Smith was helping to move a gas separator at a sight east and north of Wheeler between Kelton and Allison on Highway 592. Two separators on a dehydrator location were setting side-by-side and one needed to be moved to another sight. In an effort to put flanges in place, the separator slipped, pinning Smith between the two pieces of equipment.

A small winch on one of the trucks was no match for the 8,000 lbs of oil field equipment. A jack was used, lifting the separator enough to free

A valve on the fixed separator had been shoved through Smith's leg just above the knee; this had to be removed before he could be freed and taken for to the hospital.

The accident happened around 12:30 and some 30 minutes was needed to free the victim.

At Parkview Hospital Smith was determined to have a shattered femur and knee injuries. He was airlifted to Amarillo by helicopter, where he underwent surgery.

Smith, an employee of NorAm Field Service, faces 10 days to two weeks in the hospital. He was 41 on Tues-



Association of America, and an elderly individual in a lawsuit filed today against the aforementioned parties alleging that the proposed rules are unconstitutional under Articles V and XIV of the United Stated Constitution and under Sections 3, 16, 17 and 19, Article I of the Texas Constitution. TLC Home Health Services is a free standing home health agency serving the elderly in Wheeler, Collingsworth, Gray, Donley and Hemphill County, Texas. Home Care Association of American, Inc., is a national association of free-standing home health agencies dedicated to insuring that quality medical care is provided o the elderly in accordance with medicare regulations. The elderly individual is an 81 year old male who lives alone in Shamrock, Texas, and who currently receives home health services for numerous health problems and who believes that the proposed rules will cause him to lose these vital home health services. All of these Plaintiffs believe that the proposed rules which are scheduled to go into effect on April 1, 1998, will result in serious economic hardship and health complications for those concerned, especially the old and the infirm, who are the main recipients of home health services in rural
