Hospital Board Minutes, Approves Contract With Tax Appraisal Office

SEPTEMBER 17, 2007

Chairman Thomas Helton called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Board Room at Parkview Hospital.

Present were: Thomas Helton, Chairman; Sue Chandler, Vice Chairman; James Batton, Secretary and Dale Garner. Absent: Ray Hudson

Also present: Ann Fagan Cook, RN, BSN, CEO and Deborah Whitley, CPA, Parrish, Moody & Fikes, pc

Chairman Helton moved to agenda item 6 to allow Ms. Whitley to present the annual audit report to the Board. Ms. Whitley reported that after some adjustments to the general ledger to properly locate some capital lease expenses we actually finished the last fiscal year in the black. She also gave a preliminary report on the 05/31/2007 cost report to Medicare/Medicaid that indicates we will have a receivable from Medicare due to our low volume last year. She also reported that we had less than 1% Medicaid on the inpatient side and this may affect the amount of monies we will receive from the Medicaid disproportionate share program. After answering some questions from the Board members and Ms. Fagan Cook, Ms. Whitley left the meeting at 7:16 p.m.

The normal agenda was resumed at this time. Dale Garner made a motion to approve the minutes of the August meeting. James Batton seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

James Batton made a motion to approve payment of the bills presented. Dale Garner seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Fagan Cook presented financial statements, investment report and statistics. Following some discussion James Batton made a motion to accept the information as presented. Dale Garner seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously. Bad debt and charity write-off accounts were presented. Dale Garner made a motion to approve. Motion seconded by Sue Chandler and carried unanimously.

The Board reviewed QAPI minutes and scorecards. There was some discussion after which James Batton made a motion to approve as presented. Dale Garner seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

Ms. Fagan Cook presented a contract with Fast-Health Corporation for the website for Parkview Hospital. Ms. Fagan Cook reiterated that we would have the capability to post job openings and receive applications online as well as the fact that customers could actually pay their bill online. There was discussion regarding some language in the contract regarding the first two months being rent-free. Dale Garner made a motion to accept the contract after clarification of the language. James Batton seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

