County Receives Award For 1997 Employee Safety


Wheeler County has been awarded a 1997 Safety Award by the Texas Association of Counties (TAC), which administers a Workers' Compensation self-insurance pool for counties and other local governments.

The award was presented Monday, September 14, 1998, to Wheeler County Commissioners Court by TAC Representative, James Cain.

The award was earned for their record of involvement and commitment to safety in the workplace, as well as for controlling their Workers' Compensation claims.

The honor means that Wheeler County, which participates in the counties' pool through TAC, is obtaining substantial savings for their taxpayers as a result of their TAC Worker' Comp coverage. Premiums are reduced for public entities that have lowered their claims rates.

Wheeler County has saved approximately \$53,957.00 in Workers' Compensation costs in 1997 compared to the manual rates fur Workers' Com-(Continued Page 7)


