BIG POWER PLANT AT ODESSA

Work on the erection of a half million dollar power plant by the Texas Electric Service Co. is due to start soon according to report:

The big power plant is to serve this part of West Texas with power for the oil fields and potash industry and proof of the prosperity that is in store for this town is seen in this company making their investment here.

A high line carrying 60,000 volts is now being built out of Big Spring and will be brought to Odessa where the power plant will distribute the power to the various oil field towns surrounding Odessa. In the event more power is needed the line is built so as to convert it into a 132,000 volt line.

**INTEREST IS SHOWN
IN ROAD BOND PLAN**

Fort Worth, Texas, April 24. — Widespread interest has been aroused by the Highway Club of Texas or a State-wide revolving bond issue of at least \$100,000,000 to be used in constructing a system of permanent roads and widening present roads throughout the State, it was announced at the offices of the club here.

The bond issue, similar to the highway financing programs now being carried out in nearly half the States of the Union, would be cared for, as suggested by the Highway Club, with revenue derived from a portion of the gasoline tax. As the bonds would be issued only as construction work progressed, it was said that the \$100,000,000 issue would provide ample working capital for a ten-year building program and would not necessitate any additional tax burden on the people.

Two of the chief benefits of the plan, it was stated, are the fact that it would give the State within a few years a complete connected system of permanent highways, permitting the people who are paying the tax to get the benefits of their money, and the still more important fact that it will reduce maintenance costs to a minimum. In this connection, it was pointed out that maintenance and rebuilding of highways in the State system this year alone will cost more than \$11,000,000, which is more than sufficient to provide interest and sinking fund for the proposed bond issue.

Letters, telegrams and personal messages to the Highway Club, as well as editorial comments in various newspapers, indicate a widespread interest in the bond issue proposal, W. T. Wheeler, general manager of the club, said. Not all of the messages and editorial comments are in full sympathy with the proposal, it was stated, most of them expressing a desire to study results obtained in States where State-wide bond issues already have been voted before passing final judgment. Wheeler, however, considers it a significant fact that little or no outspoken opposition to the proposal has been heard and on the other hand a number of influential persons in varied walks of life have openly endorsed the plan.

LUBBOCK APPROVES OF RICKER RECITAL

Two hundred of Lubbock's music lovers were treated to one of the most delightful musical performances of the season when Miss Mabel Ellen Ricker soprano, and Mrs. Jed A. Rix, pianist, appeared in joint recital in the Hotel Lubbock ball-room last night.

Miss Ricker opened her program with "Una Voce Poco Fa" from the Barber of Seville, and displayed wonderful ability in the realm of the coloratura. Her voice of exquisite lyric quality was used with equal facility in all of her numbers. Her second group of songs consisted of "Chanson Triste" by Deparc and "Tes Yeux" by Rabey, both of which were nicely done and followed by a Creole song, "Down by Ole Bayou" by Lily Strickland as an encore.

Mrs. Rix's numbers were Beethoven's Opus 10, Number 2 Sonata Mendel's Improvisation of a Lithuanian song by Chopin and Chopin's Third Ballade, all of which were played in the same artistic manner and attention to detail that have characterized her numerous appearances before home audiences. As an encore Mrs. Rix selected Liszt's "Dream of Love," which was beautifully presented.

Miss Ricker's English group was composed of "On the Wings of Song" by Mendelssohn, "Let Miss Lindy Pass," a negro dialect song by Rogers and Star Eyes by Oley Speaks, the audience demanding an encore, "The Gospel Train," a negro spiritual, by Burleigh.

Unquestionably Miss Ricker's arias were the crowning points in her excellent performance. Her closing number was "Si Mi Chiamano Mimi" from La Boheme which again displayed her vocal art and voice to great advantage.

It would be impossible to close without mentioning the accompaniments as played by Mrs. Rix, who rendered perfect support and most intelligent aid at the piano.

The program was presented by St. Paul's Woman's Auxiliary, and was the second of a series of concerts to be given in West Texas by Miss Ricker and Mrs. Rix.

Miss Ricker, whose home is in Big Spring, was formerly a Lubbock resident. For the past several years she has been studying with Oscar Seagle and several other noted voice teachers. Mrs. Rix, who is well known as one of Texas' most talented pianists is a pupil of Percy Grainger.—Lubbock Morning Avalanche.