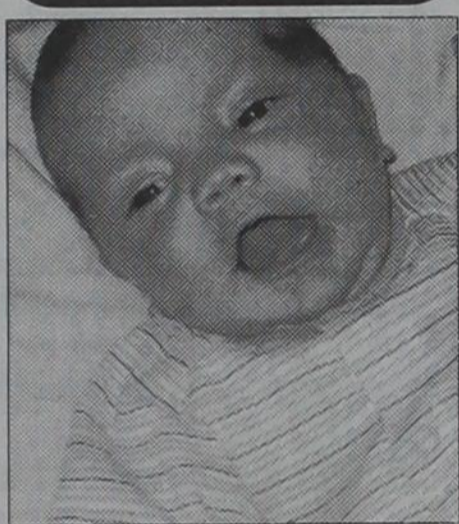

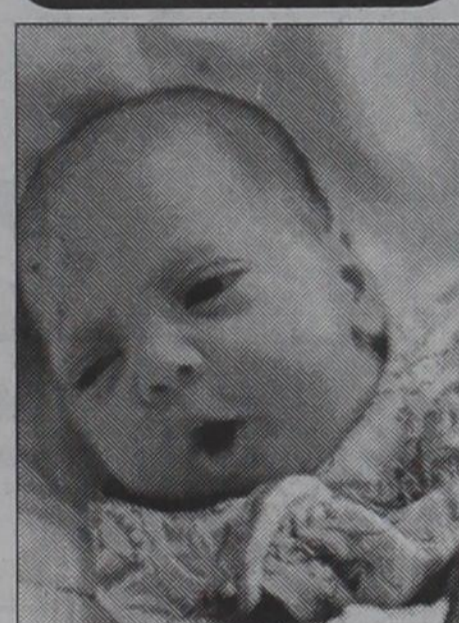

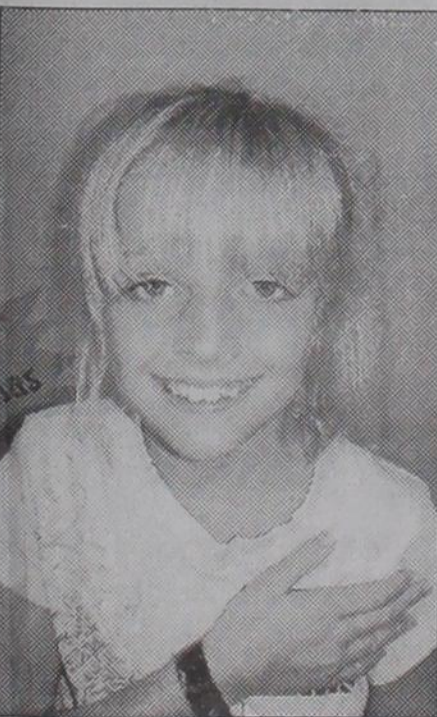
Mexican Pile-On Dinner Set Oct. 12

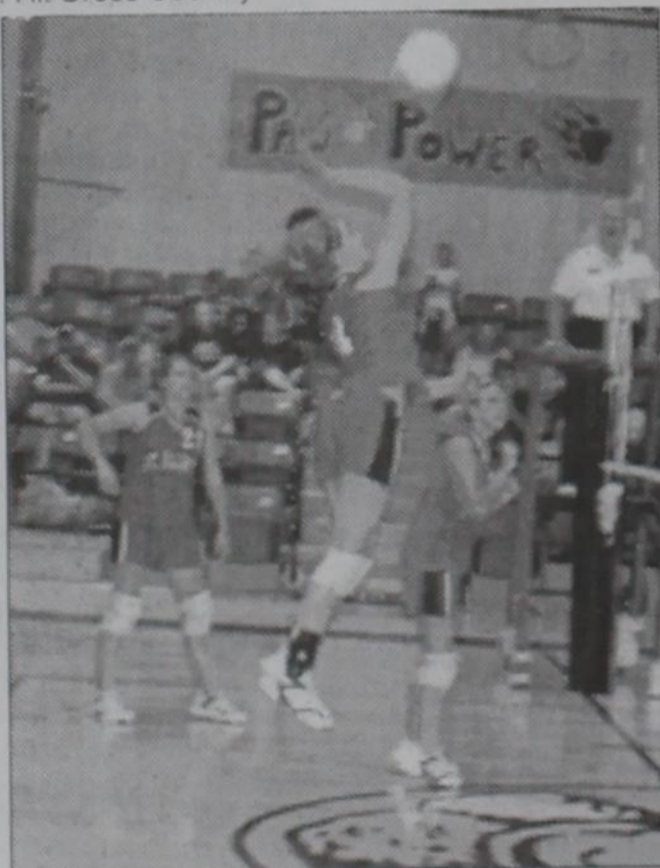

So why am I taking you down my own memory lane? Because some young person is watching you and me right now. We are in the position to greatly influence their life and the decisions they make along the way. That is an awesome responsibility that has been placed on us. So we had better put our best foot forward right now. Make a difference for now...and for years from now when you are no longer even aware that you have made that difference for someone. **Shawn D. The facilities covered by Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc.'s Certificate of Convenience and Necessity application will consist of approximately 18.4 miles of single circuit 69 kV transmission line and a new substation. The transmission line will be supported by concrete or steel single-pole structures located within the existing public right-of-way, with the possible exception of three anchor easements. Lions Club Helps Girl Regain Sight

Sergeant John Kempen, United States Army, and the Lions clubs of Wisconsin could help a 7-year-old girl from Iraq see clearly for the first time in her life after she receives corneal transplant surgery next week. Kempen, stationed in Iraq from August 2005 to December 2006, noticed the girl, named Zahraa, couldn't see well when he was tossing candy to her.

"We always threw candy to the kids and gave them the presents people sent from the U.S.," said Sgt. Kempen, 1st Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division. "We were in Iraq for 14 months and soldiers got really bummed out so giving gifts to the kids cheered us up. The kids love it, and they really go after the candy, but Zahraa could never get any. She was holding her hands over her eyes in pain."

Sgt. Kempen, now stationed at Fort Wainwright in Fairbanks Alaska, took Zahraa to see his medic and then spoke to Iraqi doctors who said they couldn't help her. He spoke to Zahraa's father who said that she was born with a vision condition and all the doctors could do was give her eye drops that had little effect. Her father said Zahraa has felt like she has sand in her eyes ever since she was a baby.

"Zahraa has swollen corneas and blisters on the front of the cornea which is why she can't see through them very well," said Doctor Kevin Flaherty, M.D. who specializes in corneal external disease at the Eye Clinic of Wisconsin. "The front surface of her cornea is breaking down from the swelling which makes her uncomfortable and the blisters make her feel like there is a foreign object in her eye constantly, hence her description of the sand."

"Zahraa's vision is at 20/400, which means that with a lot of effort, she can barely make out the large 'E' on the eye chart," Dr. Flaherty continued. "It's like she's looking through a very steamy window. She can see objects and shapes but she cannot make out anything clearly."

