replied: "Yes, I am ! I am preparing a sermon on the book of Revelation. "The janitor then said: "The book of Revelation is my favorite book. I just love to study the book of Revelation. "

"Oh", the preacher condescendingly replied: "When you study the book of Revelation do you use the futuristic interpretation or the historical interpretation ?"The janitor meekly answered: "Preacher, Idon't know much about those interpretations. I just believe that the book of Revelation promises that when Satan gets into a fight with God and the church, Satan will eventually lose. "

I must acknowledge that I share the frustration of the janitor. I am more than a little confused by the various interpretations that are commonly used to interpret the book of Revelation. To be perfectly honest, I view these interpretations with the same skepticism that I have for television commercials on aluminum siding.

While I have several reasons for my skepticism, the primary one is that these interpretations contribute to the popular belief that the book of Revelation is a book that cannot be understood. And if can be understood, it can only be understood by those Bible students who are clever enough to unravel its symbolism. However, such a belief is completely contrary to the teaching of the book. For example, Revelation 1:3 says: "Blessed is he who reads and those who hear the words of the prophecy, and heed the things which are written in it, for the time is near. "

Notice that this text contains an impressive promise. This promise is that people who read and "-heed -- " the words of the book of Revelation will be blessed. Because of this promise, it should be obvious that the book of Revelation is a book that should be read and it is a book that can be understood. But before the book of Revela-

tion can be correctly understood, it must be correctly interpreted. While there are several interpretations of the book of Revelation, there is one that is extremely popular. This interpretation is the futuristic inter- every age. This promise is that when pretation of the book of Revelation. It is true that the book of Revelation contains some texts that foretell some future events. In Revelation 21:11 through

Bean Blvd, in Wheeler, Texas

Revelation 22:21, for example, there is a vivid description of the final judgement of the world by God. But while this book contains some texts that prophesy about future events, it is incorrect to interpret the book of Revelation as strictly a book of unfilled prophecy of future events.

In prophetic literature, an important principle is that a prophecy must have some meaning to the people who originally received it. The futuristic interpretation of the book of Revelation violates this principle ! What benefit would it be to first century Christians to receive a prophecy that prophesied about nuclear war, Saddam Hussein, Hilter, or Mohammed ? These Christians would not be able to "--heed the things --, ' that were written in such a prophecy.

Therefore, the book of Revelation cannot be correctly understood by the futuristic interpretation. It makes the book of Revelation meaningless to first century Christians and it produces false beliefs and ideas. If then the futuristic interpretation is incorrect, what is the correct interpretation of the book of Revelation ? The correct interpretation, in my opinion, is the historical/parallel interpretation.

This interpretation recognizes that when the book of Revelation was written, the first century Christians were being persecuted by the Roman Empire and its allies. This persecution personified a fierce struggle between the Lamb who was Jesus Christ and the dragon who was Satan. Throughout this book, it is promised that Jesus will be victorious and the first century Christians can share in this victory if they maintain their faith in Him.

Could any message be more relevant to twentieth century Christians? It is true that Christians are no longer being persecuted by the Roman Empire, but they are being daily tempted by Satan who is prowling "-- about like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour. "(IPeter 5:8) Satan constantly tempts twentieth century Christians to choose the temporal not the eternal, to compromise with unrighteousness secularism, and to doubt the ultimate victory of Jesus Christ.

Because of these temptations, it is important that twentieth century Christians correctly understand the book of Revelation. To correctly understand this book, twentieth century Christians should interpret the book of Revelation with the historical-parallel interpretation. With this interpretation, an impressive promise will be revealed that is applicable to Christians of

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas and its affiliated lending associations reported loan volume growth of \$88.4 million for the first six months of the year, according to Tenth Farm Credit District financial results released this week

Total volume at midyear was \$3.97 billion, an increase of 2.3 percent from year-end 1996 loan volume. During the six-month period, the mortgage lending portfolio posted a 3.1 percent increase, driven largely by growth in the timber industry. Production lending volume held by Production Credit Associations (PCAS) grew by \$4.8 million during the first six months of 1997.

District net income totaled \$36.4 million for the six-month period, a decrease of \$11.1 million from the first six months of 1996. Net income was impacted by both a decrease in net interest income and by an increase in loan loss provisions.





Regulation Relaxed on Live Deer Trapping

Texas Parks and Wildlife officials have streamlined procedures for individuals to trap and release whitetail deer for genetic enhancement. A permit must be obtained prior to trapping or moving any deer. The purpose of the regulation change is to assist private individuals desiring to improve the quality and health of wild whitetails.

In the past an individual who intended to relocate wild whitetails had a lengthy and complicated process which included on site inspections by wildlife biologists. The capture and release sites had to pass many tests for permit approval.

Release sites now must be 200 acres or more (if they ape under a game fence) to qualify. Whitetail bucks displaying above average genetic characteristics may be relocated for breeding purposes. Whitetail doves may also be trapped and released when this transfer can be deemed desirable.

Permits will not be issued when an immediate harvest of

transplanted animals is intended. The purpose of the regulation change is to improve genetic quality. The purpose is not to faciliate hunting.

Opponents of hunting state that hunters take out the best animals and leave undesirable bucks unharvested. These undesirable, genetically inferior bucks reproduce. The recent regulation changes will counter this trend by facilitating the reproduction of genetically superior deer. If an individual has control of 200 acres with a high fence around it, this individual can obtain permits to bring exceptional whitetail bucks onto his land. These bucks would not be harvested immediately, and they would

be able to breed existing does, thereby passing on good genetic characteristics. When whitetail numbers exceed carrying capacity on said 200 acres, then hopefully these deer could be released into the wild.


Also, a farm or ranch 200 acres or more could acquire whitetail doves to introduce deer to replentish low numbers.

The regulation change will be good for the 3 1/2 million whitetail deer in the state of Texas. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department should be congratulated for their efforts to improve the quality and health of wild whitetails.