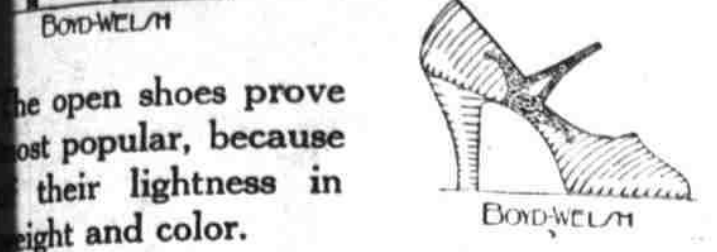

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

By the W. T. Chamber of Commerce

Stamford — The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has scored again in its work for the interest of its cotton growers, cotton markets, and compresses. According to word from U. S. Pawkett, San Antonio, Traffic Manager, the Interstate Commerce Commission has sustained West Texas' contention in every part of the so-called Houston case. The Interstate Commerce order in this case, in line with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce contentions, approved the plan for making the same rate apply either at water front or back of water front facilities at the ports, and found that the existing compress concentration arrangements were not discriminatory and therefore legal and lawful.

Childress — Everything is in readiness for the district convention of the Green-Belt-Lower Panhandle section of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held here May 5. A constructive program has been arranged which includes prominent speakers from many points over the state.

San Saba — San Saba is looking for individuals or large concerns with sufficient capital to develop marble industry in its section. The San Saba marble has tested to be freer from foreign materials and longer lived than any other marble known. It is so located that it can be taken from quarries and placed f. o. b. cars at a cheaper rate per cubic foot than any other marble in any other section.

Wichita Falls — Manager Homer D. Wade has established his headquarters in the Hamilton building here until after the ninth annual convention to meet May 16 and 17. He is resorting to airplane transportation in order to fill multiple calls for engagements at diverse points of the state.

Fredericksburg — At a mass meeting of its citizenship, Gillespie County voted and endorsed a co-operative creamery, and subscribed over one-half the contemplated \$20,000 stock for its establishment. Campaign is under way to raise the remainder of the stock for the creamery.

Big Lake — The Board of Trustees of the Reagan County Independent School District have let contract for a high school building for Big Lake and for a new building for Stiles, twenty miles north of here. Architects for the building are the same who drew the plans for Reagan County's \$100,000 courthouse now nearing completion.

Wheeler — A modern steam laundry is the newest addition to industries of Wheeler. The plant cost in the neighborhood of \$4,000.

Glen Rose — A highway or "topped" road from Walnut Springs to Glen Rose is the latest project under development in this section.

Channing — West Texas communities wanting physicians in their communities might well write Tom Collins, County Attorney of Hartley County and secretary of the Channing Commercial Club of their wants. Channing recently broadcast its need of a doctor in a leading state paper, and as a result had applications from 25 physicians in Texas and Oklahoma. Dr. B. B. McGee of Roxana has moved to this place, but there are 25 physicians who may be willing to make changes to other West Texas points.

MOODY CALLS SPECIAL SESSION FOR MAY 9TH

Austin, April 18. — Gov. Dan Moody issued a proclamation Monday convening the special session of the Fortieth Legislature on Monday, May 9.

Three subjects for legislation were mentioned in his call—appropriations, introduction of a civil service system into the State government and development of the highway system. In a statement some days ago Moody indicated that he would ask for prison legislation, and the request is almost sure to come by the failure of the regular session to provide authority for the relocation of the prison headquarters by the newly created prison board of nine citizens. The board was given no authority to sell any of its present 80,000 acres or to buy new sites. A strong movement has been under way to relocate the system in Central Texas and abandon farming as the major industry. This is opposed by Chairman Lee Satterwhite of the house penitentiary committee, who objects to the Central Texas move and wants the system concentrated on the rich farms on the lower Brazos in Fort Bend and Brazoria counties.

The governor's proclamation gave no details as to the amendments he desires to the highway laws nor the plan of civil service for State employees. He is expected to cover these in detail in his message to the legislature.

The tobacco tax is believed to be one of the subjects that will be submitted before the session ends.

