



Courthouse Project Is Topic of Public Hearing

A Public Hearing will be held on August 5, 1999, at 7:00 p.m. in the Wheeler County Commissioners Courtroom by Wheeler County Commissioners Court regarding the report of Wharry Engineering's findings after a structural survey of the Wheeler County Courthouse.

Included in this meeting will be a walking tour of areas to view the structural integrity of the 1925 courthouse. This is one of the steps involved in acquiring future funds from the state for Courthouse preservation and conservation. Wheeler County was awarded a \$2,500.00 grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation to hire Wharry Engineering, who is assisting with basic planning for the statewide Texas Courthouse Initiative-a \$50 million matching grant program proposed by Texas Governor George W. Bush. The Smart Start matching grant program will be used by Texas Communities to repair and restore historic courthouses throughout the state by providing selected counties with preservation planning services.

The final written report that outlines findings and recommendations regarding the physical condition of the structure will be provided on or before September 30, 1999. Wheeler County citizens are encouraged to attend and public input is welcomed.


Kellie and Chad were united in marriage by Jerry Dan Hefley of Wheeler, Texas.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number, and an adult house-

hold member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the school reviewing official will review the applications and determine eligi-

bility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent of the

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of all household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.


