# ATA ANNOUNCES ART CONTEST

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association is sponsoring an art contest to select two pieces of art work. One selection will become a special pictorial United States Postal Service Stamp cancellation for Buffalo Soldier Station that will be open for one day only on June 27th, 1998, at the Old Mobeetie Texas Association Jail Museum. A second selection will become the cover of a historical booklet that will be available on June 27th, 1998, during Wheeler County Heritage Day. The art work chosen will commemorate the Buffalo Soldier, the Black Soldiers of the 9th and 10th Gavalry Units and the 24th & 25th Infantry Regiments for their outstanding acts of valor during the Indian War Campaign.

In 1866 and 1867, soon after the Civil War, Congress organized the Ninth and Tenth Cavalry Division and the Twenty-Fourth and Twenty-Fifth Infantry Regiments for western duty against the Indian Nations. The native Americans had such great

respect for the fighting abilities of black soldiers, that they called them "Buffalo Soldiers", because of the soldiers' strength and courage they displayed during battle.

Buffalo soldiers were stationed at Fort Elliott and other military outposts from Texas to the Dakota territories, to help with the westward (Continued Page 6)

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

## Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

## Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled-or if you're 65 years old or older--you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

## Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1997, you won't need to reapply for 1998 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home-you'll need to file for an exemption for 1998. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 1997, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

When and where should I file?




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### **LEGAL NOTICE**

The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3, in compliance with Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code, will receive public comment on the proposed District Management Plan and revision of the Rules of the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District, at a special meeting of the Board of Directors on Wednesday, March 18, 1998, at 1:30 p.m., in the Panhandle Ground Water District Office. 201 West 3rd St., White Deer, Texas. The following is a brief outline of the most notable changes.

### MANAGEMENT PLAN, as required by §36.1071, Texas Water Code:

The overall management goal is to have at least 50% of current water supplies still available after fifty (50) years.

#### **DISTRICT RULES**, re-systematization of current rules:

1. District-wide well registration, which will require the registration of all non-permitted wells; 2. The implementation of an aquifer depletion rule, which will require the study, and possible regulation, of all wells depleting the aquifer faster than the acceptable decline rate set by the Board;

- 3. The addition of a larger well classification, to the current minimum spacing rule;
- 4. A comprehensive revision of the hearing process.

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



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Letter to The Editor



Every week hundreds of teenagers get Hepatitis B. Like most viral illnesses, once Hepatitis B virus is contracted, there is no cure.

Hepatitis B virus is transmitted by blood and body fluids. This may include: Having sex with someone of unknown hepatitis B status; sharing needles, toothbrushes, or razors with classmates or roommates; coming in contact with someone's blood; and/ or tattoos or body piercing with unsterile equipment. You Do Not get hepatitis B from sneezing, coughing or holding hands. But with all the ways someone could contract the virus, it's scary. But, as parents, you can do something to protect your child from this potentially fatal disease, by getting them immunized with the Hepatitis B Vaccine. The series consist of 3 injections over a period of 6 months; initially, second dose one month later, and a third dose five months from the second dose. To provide full protection the series must be completed. Your health care provider can arrange a schedule that meets your needs.

## **Cooking Tips**

To reduce tearing when peeling or slicing an onion, chill for 30 minutes or cut off the top, but leave the root on. The root has the largest amount of sulfuric compounds, which is what causes tears when the onion is peeled or cut. Remove the root prior to cooking or eating.

Prolonged cooking takes the flavor out of onions. Cook only until they're tender when tested with a fork.