LAUNDRYMEN HOLD DISTRICT MEET HERE LAST SATURDAY

A district meeting of Laundrymen of this territory was held in Big Spring last Saturday with nine representatives in attendance. This was a special meeting held for the purpose of recommending the Midland Odessa laundry owners for membership in the state association, and the transaction of other business.

Representatives were here from Sweetwater, Colorado Lamesa, Snyder, Midland and Odessa.

Colorado was selected as the place for holding the next meeting and July 30 was selected as the date for such meeting.

The visiting delegates were the guests of L. C. Holdrege and C. E. Yarnell while here. They were taken for a ride thru the city, a visit to the U. S. Experiment Station and other points of interest.

 may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. Said Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by it. Said Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and said Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be prescribed by law.

Section 6 (of Article V): The Legislature shall, from time to time, divide the State into such number of Supreme Judicial Districts as to it may seem necessary, not exceeding twelve at any one time, and shall have the power to re-district the State at any time, and shall establish a Court of Civil Appeals in each of said Districts, which Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and not less than two Associate Justices as the Legislature may provide, who shall have the qualifications as hereinafter prescribed for Justices of the Supreme Court, provided that the aggregate number of Judges of all of the Courts of Civil Appeals shall never at one time exceed thirty-six. Each of the existing Courts of Civil Appeals shall continue until otherwise provided by law. The Courts of Civil Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of their respective districts, which shall extend to all civil cases of which the District Courts or County Courts have original or appellate jurisdiction, under such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, that the decisions of said Courts shall be conclusive on all questions of fact brought before them on appeal or error. Said Courts of Civil Appeals shall hold their sessions at such places as may be designated by the Legislature and at such times as may be prescribed by law. Said Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of their respective Districts, at a general election, for a term of six years, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. Said Courts shall have such other jurisdiction, original and appellate, as may be prescribed by law. Each Court of Civil Appeals shall appoint a Clerk in the same manner as the Clerk of the Supreme Court, which Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by law. The Judges of the Courts of Civil Appeals who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Section 7 (of Article V): The State shall be divided into as many Judicial Districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a licensed lawyer for four years next preceding his election, and during that time shall have been a practicing lawyer or Judge of a Court of record or such practicing lawyer and Judge together, who shall have resided in the District in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his District during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and shall receive for his services such compensation as may be prescribed by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year, in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power, by general or special laws, to authorize the holding of special terms of the court or the holding of more than two terms in any County for the dispatch of purpose. The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent or is, from any cause, disabled or disqualified from presiding. The Supreme Court or the Chief Justice thereof may assign any District Judge to any District in the State other than that for which he was elected, with all the powers of a resident District Judge of the District to which he is assigned, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, or by the Supreme Court in the absence of such regulations enacted by the Legislature. The District Judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2: Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with pen or pencil the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

"Against the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3: The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4: The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

"Against the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Sec. 3: The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 60, Article 16 so as to provide that the Legislature may fix the compensation of certain county officers by salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites; providing for an election and making appropriation to pay expenses.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 60, Article 16, to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 60. The Legislature may provide compensation for certain district and county officers, to-wit:

The District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector, by prescribing their duties, and fixing salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites as now provided by the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, and commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," and "Against amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated out of any money on hand in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or as much thereof as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the holding of this election, including the expenses of printing notices and advertisements.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

JOINT RESOLUTION
 S. J. R. No. 33.
 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section to be numbered Section 30a which shall read as follows:

Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount of salary or compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, and no more, payable monthly, and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

The salary or compensation of any member of the Legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment.

Sec. 2: Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed thereon:

"For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon:

"Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1929, and not sooner."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3: The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4: The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expense of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.

H. J. R. No. 25
 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article VIII by the insertion of Section 1-a therein, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the separation of the objects of taxation for State purposes and for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and Counties, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax or other form of tax for State purposes only, and for local purposes, only; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the classification of objects of taxation and providing that rates shall be equal on the same class of property, and fixing limitations upon taxation.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein Section 1-a, as follows:

Section 1-a. The Legislature may separate the objects of taxation for State purposes from the objects of taxation for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and counties;

and may provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax, or other form of tax, on certain classes of taxable property, or other objects, for State purposes only (including school purposes); or upon certain classes of property, or other objects, for county or local purposes only (including school purposes). In no event shall the rate of such taxes exceed the sum of the limits of such taxes fixed by this Constitution for State, county and other local purposes. The Legislature may provide for the classification of objects of taxation. Taxation shall be equal and uniform.