A year ago Sgt. Kempen turned to the Lions clubs, known for their work to combat preventable blindness around the world, for help. His mother of Crandon, WI worked with the Crandon Lions Club to arrange for Zahraa to enter the U.S. to be evaluated by Dr. Flaherty at the Eye Clinic of Wisconsin.

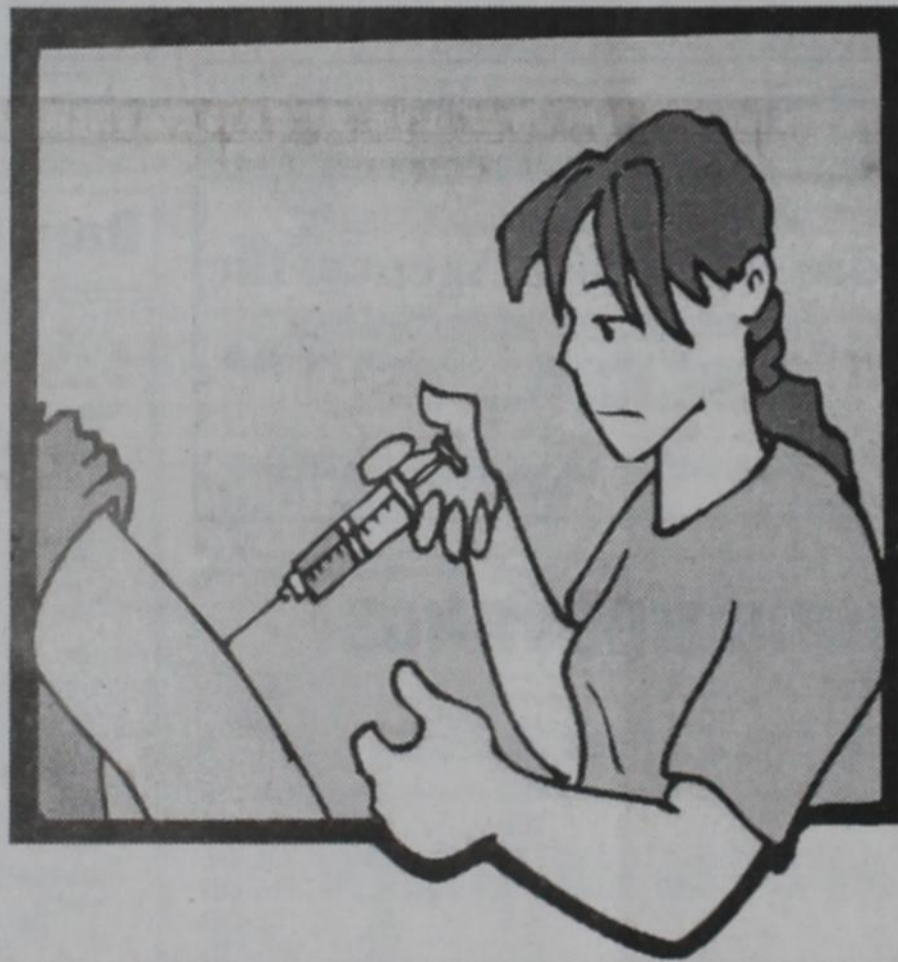
"Through the help of the Lions clubs and Sgt. Kempen we're hoping to help Zahraa see as normally as she can," said Dr. Flaherty. "I am optimistic that surgery should improve things for her. She hasn't had a clear cornea for many years, but she's of an age where she still has the opportunity to have her vision improved."

The Lions clubs of Crandon and Wausau, WI worked with Sgt. Kempen, his mother and Lions Clubs International to arrange for Zahraa to receive the corneal transplant. The corneas and surgery will be donated by the Lions Eye Bank of Wisconsin in Madison and Aspirus Wausau Hospital. The services will be donated by Dr. Flaherty and the Eye Clinic of Wisconsin. "We are so happy that Zahraa and her grandmother are finally here. We have worked hard to make this happen," said Frank Bocek, past president of the Crandon Lions Club. "Sgt. Kempen and his mother called us because they knew Lions fight blindness—and that if anyone could help Zahraa, it was the Lions. This was a real community effort and we thank Aspirus Wausau Hospital, the Lions Eye Bank and all the others who helped make this possible. We hope we can help Zahraa see well and make her eyes feel better, too."

The Lions of Wisconsin were able to work through many chan-

nels to help Zahraa and her grandmother obtain American visas. Students from Crandon Elementary School raised money to help fund Zahraa's travel to the U.S. A Wausau-based Lion and seasoned host family will house Zahraa and her grandmother for the duration of her stay in the U.S. which will last at least eight weeks.

