Highlights of the amendment ire that it was passed unnaimhe last legislature; that the poard will be composed of the governor, attorney general and general land commissioner; that such board is given authority in concurrence with the legislature o issue bonds up to \$25,000,000 or the purchase of additional and from the federal government, ndividual and other state agencs located in every sector of the tate; that bonds bearing three er cent interest will be sold to ther state departments carrying neavy surplus funds now un-in vested, thus ELIMINATING THE NECESSITY OF ANY ADDI-TIONAL TAXES.

It should be pointed out that under the amendment veterans would NOT be required to "homestead" or live upon their land. They also would be prohibited from selling their equity.

Finally the eteran purchaser retains a seven ghth mineral fee on sulphur and fteen sixteenth on oil and gas. In this amendment, Texas is roposing to do something tangible or its own veterans. Many are nxious to enter the ranching nd farming business on a modest cale. Commissioner Giles has reeived more than 5,000 inquiries om men and women veterans. 

Because the spirit of harmony is there-harmony between folks who like each other's company, who enjoy the simple, homey atmosphere



A. Yes, provided that the cow has inherited the ability to produce large amounts of milk. Milk secretion is continuous, and when the udder is filled to capacity the nutrients for making milk return to the body. By milking more often, more milk is made.

Q. Do laying hens need more feed when their egg production is high? A. Yes. When egg production is high, hens need more feed to keep up their body weight. If feed rations are not sufficient, body weight will go down and production will slump. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company recommends feeding according to the following table:

When Egg Production Is Total Feed Required Daily 20 to 22 lbs. per 100 birds 23 to 25 lbs. per 100 birds 26 to 28 lbs. per 100 birds 29 to 32 lbs. per 100 birds

Q. Do champion swine producers make use of pasture?

A. During the past two years, several swine producers in Michigan have made enviable production records. In every case, the proper use of pasture played an important part in their success. It was reported that 15% to 20% less feed was required when pigs could have plenty of good forage. About half of the protein needed was supplied by the pasture.

Q. How much coal is required for brooding broiler chicks? A. About four to seven pounds of

coal per chick is required, depending upon the region and the season