Sec. 2: The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

"Against the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Sec. 3: The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 60, Article 16, to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 60. The Legislature may provide compensation for certain district and county officers, to-wit:

The District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector, by prescribing their duties, and fixing salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites as now provided by the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, and commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," and "Against amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated out of any money on hand in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or as much thereof as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the holding of this election, including the expenses of printing notices and advertisements.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

If you get your sights too high you are sure to miss the mark. It is better to keep both feet on the ground and play it safe.

It may require six months or more for the oil situation to return to normal so do not get impatient. The shallow oil sands of Howard County are going to be the first to attract development.

Our chautauqua does not come to Big Spring this year until the good old summer time, beginning about June 24. In our opinion this is going to prove anything but the best time for a week's entertainment.

Just because the floods in the Mississippi Valley may destroy cotton crops on a few hundreds of thousands of acres is no reason for folks to go wild for a larger acreage in cotton. The floods are not materially boosting cotton prices.

Tourists are beginning to appear in great numbers and Big Spring is going to see many thousands of them during the coming months. With a number of well equipped tourist camps in our city we can offer accommodations for all who come.

Oil men in other fields have September picked as the month big development is going to open in the Big Spring section. With wildcat wells so many miles apart, coming in for producers, they say that an immense oil field is going to be developed.

We cannot understand why some enterprising chap does not operate a feed mill at Big Spring. We raise the best poultry food to be found anywhere. Such a mill to afford a market for all the maize, kaffir and other sorghum grains would certainly be a fine thing for the growers.

Several men have lost their lives in West Texas recently when officers sought to enforce the law against the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors. It just won't pay men to trifle with the law just to make some easy money, and sooner or later the law is going to get you.

Diversified production is to be regarded not as a panacea for all farm troubles, but rather as a means to an end, whereby a more efficient utilization of the farm, its equipment, and the labor of the farmer is secured. The managerial ability which makes the best use of labor, land, and capital will ultimately produce the largest net profit.

One of the most important things for our City Commissioners to tackle is the securing of two viaducts over the railroad tracks where two of our streets connecting the north and south sections of city cross the railway. From 11 to 13 tracks cross the two streets and the people who are compelled to use these streets need a better measure of protection than is now accorded.

The Texas Electric Service Co. is one of the big corporations whose officials are able to look ahead and see the wonderful development that is going to take place in West Texas due to the finding of commercial oil wells in so many counties. This company is now expending millions of dollars on improvements and will be ready to meet any and every requirement for electrical service. Big Spring was selected as one of the points for the erection of a big power plant.

This practice of taking up collections for ball players awaiting home runs may be O. K. but it is not much of an encouragement to many members of the team. Many times a chance to make a safe hit is lost by a fellow who has his mind set on making a home run or nothing. Then, too, more depends on the pitcher's efforts and the team work of the nine men than it does on home run hitting. Of course we enjoy the thrill of a home run swat but we do not believe all the honors should be showered on the home run hitter if we are to have a winning team.

Sweetwater, Texas, April 30.—The spring meeting of the West Texas Press Association will be held in Sweetwater June 4, according to information received Wednesday by Monte E. Owen, secretary of the board of city development, from W. E. Reid of Colorado, secretary of the association. The program will be devoted to further perfection of the association, which was organized last fall at Colorado, to making plans for attendance at the State Press meeting in El Paso June 16, 17 and 18, and a general business program.

At least 100 editors and newspaper men are expected to attend the meeting here, as the association's territory extends from Fort Worth to El Paso and from Lubbock to San Angelo. Officers of the association are: President, J. L. Martin, Snyder; vice president, James L. Dow, Lubbock; secretary-treasurer, W. E. Reid, Colorado. Executive committee, Barney Hubbs, Pecos; E. I. Hill, Tahoka; C. S. Boyles, Jr., Sweetwater; W. D. VanBlarcom, Fort Worth.

A local entertainment committee is now at work and plan to give the visitors a banquet and arrange an interesting program which will be followed by an interesting tour of the city, golf tournament, a shoot at the gun club and a trip to the lakes for boating and swimming. The tour of the city will be through several large industries and will be of considerable interest.

