

## COUNTY VOTERS START ARDUOUS LISTENING TASK

Voters of Wheeler county may start making their choice of candidates now—there won't be any more. Saturday was the deadline for filing for county and precinct offices. The final filing date for other offices had already passed. The last day for filing for U. S. representative, state senator, state representative, district judge and district attorney was May 20. At that time, Congressman Gene Worley from the Panhandle district ended up unopposed for the first time since he has held the office. R. L. Templeton does not have an opponent in his race for state representative, nor does Tom Brady, candidate for district attorney.

Other unopposed candidates are County Judge G. W. Hefley, County Clerk Harry Wofford, County Superintendent of Public Instruction Allen Kavanaugh and Commissioners H. S. Sims of precinct 4 and Lloyd Anglin, precinct 1.

Lewis Goodrich of Shamrock and Walter E. Rogers of Pampa are candidates for District Judge. Mrs. Ollie W. Beene is being contested for the office of district clerk by Christopher S. McClain. T. J. (Thomas) Daughtry opposes T. L. Gunter for county tax assessor-collector. Sheriff Jess Swink has two opponents, W. Z. Baker and J. D. Frye. Three candidates are asking the post of commissioner of precinct 3, C. W. Wells, Robert (Bob) Terry and Albert N. Williams.

As fourth place winner in the Maggie W. Barry Scholarship Contest, Joy Williams of Wheeler county, has been awarded the Leadership Training Scholarship given by the Danforth Foundation.

This scholarship is given annually to an outstanding 4-H club girl and boy, and covers the cost of tuition of two weeks of training at the American Youth Foundation Leadership Training Camp at Shelby, Michigan. This includes the full camp expenses of training, board, lodging and social recreational activities. Transportation must be provided by the individual attending.

The camp, one of the largest summer camps in America, occupies 200 acres on Lake Michigan and Stony Lake, near Selby, Michigan. The camp dates for girls are July 29 through August 11.

Joy has been a 4-H club girl 8 years. Her demonstrations have been bedroom, poultry, gardening, home food supply and clothing. Joy held the following offices in 4-H: Chairman of the 4-H Council for two years, president of her club two years, vice president for one year, council delegate two years, reporter one year, and chairman of the exhibit and year-book committees, each one year.

Besides the 4-H club Joy has been a member of Shillalah, Rural Show Club, and Future Homemakers of Texas of which she was president two years.

## COUNTY DAIRY MEN ASKED TO EXHIBIT STOCK

Members of the Top O' Texas Dairy association and all other milk producers of Wheeler county are extended an invitation to take part in a Dairy Show to be held at Shamrock on September 14. County Agent Hubert Martin and V. B. Hardcastle, administrative officer of Wheeler county ACA, and Jimmie Blaisdell all of Wheeler, are members of committees in charge of the show.

The cattle classes will be open to all breeds of dairy cattle, registered as well as grades, Martin said, and a judging ring will be provided in the Shamrock high school gymnasium with seats to accommodate those attending.

Housewives who don't know a Jersey from a Holstein will be asked to compete with other uninitiated and experts in a dairy judging contest of which County Agent Hubert Martin of Wheeler will be in charge. One of the main purposes of the show is to acquaint people with the advantages of good dairy stock, and those entering the free-for-all judging contest will be given pointers on how stock should be judged, and then turned loose to take part in the contest. Valuable merchandise prizes will be awarded the winning amateur judges.

Official judging will be done by experts from Texas A & M College Extension Service and will be on a classification basis. Each animal will be competing with the ideal dairy type rather than other animals at the show. Animals will be classed: excellent, very good, good plus and good. Individual (Continued on Last Page)

## COUNTY BALLOT IS DUE MONDAY

Next Monday, June 24, is the last day for candidates to pay their filing fees to get their names on the ballot. On that day the Wheeler County Democratic Executive committee of which A. B. Crump of Wheeler is chairman, will meet to prepare the ballot for the July primary.