Lions are well known for their work to end preventable blindness, which began in 1925 in response to a challenge from Helen Keller. Over the past 16 years, Lions have given \$202 million in grant funding for sight-related projects such as cataract surgeries, building eye hospitals and clinics, vision testing in preschool and elementary schools, distributing sight-saving medication to prevent river blindness and training eye care professionals.

"The fact that the Lions were able to bring Zahraa to the U.S. alone is a miracle," said Sgt. Kempen, who will visit Zahraa in Wisconsin during her recovery. "Now if they can help give her the gift of sight or even just stop the discomfort she feels in her eyes, all the hard work will be worth it."

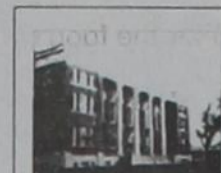

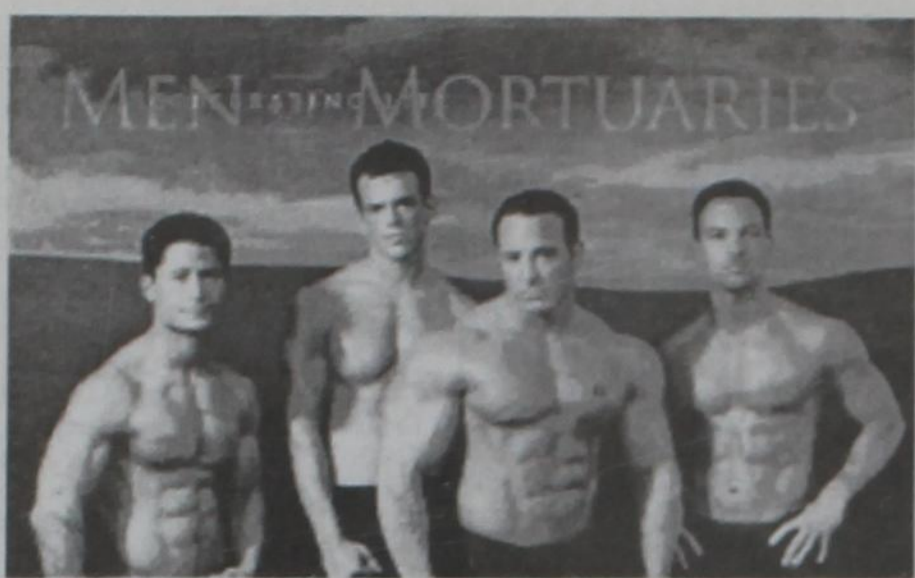

Brad Masters Is Featured In 'Men of Mortuaries' Calendar

The cover of the 2008 calendar features a group of bare-chested hunkies, but most of the inside pages show the men fully dressed in courtly scenes.

Brad Masters is a recent graduate of the Dallas Institute of Funeral Service. He and two other

students from the school recently returned from California, where they were part of a photo shoot for the calendar.

This will be the second calendar publication. The first was the 2007 calendar, the work of Ken McKenzie, a Long Beach, Calif., funeral director and mortuary owner. McKenzie's sister has recovered from breast cancer and he wanted to help other women, who are enduring the treatments. He started the KAMM Cares Cancer Foundation in 2005, to give money directly to those women rather than to research. Proceeds from the calendar, which will be released in October, will go to the foundation.

"October is Breast Cancer Awareness month," Mr. McKenzie said. "We're also going to do playing cards and puzzles that will be the type of thing you might give at a bachelorette party."

Brad waits tables part-time at a steakhouse in Mesquite, Texas. "For the calendar he modeled—muscles flexed—holding a platter of chocolate-covered strawberries and cheesecake as a couple of admirers looked on. "They were two older ladies that were checking me out instead of the dessert tray," he said.

Twenty-two year old Brad got

different responses when he told people his future plans. "It scares them and freaks them out, they think you're a creep. It took a while for me to tell people I'm a mortician."

Brad's choice of a profession began with his getting a job at Wright Funeral Home in Wheeler. "At first, I just started out mowing yards, washing cars and keeping everything maintained outside," said Masters, who grew up in Wheeler.

"At first, I was kind of like, 'Do I really want to do this?'" he remembered. "Funeral homes always have that smell. As soon as I walked in, I was like, 'There's that smell.'"

Things changed when a young man he knew was killed in an accident, and Mr. Masters helped the mortuary owners prepare for the funeral.

"After that service, I was basically in love with the funeral business," he said. "I loved being able to help the families—helping somebody in their greatest time of need."

"They don't always say, 'that was really great, We appreciate you.' But deep down inside you know that they really appreciate everything you did," he said. "Without you, you know they wouldn't be where they are right now in coping with their loss."