CAN'T GET EXCITED

Something must be wrong with us. It is shocking to find that we simply can not get excited over poison alcohol. In the first place, the evidence indicates that not very many people have been killed by drinking denatured alcohol. Most of the deaths from alcoholism are attributed as much to the quantity as to the quality of the beverage consumed. Of course, a vast amount of semi-poisonous bootleg rum is sold and drunk every day. If, however, it seemed that the Government through its formulas were responsible for the death of a single ex-barrelhouse inmate, we should be exactly as angry as the New York World says it is. But the Government as we understand it is in no sense responsible. It says quite frankly: "Denatured alcohol is poison. Touch it at your peril!" Here are plenty of poisons sold every day for all kinds of purposes. The only criminal is the whole business in the man who sells a poison for beverage purposes. The bootlegger of denatured alcohol is a wholesale murderer, perhaps the vilest murderer in all the sorry calendars of crime. He, and he only, is guilty of the deaths and blindness reported daily in the press.—Independent.

PASSING AND STOPPING

Motor traffic has worked changed conditions not only in the larger cities but in the towns and villages as well. The country merchant who used to encourage traffic to pass in front of his door now is seeking ways to get rid of it. So many motor cars are on the road that the press of traffic from behind pushes alk on through the village. Few of the drivers, the country merchant finds, stop to patronize his store.

Many communities are having the same experience. As a result, little towns and big towns alike are tending more and more to route through traffic around the outskirts and keep it out of the main business streets and residence thoroughfares.

It used to be estimated that the value of any particular spot as a business location depended upon the number of people passing it every day. That is no longer true. It is the number of people stopping that is important, and they can't stop except on the outer edge of the great traffic currents created by the universal use of the automobile.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

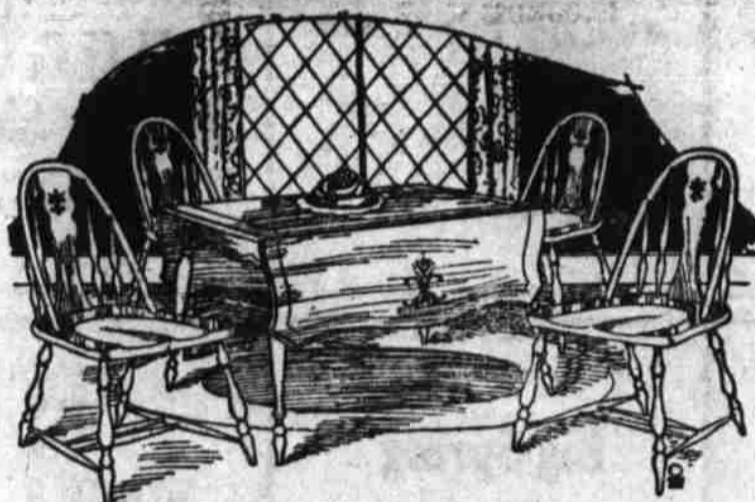

WOOTEN GROCER COMPANY TO BUILD AT BIG SPRING

Construction of a modern, fire-proof, one-story brick building at Big Spring for the H. O. Wooten Grocer Company will begin June 1. H. O. Wooten, president, announced on his return to Abilene last night. The project will be completed by September 1.

The H. O. Wooten Grocer Company has obtained a fifty year lease from the Texas & Pacific railway for a tract of land 50 by 145 feet at the corner of West First and Gregg streets and this will be the site for the building.

The structure will be used as a warehouse and an office will be arranged in the southeast corner. The building will be 50 by 145 feet with concrete floor. A modern sprinkling system with a six-inch water main will be installed to guard against fire. A concrete loading wharf will be constructed along the west side.

Impress of Old Spain Left in South America

While Cartagena, Colombia, is a most engrossing architectural ruin, a legacy of the old Spanish conquistadores, and a fine example of an ancient Spanish town, passengers en route to the west coast of the United States find that it is also energetically modern.

The Spaniards, when they embarked on their expeditions to the interior of Colombia, had as a god behind their efforts, the Indian story of a marvelous golden man, El Dorado, and saw him in their dreams as they hacked their way through the almost impassable jungles. Although the Spaniards never located their golden quarry and returned to the coast to found cities, they did succeed in wresting from the bosoms of the hills a vast amount of golden metal which gave to the country the name of the man they had been seeking, El Dorado. And in the cities they founded they left an indelible impress of old Spain.

