



Project KidCare Photo ID **Program is Announced**

First State Bank is sponsoring Project KidCare Photo ID as part of a national effort to provide parents with personal safety IDs of their children in the event that their child is ever missing. Parents can obtain free, standardized, high quality photographs of their children for their KidCare ID booklet in which they can also record and maintain current and vital statistics of their children. The Wheeler County Sheriffs office will be joining the First State Bank to make fingerprints of the kids so the parents will have those to keep in their KidCare ID packet.

Project KidCare, developed by Polaroid Corporation in conjunction with The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), is a program designed to raise awareness of child safety and provide parents with an effective tool to aid law enforcement authorities in the search for a missing child.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing a breast self-exam each month

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in selfexamination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minumum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office ... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- F You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1998. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1999.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 1999 renditions is April 15. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 15 deadline.