Other important dates on the election calendar from now until the first primary are:

July 2—Last day for filing first campaign expense accounts. Candidates and managers are required to file such accounts not more than 30 and not less than 25 days preceding primary.

July 8—First day for absentee voting. Such voters must apply to county clerk to vote not more than 20 and not less than 3 days prior to primary.

July 18—Last day for filing second expense account, with candidates and managers required to file not more than 12 or less than 8 days before primary.

July 20—Last day for tax collector to deliver list of voters to chairman of county executive committee.

July 26—Executive committee required to distribute election supplies not later than 24 hours before opening of polls.

July 27—First primary election. Polls open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.

July 27—Rural precincts hold convention at 2 p. m. to select delegates to county conventions.

## Last Half of 1945 County Taxes Due

T. L. Gunter, tax assessor-collector, in a tax notice in today's Times, is reminding Wheeler county citizens that the last half of 1945 taxes is due on or before June 30, 1946.

Delinquent taxes may be paid in the month of June at a considerable saving. The penalty and interest of seven and one-half per cent now, will be increased to 11 per cent July 1, and \$1.00 costs will be added.

Statements of taxes which are due, will be furnished all property owners upon request, and it will be decided to their advantage to make these tax payments on or before June 30.

**A LESSON IN DISTRIBUTION**

The sale of surplus war property is a sad lesson in distribution that the nation will long remember. Politics, mismanagement, cumbersome rules and general confusion have nearly blocked the sale of billions of dollars' worth of material which the country desperately needs. Everything from blankets to tractors is rotting away in supply dumps, in spite of the fact that everyone wants it moved quickly, including the officials in charge of the surplus disposal program.

The lesson is that an efficient retail distribution system cannot be set up overnight. Moreover, it cannot be set up at all if it is burdened with red tape. The government could probably learn a

few things from the retail distribution industry. This industry has been working for years to develop the most efficient methods of moving goods from producer to consumer. Of course, unlike the government, private distributors are compelled to seek efficiency or sacrifice a slim margin of profit. Some of the large chains have developed distribution to such a fine art that they are able to operate on profit margins of less than one per cent of sales. They do it because they have learned to handle mountainous volumes of goods with a minimum of waste motion. And they try to have what consumers want at the right place and at the right time.

The job of distribution is doubly difficult at the present time, partly because they must fight an uphill battle to convince government regulators such as the OPA that excessive red tape and unnecessary rules are anathema to efficient distribution, a fact that has nearly wrecked the government's distribution of surplus property.

**Veterans' News**

(This official veterans' information service is prepared by the St. Louis branch office of the Veterans Administration.)

Nine out of ten of the loans that have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration have been for the purchase of homes. The housing shortage has made this phase of the G. I. loan-guarantee program most important to many veterans, and has caused some of them to overlook the fact that they may obtain government guarantees on loans used to purchase farms.

The Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G. I. Bill) gives the government the power to guarantee up to \$4,000 of a loan used to purchase home, farm or business real estate, or \$2,000 of a loan used to purchase livestock, equipment, machinery or tools, or a business.

As in the case of home loans the government never will guarantee more than half the total amount of a loan obtained for the purchase of a farm. If the veteran obtains a \$10,000 loan, the government will guarantee its top amount, \$4,000. But if the loan is \$6,000, the government guaranteed will be half the total amount, or \$3,000.

If a veteran wants to obtain a G. I. loan guarantee for the purchase of a farm, or to buy livestock and equipment for one he already owns, here's how he should go about it:

He picks out the farm he wants to buy, and finds a lender willing to loan him the necessary money. This lender may be a bank, building loan association or other agency, or a private lender. He gives the lender the original copy of his discharge certificate, which will be returned after the deal has been concluded.

The lender sends a VA-approved appraiser to inspect the property the veteran wishes to buy, and in the meantime determines the veteran's chances of success in the venture, and his need for the property he wants to purchase. If the lender is satisfied with all phases of the transaction, he and the veteran close the deal, the papers are sent to the Veterans Administration, and the G. I. guarantee becomes effective.