Old Songs Seem Crude

The nearer we get to songs in the making the cruder they are. Very often they are not only incongruous but seem humorous, when they were not intended to be so. Sometimes they seem callous, treating of death with what appears to be an utter disregard of fitting solemnity or tenderness. In most cases this is quite unintended. The humble author intending to express the proper sentiment uses materials with which he is familiar, often parts of several other songs. Or he wishes to use a certain refrain and this refrain carries over into his mind certain associations. What he does he does in good faith, and if his product is not up to our standards it is not because of intent but because of the crudeness of his attempt.—R. W. Gordon, in Adventure Magazine.

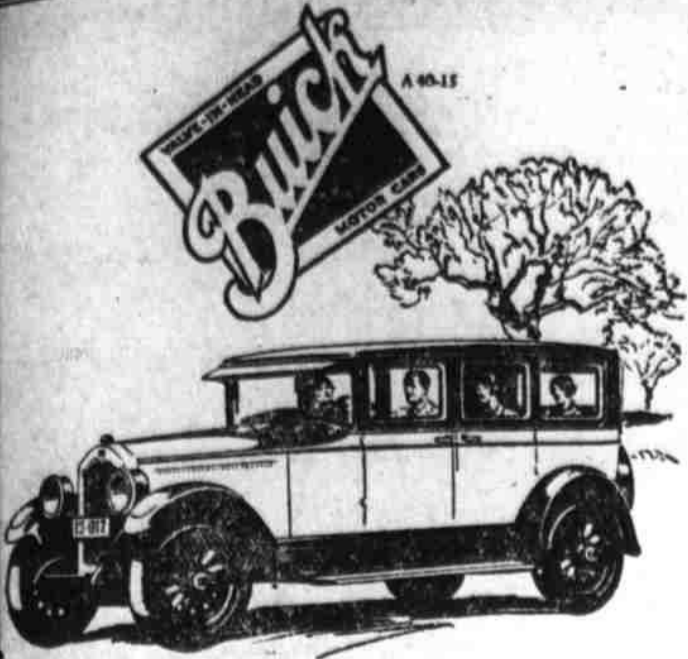

Lesson for May 8

PETER AND THE RISEN LORD

LESSON TEXT—John 20:1-10; 21:15-17.

GOLDEN TEXT—Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ which according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Forgives Peter.

JUNIOR TOPIC—Jesus Forgives and Restores Peter.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Risen Lord Appears to Peter.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Fellowship With the Risen Lord.

I Peter and John at the Empty Tomb (John 20:1-10).

John does not enter into a description of the resurrection of Christ or attempt a proof other than that the tomb was empty and that Jesus had repeatedly manifested Himself to the disciples after the tomb had been found empty.

1. How they came to know (vv. 1, 2).

The information was brought by Mary Magdalene out of whom Jesus had cast seven demons (Mark 16:3, Luke 8:2). Prompted by love for Him she went early to the tomb, "while it was yet dark." "she was last at the cross and first at the grave, she stayed longest there and was soonest here." Her love for Jesus was genuine, though her knowledge of His resurrection was defective. She could not rest till she had done her utmost for Him because she realized that great good had come to her from His hands. The reason we work so little for the Lord is that we have such a dim sense of His saving grace.

2. Their investigation (vv. 3-10).

The news of the empty tomb, which Mary brought with breathless haste, so moved John and Peter that they both ran to investigate. Upon arrival at the tomb John gazed upon it, but Peter entered it. John, with holy reverence, hesitates. Peter, with impulsiveness, enters the tomb at once. Their respective actions are not to be explained on the basis of degrees of love for the Lord, but to temperament. The investigation convinced them. The removal of the stone from the sepulcher, the arrangement of the grave-clothes all convinced them that it had not been done by an enemy.

II. The Charge of the Risen Lord to Peter (John 21:15-17).

Jesus put to Peter the thrice repeated question, "Lovest thou me?" Then He gave him a commission. This shows that supreme love to Christ is the one essential qualification for serving Him. Love is the spring from which all Christian activity flows. He asked, also, to show that there are three classes in the church which demand care and attention. These three classes need special care and food.

