SECOND PRIMARY VOTING

Since the Texas election law was amended to take effect in 1920, requiring a majority for the party nomination for Governor, a second primary has been necessary six times in the Governor's race. The question of voter turnout in the runoff election has always interested the candidates between primary elections.

In 1920, when Pat M. Neff defeated Joseph M. Bailey, the first primary plurality leader, the difference in the total vote between the two primaries was negligible.

1,123 less in the second than the first. In 1924 in the heated Ferguson-Klan fight, 26,647 more Texas Democrats voted in the second primary than in the first. But in 1926 in the least explainable voting record of the past quarter century, there were 54,916 fewer votes in the second primary, although this was the year in which the bitter Ferguson-Moody fight was waged.

The most astonishing runoff voting figure occurred in 1934, the last time a second primary has been necessary to decide the Governor's race. In the memorable contest in which James Allred finally defeated Tom Hunter, 794,011 votes were cast in the first primary. The second primary exceeded this mark by 161,582.

This year in a record first primary vote, the total on August 24 is unlikely to better that of July 27. The big question is whether the initial vote will be approximated. It is a question which has seriously worried the supporters of Beauford Jester who fear that his top-heavy plurality may induce his voters to believe a trip to the polls unnecessary.

The situation is another excellent argument for the preferential ballot with votes for second and third choice. There is no good reason for requiring two trips to the polls at any time.

ACKLEY PARK RODEO TO BE AUG. 31, SEPT. 1

Plans for Elk City's eighth annual Ackley Park Rodeo August 31 and September 1 are in the completion stage, according to directors of the rodeo association who are vowing that the three performance of this year's show will be bigger and better than ever.

The three performances are scheduled for Saturday afternoon and night, August 31, and Sunday afternoon, September 1. Several new added attractions, clowns and novelty acts have been secured and bareback riding has been added as a special rodeo contest event.

The rodeo will mark the eighth annual homecoming of Elk City's Beutler Brothers rodeo organization which was booked this season for rodeo exhibitions in Sidney, Iowa, Dodge City, Kansas, Albuquerque, N. M., Las Vegas, N. M., Clovis, N. M., Dalhart, Texas, Lubbock, Texas, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Chickasha, Woodward and 15 other towns and cities from coast to coast.

Ever phase of the show this year is going to be better and on a larger scale, the directors stated. The budget for this year's three performances has been increased to \$7,500.00 and a large share of this amount is to be paid out in prize money to contestants and is expected to bring to Elk City the very best performers in the rodeo entertainment field, including several world's champions.

Anticipating a record crowd at the eighth enactment of the wild west derby, rodeo officials have made arrangements to seat approximately 1,000 additional persons at each of the three performances.

The Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows: "Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum

amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."
