## ACCIDENT VICTIM AIR-LIFTED TO AMARILLO

### JOE SMITH SUFFERED INJURY TO RIGHT LEG FROM ACCIDENT WITH SEPARATOR

Joe Smith, 40, of Wheeler will undergo surgery Thursday at High Plains/St. Anthony's in Amarillo to further repair damage to his right leg following an accident near Wheeler on Monday.

Smith was helping to move a gas separator at a sight east and north of Wheeler between Kelton and Allison on Highway 592. Two separators on a dehydrator location were setting side-by-side and one needed to be moved to another sight. In an effort to put flanges in place, the separator slipped, pinning Smith between the two pieces of equipment.

A small winch on one of the trucks was no match for the 8,000 lbs of oil field equipment. A jack was used, lifting the separator enough to free Smith.

A valve on the fixed separator had been shoved through Smith's leg just above the knee; this had to be removed before he could be freed and taken for to the hospital.

The accident happened around 12:30 and some 30 minutes was needed to free the victim.

At Parkview Hospital Smith was determined to have a shattered femur and knee injuries. He was air-lifted to Amarillo by helicopter, where he underwent surgery.

Smith, an employee of NorAm Field Service, faces 10 days to two weeks in the hospital. He was 41 on Tuesday.

## Sims Issues Temporary Restraining Order

Hon. M. Kent Sims, Judge of the 31st Judicial District Court, Wheeler, Wheeler County, Texas, issued a temporary restraining order on March 26, 1998, restraining the United States of America department of Health and Human Services, Health Care Financing Administration and Palmetto Government Benefits Administrators from implementing or enforcing the proposed rules contained in Federal Register Vol. 63, Number 1, Pages 89-105, Pages 291-355 related to the following matters:

1. Surety bonds required of free-

standing home health agencies;  
2. Interim Payment System for all home health agencies, specifically as related to per beneficiary Medicare cost limitations under the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, #4601 et seq.; and  
3. Cost reduction limits imposed under the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, Pub. L 105-33 on home health services.

This restraining order was requested by Case Review and Research Consultants, Inc., d/b/a TLC Home Health Services, Home Care

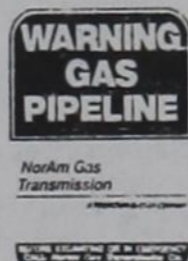

Members of the groups were to be nominated by various interest groups and charged to represent eleven interest groups: agricultural interests, counties electric generating utilities, environmental interests industries, municipalities, public, small businesses, river authorities, water districts, and water utilities.

Nineteen of the twenty-one members of the group were present, with all eleven interest groups represented. The Panhandle Planning Group rovers twenty-one counties in the Texas panhandle: Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Hall, and Childress.

At this meeting By-Laws were adopted and the following officers were elected: C. E. Williams, Gen. Mgr., Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District, chairman; Hon. Vernon Cook, Judge, Roberts County, vice-chairman; Dan Coffey,

Asst. Dir. of Utilities, City of Amarillo, secretary; John C. Williams, Gen. Mgr., Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, at large; and Nolan Clark, Director, USDA-Agricultural Research Service, at large.

The regional water planning groups will provide for the development, management, and conservation of water resources and preparation for, and response to, drought conditions, in order that sufficient water will be available at a reasonable cost to ensure public health, safety, and welfare; further economic development; and protect agricultural and natural resources of the regional water planning area.

The planning group must prepare, adopt, and submit a regional water plan to the Texas Water Development Board by September 1, 2000. These approved regional water plans will be incorporated into a comprehensive statewide water plan that will be adopted by the TWDB.

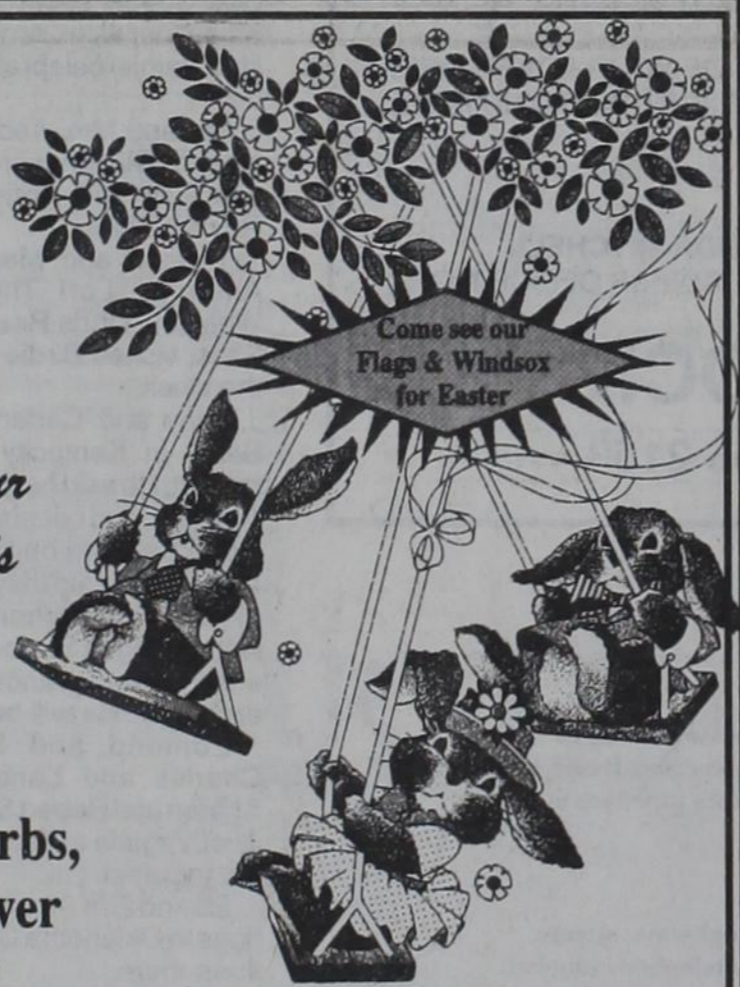