1. Feed my lambs (v. 15).

This first charge relates to those who are beginning the Christian life—the babes in Christ. The word "feed" means more than instruction. It means in addition to instruction that proper surroundings, influences and examples should be provided. As a Christian minister, Peter was to be an example, provide the proper surroundings and do the proper teaching for the young Christians, those just beginning the Christian life.

2. Tend my sheep (v. 16).

This charge shows a different class. It means to shepherd the sheep. It has application to the mature class of Christians. The duty enjoined therefore is to care for those who have passed out of their childhood into maturity. He must feed the sheep, give them proper instruction, guide them, lead them and discipline them. For this ministry the essential qualification is love.

3. Feed my sheep (v. 17).

The implication here is that Peter was charged with the responsibility of caring for aged Christians. The word "feed" is much the same as in the first case. It means that for the aged Christians the instruction ought to be such as will be suited to their needs. This needs special emphasis today because much attention is given to the young people, but in many instances the old people are neglected.

III. Follow Me (vv. 18-23).

In verse 18 is given a clear prophecy concerning Peter's death. It was to be by crucifixion. Peter once shrank from the cross, but now the Lord holds it up before him. It is not the Lord's death on the cross, but Peter's own. He teaches here that the Christian's death is for the glory of God. Whatever may be before us, even the cruel cross, the Lord's command is to follow Him.

Our Hope

Our hope lies not in the absence of danger, but in the presence of Christ, who is able to control the storm. No church with Christ in it can be wrecked or lost. More of the living Christ, more of His love, of His teaching.—Western Recorder.

BROWBEATING THE WITNESS

"Attorney, in a loud voice to the trembling witness: 'I want your answer, 'yes or no.' Have you quit beating your wife?'"

That is an old joke, but a fair sample of the kind of questions attorneys who pride themselves on their ability to cross-examine, indulge in. In most cases, the witnesses are more on trial than the prisoner at the bar. The practice of browbeating witnesses, insulting them by various forms of insinuations in order to discredit them with the jury, is of daily occurrence in the court rooms of Texas. Law-abiding, respectable citizens, forced by law to appear in criminal cases, are subjected to the wit and shafts of ridicule of low-brow, character assassins who have a license to practice law, and seldom do the courts offer them protection. Under the guise of impeaching witnesses, reputable citizens—often-times women of high respectability—must sit unprotected while some lawyer whose own character is questionable, by insinuations and innuendo, seeks to demean and belittle them in the eyes of the jury and spectators. Witnesses who have sworn to tell the truth and who have no intentions of doing otherwise are confused by volleys of questions until they deny their own story, and then the lawyer sits back with a smile of satisfaction, all puffed up over another demonstration of great cleverness.

Why should the judges of our courts permit such forms of cross-examination? Because, as lawyers, they have indulged in the same thing, and because we have grown accustomed to giving the murderer, the sneak thief, the rapist, and hijacker nine chances to the public's one. The criminal at the bar is made a hero, and the witness who is performing the service required of him, to all intents and purposes becomes the criminal.

In the program of reform which many good lawyers and other good citizens have sworn to bring about, and in which Farm and Ranch joins without reservation, an effort will be made to protect the innocent witness as well as give the accused a fair and impartial trial.—Farm and Ranch.

THE COTTON OUTLOOK

Obviously the outlook for cotton for the entire South is most discouraging, hence each individual farmer is urged to consider carefully all the factors involved in this situation. Especially is it necessary for him to consider the following factors before deciding on this year's cotton acreage:

1. There is now a supply of American cotton of approximately 24,000,000 bales. This is the largest supply on record.

2. The carry-over into next year of American cotton will be 9,000,000 bales. This is a very large carry-over.

3. From past experience the normal reduction in acreage in the south as a whole may not be expected to be greater than 10 per cent, but owing to the new factors in West Texas and Oklahoma even this percentage reduction may not be realized this year.

4. Business conditions in the United States and Europe will not be any better and probably not as good in 1927-28 as at present. This means that the buying powers of the public will not be any greater and probably less.

5. Weevil damage is uncertain, although the conditions favor weevil infestation to a greater extent than last year.—The Progressive Farmer.