Remember, the government does not loan money to veterans—it merely GUARANTEES a portion of the loan to the lender. This makes it easier for the veteran to obtain his loan, because his G. I. guarantee will serve as security of the best possible kind.

Q. May a pension be paid by the Veterans Administration because of a service-connected disability where the veteran's service was other than in time of war?

A. Yes, for disability resulting from injury or disease contracted in line of duty, when such injury or disease was incurred in, or aggravated by, active military or naval service in time of peace. The disability must not have been the result of the veteran's own wilful misconduct. The veteran also must have a discharge from active duty under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q. If an eligible veteran is taking a course of education or training but due to illness is unable to continue for several weeks, may

the time of his training period be extended?

A. Yes, it may, when his physical condition will permit. The total period to which the veteran is entitled may not be increased.

Q. Are there any charges for a guaranty of loan by the Veterans Administration?

A. No. Commissions, brokerage, or similar charges may not legally be assessed against a veteran for securing a guaranty of loan. Of course, those fees usually borne by a borrower, such as appraisal, title research, title guaranty, transfer fees, etc., may be charged against the veteran.

Q. May a veteran start training under the GI Bill in a trade and later find that it was ill chosen, and change to some other vocation?

A. Yes.

Q. Can a veteran with a dishonorable discharge receive benefits under the GI Bill?

A. No, but any discharge other than "dishonorable" does not disqualify him.

students. There will probably be two sessions held each evening, two in the afternoon and one in the evening. Information on exact time of the classes may be had at the office of Bob Clark, secretary-manager of the chamber of commerce in Shamrock. Classes will be conducted informally. Cost of enrolling in the employee course will be \$1.00 per person and cost of the employer course will be \$1.50. Two courses will be offered. The first of these is for employees. It is titled "Professional Development in Retail Selling" and is a ten-hour course. The course material is flexible and will be adapted to local conditions after Miss Prince has had time to interview local people. It will include such subjects as: The Meaning and Significance of Professional Selling. The Professional Attitudes Toward Selling. Merchandise Information. Positive Selling Techniques. Closing the Sale. Telephone Selling. Selling to Stay Sold. Building a Clientele. The cost of enrolling in this course will be \$1.00. Subjects to be offered in the managerial course include: How to Get Ready to Train. Why Demonstration Training Is More Effective than Telling and Showing. How to Analyze an Employee's Job in Order to Train Effectively. How to Create Employee Interest in Learning by Making Him Aware of His Need to Learn. How to Show the Employee How to Use What He Learns. How to Plan On-the-Job Training. Fees can be paid on the night you enroll. For instance, if you start the employee's course on Monday, all you need to do is to be there before 7:30 with a dollar bill in your pocket. This pays for the entire course. The same is true of the managerial course. Miss Jean Redmon, field representative, also pointed out that an employee can attend the managerial courses and that an employer can attend the employee courses simply by paying the nominal fees.

**10 TEXAS BOYS OFFERED A. & M. SCHOLARSHIPS**

**COLLEGE STATION**—Ten Texas boys who have very slim hopes of obtaining a college education because of financial limitations are going to be able to realize their ambition at Texas A. & M. College. Ten Texas A. & M. College Opportunity Awards, four-year scholarships, beginning in September and running through 1950, were announced here today by President Gibb Gilchrist of the College. A. F. Mitchell, Corsicana, chairman of the board of the Texas A. & M. Development Fund, and Carrol Gaines, San Antonio, president of the Association of Former Students. The ten fortunate boys will be selected through statewide competition, and each will receive between \$200 and \$300 per year, an amount which may be supplemented by student employment on the campus. Details of the selection are being handled by Registrar H. L. Heaton. Under sponsorship of the A. & M. Development Fund, the Opportunity Awards are a joint project of the College and its Association of Former Students, and it is hoped to increase the number of the awards each year.

