#### Army Cutworms Are In Local Wheat & Alfalfa

Area alfalfa and wheat producers should be watching army cutworms. The pests have been identified as infesting alfalfa and wheat in other areas of the Panhandle causing some damage, especially in alfalfa.

According to Dr. Carl Patrick, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Amarillo, the army cutworm is a sporadic pest of alfalfa and wheat in the Texas Panhandle. Occasional heavy infestations can cause considerable damage to both of these crops.

Farmers should be aware that cutworms lay eggs and hatch offspring in the fall. This species will feed periodically as temperatures allow during the winter. And, given the type of winter, the worms can be quite large by February and March, and be most damaging.

"Mature larvae can attain lengths of 1 1/2 to 2 inches," Patrick said. The worms are greenish-brown or greenish-gray, and have a narrow pale stripe down their backs, the full length

of the body. Although true cutworms, they feed on foliage much like armyworms. During sunny days they will be under debris or slightly underneath the soil surface. Their presence will be obvious on plants during overcast days and at night when temperatures are above freezing.

"Fortunately, there is only one generation per year," said Patrick, however, these worms could cause damage over the next 3 to 4 weeks.

Insecticide applications are justified when four-to-five army cutworm per square foot are causing visible damage in well-established alfalfa or wheat. In poor, thin stands of wheat or seedling alfalfa - the economic threshold should be dropped to two per square foot.

"During outbreak years, it is not uncommon to find 10 to 20 army cutworm per square foot, "said Patrick.

Effective treatments for wheat are Karate and Lorsban4E SG, and alfalfa producers can select from Karate, Lorsban, Pounce, Ambush, or Baythroid insecticides. The insecticide will have grazing restrictions; producers should read the label care-

"The cutworm moths, also called 'Millers" can be a real nuisance in April and early May before flying away from this area," Patrick added

Cotton producers and crop-sharing landowners will decide in an April 22 referendum whether or not to establish a boll weevil eradication program in the 14-county Northern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication

Voters will also establish a maximum assessment rate and elect a board member from the zone to serve on the statewide Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Inc.

#### **KPDR-FM Ice Storm Repairs Underway**

KPDR-FM and the Kingdom Keys Network serves this area with informational and inspirational radio programming. The ice storm at the end of January has caused enormous damage to the equipment in Wheeler Though there appeared to be little ice problems at ground level, it was a different story 400 feet up on the Wheeler tower. Severe damage occurred to the transmission antennas, which in turn caused other parts of the equipment to be burned up when the antennas could no longer handle the output power properly, resulting in power being deflected back down into the transmission line. The situation will require the purchase of 8 new antennas and other parts, plus the installation by a 3 man tower crew, which is costly. The estimated cost of getting the equipment repaired and getting the station back on the air is

approximately \$25,000. It has been a very frustrating expe-





CITY OF WHEELER DEVELOPING

SOURCE WATER PROTECTION PROGRAM

The City of Wheler is developing a Source Water Protection Plan in order to protect the groundwater, which supplies the needs of our community. One of the goals of this plan is to increase resident's awareness about the vulnerability of City of Wheeler groundwater to contamination. It is important that each one of us recognize that we can have a direct influence on the quality of the groundwater the City of Wheeler uses.

WHAT IS SOURCE WATER PROTECTION? Source Water Protection is, simply stated, protecting the land area surrounding a well in order to prevent contamination of the groundwater that is likely to be drawn into the well during pumping. Source water protection plans have been developed for several communities around Texas, and in

over 30 states nationwide. These plans are encouraged by agencies such as the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency. These agencies are responsible for setting safe drinking water standards and for protecting natural resources such as groundwater. Texas Rural Water Association offers this program at no charge to the City of Wheeler. Texas Rural Water Association has a source water technician on staff who coordinates with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Together, they provide individual attention and Best Manage-

ment Plans for the City of Wheeler. WHAT IS GROUNDWATER?

Many people think of groundwater as an under ground river or lake, but actually it occurs wherever water fills the tiny spaces in between grains of any earth materials (rock or soil). Earth materials that can transmit large quantities of water through these "pore" spaces are called AQUIFERS. Sand and gravel typically are good aquifers, while materials such as clay and shale (a type of rock) are not.

Groundwater occurs beneath the land surface in Texas. In many places it lies just a few feet underground. However, in some aquifers the groundwater lies several hundred feet beneath the surface. Groundwater usually begins as rain and melted snow, which falls across the land and then seeps into the water we use for cooking, washing, and of course, drinking.

WHY PROTECT GROUNDWATER?

First of all, polluted groundwater can pose health hazards to those who drink it. Second, once it is contaminated, groundwater is very difficult to clean (if it can be cleaned at all). If the groundwater near the City of Wheeler were to become contaminated, the city would likely be required to install filters to purify the water, or be forced to find an alternative source of water for its citizens. This can be very expensive.

When it comes to protecting groundwater, the old saying, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure", applies. Fortunately, the City of Wheeler wells do not have a contamination problem at this point. The source water protection plan will address potential contamination sources in the wellhead area and help to assure that the City of Wheeler maintains the quality of its groundwater.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? ⇒Work with the individuals who will be asking questions during the

⇒Inform the City of Wheeler of any potential contamination sources (see list below). Be sure to indicate the type and location of each source. ⇒Have abandoned water wells properly capped and sealed.

⇒Conserve water. Some contaminants are naturally degraded within soils. The less groundwater you use, the longer it stays in the ground, and the greater the chance that it can clean itself.