"These first ten awards are merely the beginning," Mr. Mitchell declared. "Each year more than half of the Texas boys who finish high school are unable to attend college for financial reasons. In that group we believe there is as much potential leadership and ability to pursue a college education as there is in the group who are financially able to attend college. The Opportunity Awards program is our answer to this tragic waste of one of the finest and most valuable resources of Texas—its young manhood. We intend to make 'equality of opportunity' a shining reality, instead of a hollow phrase to the young men of Texas who conscientiously desire a college education, and who are equipped to make a success of the chance to study. Ten awards each year are assured for the next five years. Our goal is one hundred such awards each year, backed by a permanent endowment. Such a program, we believe, would be the most important contribution we could make to the future of Texas and the nation."

Participation in financing this program is not limited to men who once went to Texas A. & M. College. Selection of the fortunate boys who receive the awards will be from the entire state. We invite anyone interested in this project to join us in reaching our goal of one hundred four-year Opportunity Awards."

**Three-Day Rodeo At Wellington Begins Friday, June 21**

A big three-day rodeo, largest in Wellington in recent years, will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 21, 22 and 23, sponsored by the Wellington Rodeo Association and the Glynn Moore Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. 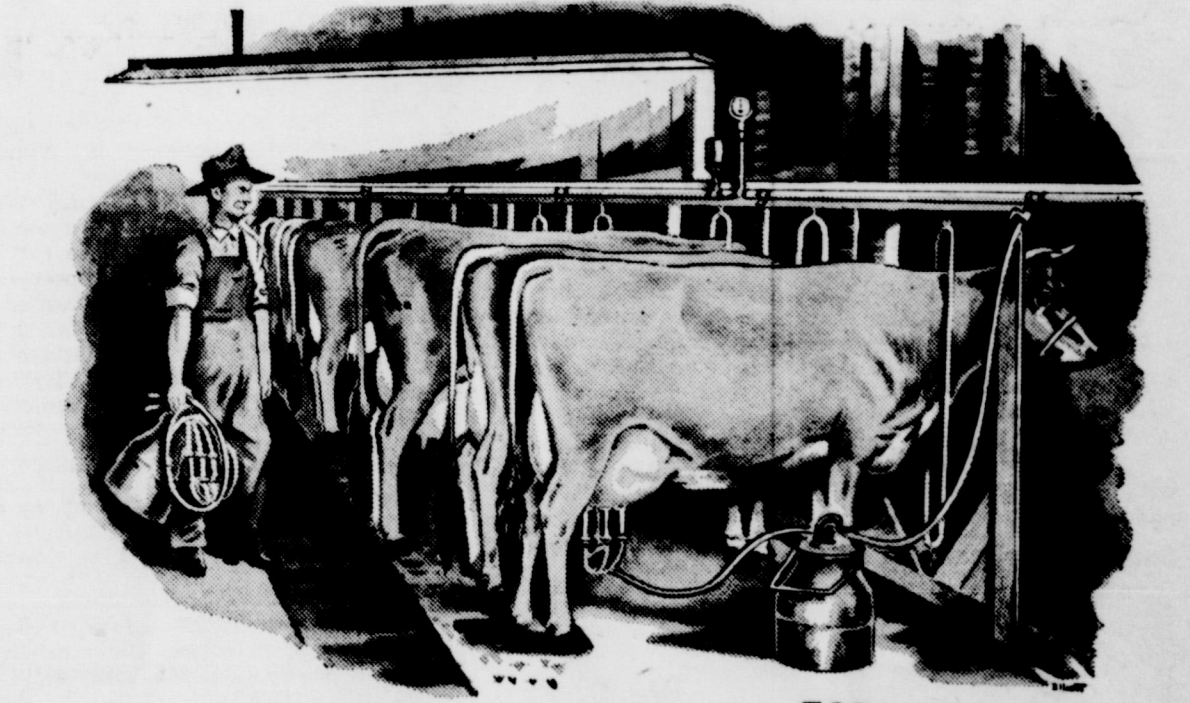
